Kiwanis International, one of the great service organizations of the world, had its origin on January 21, 1915. On this date the State of the group of business and professional men who organized the first Kiwanis Club on this site in the Griswold Hotel. The club's name, Kiwanis, was an Indian term. The concept and principle which Kiwanis represents is symbolized by the slogan "We build." From its beginning, and within two years, Kiwanis became international in its scope.

- With more marketing and branding, more people will know about your club and may want to get involved and join.

• Kiwanis International has developed membership materials that are available to you. Ask your Lieutenant Governor about getting a Power Point program, or other aids that you can use within your club meetings.

• The members' love for their club and community is what keeps a club strong. Your District and Division is only as strong as our members.

Our District always could use new senior leadership as we go forward. In a couple of months, we will be asking for qualified Kiwanians to submit their intention to be a Governor-Elect candidate next fiscal year. The District office will be waiting for your submission. The more we receive, the 'healthier' our campaign process will be.





Conquering Mountains

In October, we were introduced to our 2024-25 Kiwanis Goals by International President, Lee Kuan Yong: to build 425 new clubs and recruit 30,000 new members. At first glance these are some daunting, mountain-sized goals. But with 7,000 clubs and 170,000 members around the world, these goals can be achieved.

Author Alysan Kieda recently shared, "You may have seen or heard some variation of the saying, 'If you want to go fast, go alone. But if you want to go far, go together.' But is there any solid research that these words are not just lovely, but true? Yes! In fact, one such study by British and American researchers demonstrated that people estimated the size of mountains as significantly smaller if they were standing with someone else as opposed to when standing alone."

We've been talking about connecting and collaborating – with members and other Kiwanis clubs and service organizations – as we focus this year on Build–Nurture–Retain. Have you made any good connections lately? Are you out and about in your community, networking and introducing your Kiwanis club to others? Are your club members inviting people to your events? Do you have a membership director and team? Is recruiting a focus on your agendas for discussion and to remind members that we are all on the membership team?

If your club is doing a great job with bringing in new members, tell me your success story so that whatever you're doing right can be shared. Do you have a focused membership director/team? Are all or most of your members engaged in some kind of recruiting effort? Are you using the Kiwanis ACE tools? Are you utilizing invitations to your service projects? Whatever it is, inquiring minds want to know!

The District Membership Team is in full swing and available to help, advise, coach – whatever you need. It bears repeating that each Kiwanis club is part of a larger community and there's a lot of support offered by both the Michigan District and Kiwanis International. KIWANIS CLUB OF WOODHAVEN Non-Perishable Food Drive

Saturday, October 12th, Woodhaven Kiwanians and friends delivered 4.5 tons of food in memory of Ryan Sergent who passed away 27 years ago at High School Cross Country practice. Ryan embraced life and was always helping others. His mission continues on through the Kiwanis Club of Woodhaven meeting the needs of Downriver families facing food insecurity.

Ryan's mother, Evelyn Sergent-Kosowski, spent her whole career, teaching fifth grade at Bates Elementary School. Woodhaven-Brownstown students stepped up and collected food as they always do. This year, students in all eight schools gathered 246 boxes of food. Woodhaven Kiwanians and An Apple for Ryan purchased another \$7,000 worth of food. It amounted to 2 school buses jammed with food to distribute. The Woodhaven High School Hockey team along with other students showed up to haul food.

Our Lady of the Woods in Woodhaven, Faith Lutheran Church in Brownstown, Community Lutheran Church in Flat Rock, St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Trenton, the Downriver Food Pantry in Wyandotte, and the Wyandotte Downriver Salvation Army each received also 1,500 pounds of food. Smaller amounts were delivered to the Woodhaven Senior Citizens pantry, St. Stevens Episcopal Church in Wyandotte and St. James Episcopal Church on Grosse Ile.
