LOOKING AHEAD



The new Kiwanis year is here and filled with hope and excitement for good things to come. I was deeply honored to have been elected by the Michigan District Delegation as Governor-Elect for 2024-25, and look forward to serving with Governor Stan Nelson and his leadership team. For those who don't know me, please let me assure you that I'm well-prepared to step into this role. I was asked to run for Governor-elect at the end of last year's Delegate Session and throughout this year have had a remarkable team of leaders providing education, training, mentoring and coaching.

I would like to talk about Forest Gump, Collaboration, and Extravagant Welcome – and, yes – we will connect them!

Serving this past year as Lt. Governor, I've learned so much about the challenges we are all facing. It was suggested last fall that I visit clubs across the state - a novel concept that has led me on a lot of road trips. This amazing journey will continue and what you share will be integral to our future goals.

What I've heard more than anything else from you is concern at our dwindling numbers --- but instead of talking about recruitment, let's flip the conversation and talk about all Kiwanis has to **offer** potential members. Instead of being

People may think of membership as another commitment; however, when asked, plenty of people want to help. Our job – simply put – is to **ask**. People want an outlet to give back.

In today's society, people are also increasingly isolated and in need of the **camaraderie** that Kiwanis provides. Inviting people to walk with us on our Kiwanis journey is a **gift.** Thought of in this way, recruiting is not a hard thing. So, let's emulate Forest Gump's cross-country trek and the numbers of people he drew in along his way. Consider that everywhere we go and everyone we meet can be inspired by <u>us</u> to become Kiwanis member volunteers!

Next, let's touch on the power of collaboration ... joining forces to streamline cost and manpower. We really are better together, but on my journeys, I've learned that some clubs feel isolated - disconnected from other clubs, our Michigan District, or Kiwanis International. And, honestly, some folks are not necessarily interested in what's going on outside their club. There are a lot of reasons people can come to feel disconnected, which is when we run the risk of losing them.



Alternatively, when members are encouraged to attend interclubs and conferences, share communications, and accept roles in leadership, they see the big picture and become highly-engaged members ... and highly-engaged members stay. No man is an island, and **no club is an island**. Whatever the challenge, we don't have to do it alone. We **need** each other's fresh ideas, shared successes, and creative ways of overcoming challenges. And we get all of that when we connect and collaborate with other Kiwanians and other service organizations. Getting outside our clubs and meeting people from different walks of life expands our horizons. The next time you get an invitation from your Lt. Governor to attend a Division Council Meeting, just say yes. When you get the date for your spring KiwanisONE, just say yes. When communications come out on conventions and conferences, just say yes. Commit to getting out and about this year, and watch how you and your club prosper.

Last, but certainly not less important: we must be people of Extravagant Welcome. We've all known people who had that gift of making you feel like you're the most important person in the room. That's Extravagant Welcome. Let's be sure that all who enter our meeting spaces are acknowledged, warmly welcomed, and connected with others. Let's embrace diversity and inclusion, Kiwanis values that are absolutely essential to the future of our organization. Let's ensure our clubs are embracing people from all walks of life.

So as we kick off this new Kiwanis year, let's make commitments:

- ✓ to get outside of our clubs and collaborate,
- ☑ and to embrace newcomers with Extravagant Welcome.

Let's work together to BUILD new clubs, NURTURE current clubs, RETAIN our existing members, and make this a banner year for Michigan!

We were also honored to have our International President Katrina Baranko attending as our 2024 -2025 Counselor. Katrina and Emily Saalfrank (Area 1 Global Membership **Engagement Director)** brought many new and exciting ideas to our membership.

135 Delegates representing 51 Clubs elected Stan Nelson to be our 2024 - 2025 Governor. They elected Cindy Greening to be our 2024 - 2025 Governor-Elect. Renea Callery will serve as the Immediate Past Governor.

Welcome to the **Kiwanis NEW Year!!**

Overall, the comments have been very positive. A survey will be sent (if it hasn't already) to the attendees to get your input on how the event went. Each year, the Conference Committee listens to and implements many of the ideas based upon the constructive feedback that we receive. We understand that some of our members had concerns or other thoughts on the Conference. I encourage you to reach out to me directly and share those with me.

On the downside, 163 Kiwanians represent just over 5% of our District Membership and only 44% of our Clubs were in attendance. I believe that we can do better! The Conference is a gathering time for Kiwanians (new and tenured) from throughout the district, to focus on our achievements, learn new things, see existing friends and to make new friends. In 2025, Kalamazoo will be hosting the Conference August 13 – 17. Make plans to attend!

Our 2024 - 2025 Board held their first meeting in Mason on September 21, 2024. Thank you, Divisions! You elected an awesome Team of dedicated Kiwanians to represent you. Their purpose is to support the individual clubs and membership within their divisions. 2024 - 2025 is all about nurturing and revitalizing our membership, and they are available to help! They will be supported by our Membership Chair, Larry Memmer. Larry, his Team and Kiwanis International have tons of resources committed to helping clubs and members expand their service to Children within our communities.

Several Kiwanians have asked about the Search Committee for a new Executive Director. Instead, the Executive Committee put together a "Future Michigan District Initiative" Committee to take an in-depth look at how the district should be structured. Governor Stan has asked me to chair this committee. We will present a plan to the Board for their consideration at the February 8, 2025, Board meeting.

This issue of the Builder encompasses the months of October and November. From the start of the Kiwanis Year and the "spooky" end of October, to a time of "gratefulness" at the end of November.

Thank you for being a Kiwanian. Thank you for the Service that you do. Thank you for your Leadership and the time that you dedicate. Thank you for the lives that you touch. I had the opportunity to spend this Labor Day weekend with 32 Key Clubbers from all over MI and what an exciting time it was. I was truly blown away. Let me share with you some of the leadership skills these kidos have:

- They all came to the Howell Nature Center on time on Friday, to get started on the pact filled weekend.
- They were all assigned rooms and curfews. Of course, there was a lot of giggling going on in some of the girls' rooms – but everyone was up and ready to go by 8 am the next morning.
- One area that blew my mind was the assignment of duties: cooking, setting table, & clean up. These students stepped up and made breakfast, lunch, and dinner, and then there was a group each day who did dishes and had fun doing them. 32 Kido's we had to feed. Talk about the amount of food.
- The Governor Jenna led the group in assignments, having all of them share what their division was doing, and what they needed to do within their divisions. They ALL had to give a presentation, PowerPoint and discussion followed.
- AMAZING. As I sat there I thought, WOW, our grownup team could learn from these board members.
- They were given assignments to make Instagram shots to get the word out as to what the MI District Key Club was doing.
- We went through the directory to align them up with who the Adult club was, and how they could reach out to their SPONSORING CLUB to get new Key Clubs, or re-charter ones we lost. They did this with great excitement.
- Sitting there for three days with them, watching them help each other, work with others on their teams, asking the adults for advice, and just doing what they needed to do while they were there.

I did spend a bit more time in the kitchen with the kids, while they prepared the meals and the clean up and thought to myself, this is a lot of kids to feed and a lot of money coming out of their "leadership budget." I thought, we need to help them. The money the DA - Jordon gets from dues – should go to the kids that have an opportunity to continue going to their SLC & Fall rally events. That money should not be spent on food and lodging.

But I sat back and thought of the clubs and some are small, some medium and large. Some of the students didn't even know who their sponsoring club was.

This upset me a bit... We are always talking about our future – our kids... yet how are we supporting them? Do you have an active Key Club? Do you have an ACTIVE Kiwanis Advisor?



Number one concern for me and Jordan, is the Sponsoring Advisor. Are they active? Do they attend the kids' meetings? Are they involved with getting to know them? Are they aware of what the kids are doing within their school and division?

That is the most important concern we have.

The second is - they need HELP financially. Financially to help get them a location for their board meetings - four times a year, just like the adult team. Financially they need help to feed the kids while at a location for a weekend.

This help might be above what you may have budgeted for them to attend SLC, Fall Rally & ICON.

I know that a lot of our clubs are financially struggling, and I truly get that. My Dearborn club is supporting 7 Key Clubs. Kids are excited about opening a Key Club in schools they see the terrific opportunity for leadership development and getting to know more people.

But they can't do it without all of US!

So how can you help? Do you have a few extra dollars in your budget? In your personal budget? Is this something perhaps you and your club can budget for perhaps next year? I'm only looking for help to cover whatever costs we can for four (4) board meetings.

My ask is - whatever you can send to help support 32 students four (4) times a year at their board meetings. This money will go towards the food we purchase and cook on location, teaching students the difference between ham & turkey. LOL It will go towards food if we have to take them out for fast food, if we have to have our meetings at a hotel.

Watching these students flourish from one year to another just makes my heart smile. I have seen many come to a meeting and just sit and watch and then before their year is over, they are beautiful butterflies. I found out that there are like six (6) students from the different schools who all want to be the Governor, on the Board or an International Trustee... WOW - only if we, the adults had that desire and passion. But anyway, let's help them make their dreams come true.

Kiwanis Wants All Children to Be Able to Swing



Gladwin Kiwanis Club members recently saw questions from local moms on Facebook's: "Gladwin County in the Know", asking if there were any swings in Gladwin County for children with special needs. Club members did some checking and discovered that there probably weren't any, or they were hard to find.

Because Kiwanis focus is on meeting needs of children and youth in our community, we agreed something needed to be done about this immediately. We began by checking with Gladwin Elementary School Principal, Josh Pahl. He agreed something needed to be done about this. Gladwin Community Schools' Superintendent, Chuck Frisbee, supported the idea. A swing for children in wheelchairs was ordered and Kiwanis agreed to pay for it.

The ground was leveled and prepared, and the new swing was installed before Labor Day. What a joy to see the photo of Kylie having such fun. This is just the beginning of this project. Kiwanis is now checking with Beaverton Schools and the Gladwin City and Beaverton parks to find out the feasibility of installing similar wheelchair swings. We also hope to install "bucket" swings for children with special needs that do not use wheelchairs.

These swings are not cheap!
