


There is no expected per-member gift for clubs.

- Earn a certification of completion.


Participants will take a deep dive into eight leadership topics:

BRICK BY BOOK BUILDING A SCHOOL OF READERS

Kiwanis International Children's Fund has gifted the Michigan District a grant to use towards a program that will help Serve the Children of the World.

As Immediate Past Governor, I was granted the choice of children's program this gift would support, and I chose the gift of reading. Back in 2014, I developed the **Brick by Book: Building a School of Readers** program for an impoverished school in Detroit. It was a huge success, significantly improving reading scores for elementary students. This grant will enable us to bring the program to Michigan District students.

Brick by Book: Building a School of Readers engages first and second graders and their teachers, who will encourage the children to read to obtain and complete their "bricks".

They will then take their signed bricks to the Principal's office. Every morning the Principal will pull two random names from the bricks submitted and will announce the children's names over the intercom system.

The children then take their "bricks" and tape them to a cardboard house. Schools may also choose to have a student group, such as Honor Students, post the bricks. The children get excited about reading as they hear their names called on the intercom and place their signed bricks on the cardboard house for the whole school to see. The challenge becomes a bit of a contest among the children, all while Building a School of Readers.

The schools can develop this into whatever works best for their teachers. If funding is available, for example, they may decide to have a year-end reading party, celebrating the students for their accomplishments.

Just as important, is that the children are each gifted with a book or two to keep and take home to share with their families. It's up to the school if they want to gift the books during March Reading Month or at the end of the school year so the children don't fall behind on their reading over summer vacation.

Kiwanis Club partners with school district for food drive for the holidays

The Kiwanis Club of Utica-Shelby Township partnered with Utica Community Schools for a food drive for the holidays.

In the past this project was handled by the Sterling Heights Kiwanis Club; however, the club dissolved over the past year. Former members of the Sterling Heights club informed the Kiwanis Club of Utica-Shelby Township of this opportunity. The Kiwanis Club of Utica-Shelby Township didn't hesitate to take on this project.



In November, the Kiwanis Club of Utica-Shelby Township members dropped off empty boxes to 20 schools: Henry Ford II, Stevenson and Utica high schools; The Gene L. Klida Academy for International Studies; Bemis and Davis junior high schools; and Beacon Tree, Beck, Browning, Collins, Duncan, Ebling, Graebner, Harvey, Havel, Messmore, Oakbrook, Plumbrook, Rose Kidd (the temporary location of DeKeyser while it is being reconstructed) and Schuchard elementary schools. These schools held a canned food drive for several weeks.

Over the course of three days in December, the Kiwanis members picked up more than 1,200 boxes of food from the schools and delivered the food to local food pantries at St. Ephram Catholic Church, Heritage Church and Trinity Lutheran Church.

Theresa Farmer, from the Kiwanis Club of Utica-Shelby Township, said they are thankful to the high schoolers who helped load up a truck with the food boxes when they were collecting the donations at the schools.

"Those boxes were heavy. The food pantries were so surprised by the amount of food. Thanks to the generosity of UCS families, there is plenty of food for those facing food insecurity during this time of year," she said.

Rob Peterson, Kiwanis Club of Utica-Shelby Township 2024 project chair and past president, said it was an incredible experience working with Katherine Beck and the Utica Community Schools on this year's holiday food collection and distribution project.

"Our club provided manpower and logistical support; however, none of it would've been possible without the generosity of the students, teachers and administrators at UCS. This project impacts the lives of hundreds of people within the communities in which we live and work. Hats off to all the volunteers who brought this project to life and to the Sterling Heights Kiwanis Club who started this initiative nearly 40 years ago," he said.

He said they are honored to carry-on the tradition at the Kiwanis Club of Utica-Shelby Township.

UCS Superintendent Robert Monroe said the district is proud of the continuing partnership with the Kiwanis that engages students in the district's focus of a "culture of caring" and makes a difference for many UCS families.

Kiwanis Club of Troy Supporting School Youth Mental Health Initiatives

On December 16, 2024, the Kiwanis Club of Troy took a significant step toward supporting youth mental health by presenting a check to International Academy East Principal Patrick Griffin and Counselor Whitney Bernstein. This funding will bolster school-based mental health initiatives, aligning with the Kiwanis Club of Troy's mission to empower every youth to be their best self by providing the tools necessary to thrive.

Recent statistics highlight the urgent need for such initiatives. According to Mental Health America, 20.17% of youth aged 12-17 reported experiencing at least one major depressive episode (MDE) in the past year, with 15% suffering from severe impairment impacting their daily lives. In Michigan alone, nearly 60% of teens experiencing depression cannot access the help they need. These alarming figures emphasize the importance of community-driven solutions like those spearheaded by the Kiwanis Club of Troy.



Kiwanis' KIT Program: Addressing Barriers to Mental Health Care In collaboration with the Troy School District and ARISE Counseling & Training Institute, Kiwanis Club of Troy has established the Kiwanis Inspired Teens (KIT) Program. This initiative is designed to streamline access to mental health care, reducing long wait periods.

"In Michigan, families seeking mental health assistance often face significant barriers, including long wait times, limited in-person availability, and overwhelming financial burdens," said Colleen Reveley, LMSW, of ARISE Counseling & Training Institute. "Kiwanis' KIT Program steps in to eliminate these obstacles, providing a lifeline of support to youth and their families. This initiative enables and empowers youth in our community to move towards wellness and healing during such a critical time in their lives. We are grateful for Kiwanis' commitment to our community and our youth."


