Inviting New Members to Join Our Cause



The following article is excerpted from their winter newsletter, authored by Aktion Club Governor, Heather Phillips. It is entitled, **"Never Give Up"**.

I wasn't supposed to live to be 3 years old, but I'm almost 50. When I was born my mom couldn't take me home for three months because I was too small. I used to be able to walk with some assistance, but now all I have is my arms, so if my arms stop, I won't be able to do the things I do now, or stay in my current home. But even if that happens, I will find a way to keep going.

When I was little, I had to have casts on my legs, and my family found me crawling across the floor on my own. I just had to move, so I found a way! I have had a lot of surgeries [that have affected my vision] and make it hard to navigate in my power chair. I can miss where the curb is, and fall. I went to good schools, graduated from a community-based instruction program for young adults, and have family that is supportive so I can be independent.

Aktion Club lets me give back. I'm here to remind everyone to have confidence in themselves, to find a way, and to never give up. I wish I could see those doctors now [who said I'd only live to be 3], so I could say, "What did you say?" I encourage all Aktion Clubbers to remind each other not to give up.

Persons submitting candidate nominations shall also be past (or present) district governors, district committee chairs, or lieutenant governors. An attached letter should accompany the nomination form stating the rational of why their candidate should be presented with this award.

Three members of the Past Governors Council will be named as the selection committee and shall determine who will receive the award.

The winner will be recognized with a certificate of appreciation at the Michigan District Convention, and the Council of Past Governors will donate a maximum of \$250 to the Kiwanis of Michigan Foundation in the name of the recipient.

Candidates for this award shall be limited to past (or present) District Governors, District

Committee Chairs, or Lieutenant Governors. Persons submitting candidate nominations shall also be limited to the same above leadership positions. An attached letter should accompany this nomination form stating the rational of why their candidate should be presented with this award.

From the nominations submitted, a three-member selection committee shall determine who will receive the award. The selection committee shall be elected by the membership of the Council of Past Governors, where they will serve no more than a year term. The committee will select their own chairperson.



West Branch Kiwanis Celebrates 90 years

The club was started in 1935 in West Branch. Kiwanis was started in 1915 in Detroit and has grown to be world wide today. The organization helps children around the world, starting right from the local community.

We had about 35 past and present members at the luncheon on Tuesday, February 11, at the China Inn. In attendance, a member with over 50 years to one that just joined this year. There were slide shows showing our dearly departed Kiwanians as well as members today. Certificates of Appreciation were given to the members that have served five years or more.

Woodhaven Kiwanis Kids Coalition Against Hunger



They say, "it takes a village" and the village met at Woodhaven Upper Elementary School on Saturday, February 8th. 308 third through eighth graders from the Woodhaven-Brownstown and Trenton Schools, under the leadership of the Woodhaven High School Varsity Hockey Team and the Woodhaven High School Robotics Squad packed meals at the Woodhaven Kiwanis Sponsored packing. Together, we packed 24,540 meals. Over 400 students and adults joined in the packing. Co-Chairperson, Kiwanian Brenden Hoy, explained a third of the meals are used here in our Downriver Community, fighting off food insecurity. A third of the meals are sent international wherever our U.S. Military flies humanitarian aide. Meals are served in schools in Haiti and to refugees from the Ukraine crossing into Poland just to name a few locations benefiting from events like ours. The final third are set aside for international disasters such as flood or hurricanes.

Student and adults worked together in an assembly-line setting to produce packets of highly nutritious ricesoy casserole, each weighing 390 grams. These packets have a shelf life of over three years and are then boxed and distributed. When mixed with six cups of boiling water, each packet provides enough nutrition for six adults or twelve children for a day.

MICROGRANT PROGRAM

Small grants can make a big difference! The Kiwanis Children's Fund has a long history of collaborating with Kiwanis clubs to fill gaps in their project funding via club grants. But what about smaller clubs with limited service budgets? The Children's Fund knows that small projects can have a huge impact on the lives of children, and so we are excited to launch our Microgrant Program!

If your club has **35 members or fewer** and is **in good standing** with Kiwanis International and the Kiwanis Children's Fund, you may qualify to apply for a microgrant of US\$250-1,000!

Your project must:

- Be a service project enhancing the lives of young children and youth in your community.
- **Support at least one of the three Kiwanis causes:** health and nutrition, education and literacy, and youth leadership development.
- **Be upcoming or in process** (not yet completed) when grant payment is received.

Advantages of the Microgrant Program:

- Shorter application than the traditional club grant program.
- Less funding required from other sources. Matching funds will not be required.
- **Shorter decision period.** Applications received by the 1st of each month will receive a decision via email by the 15th of the same month.
- **Faster distribution of funds.** Distribution of the funds will begin in December of each year. After that, grant recipients will receive funds within two-three weeks of the application's acceptance.

Other requirements:

- Grants cannot be used for donations to organizations, salaries, scholarships/fellowships, sponsorships, training expenses, travel, lodging, capital construction projects or purchase of land/buildings.
- A report must be submitted at the end of the 12-month grant period.
- Once issued a grant, a club will be eligible to apply for another grant two years after submitting the final report.

Each year, the application period for the Microgrant Program is **October 1 – July 1**. Grant applications will be considered in the order received until funds are depleted. Applications are accepted through <u>Foundant</u>, the Kiwanis Children's Fund grant processing system.

Cool Rides with Jackson Kiwanis Club

The Kiwanis Bike program in Jackson, Michigan, started with long-time Kiwanian, Robert Frank. Mr. Frank attended a National Bowling tournament in Las Vegas, Nevada, and a Kiwanis meeting. At the meeting, he learned the Kiwanis Club in Las Vegas had purchased bikes and used them to encourage kids to read during March Reading Month and to have a chance to win a donated bike. Bob Frank brought this concept back to the Jackson Northwest Kiwanis Club and gave an overview on how the program worked. The Kiwanis Club started with just a few schools based on the sponsorships obtained by the members and continued growing the program every year little by little.

In brief, bikes are purchased by local sponsors and placed at elementary schools in plain view for students, parents, and staff to see the last week of February. The administration then informs students that for every book read during the month of March their name will be placed in a drawing to win the bike and helmet combo, all happening prior to spring break.

Three years ago, the bike program was turned over to a younger Kiwanis member who wanted to work with Bob in an effort to grow the program to as many elementary schools as possible. They realized the impact the program created relative to encouraging young children to read. A committee was formed to share the workload of contacting schools, ide

All bikes were purchased and assembled at Walmart in Jackson, Michigan. The Kiwanian in contact with Walmart selected two days (3-hour time blocks) the last week of February for the Kiwanis member to come to the rear of Walmart, pick up bikes and then drop them off at the Elementary school they signed up for.

As of 2025, the Jackson Kiwanis Club has grown the program to 26 schools and 94 bike / helmet combinations. The cost is \$125 and the club solicits local businesses to sponsor the program. We have sponsors giving as much as \$3,000 with a minimum sponsorship of \$125.00. Every bike sponsor gets a 8 1/2 × 11- inch laminated sign zip tied to the bike so everyone walking by can see who sponsored the bike.





The number of bikes placed at elementary schools is based on student population. At a minimum each school is given one boy's bike / one girl's bike and up to 8 bikes for larger schools. Prior to winners being drawn all schools are asked to contact the Kiwanian assigned (by a signup sheet) to their respective school. The Kiwanian attends the event, says a few words relative to the benefits of reading, and actually draws the winner's name. Following the drawing, the Kiwanian is then responsible to take a photo of the winners, email respective sponsors thanking them for their donation and lastly emailing the photos to the local press.

In conclusion, this program cost the Kiwanis Club \$0.00 as long as sponsors are obtained. As the coordinator, I can easily say asking sponsors year after year is easy. They, without hesitation, quickly indicate they are in for next year. I personally feel this is because we send a photo of the winner on the bike along with a message on how March Reading month encourages many students to read books. Although every student obviously can't win a bike, the program undoubtedly encourages reading which makes everyone a winner in our eyes.
