

The Hampton Inn (our Official Hotel) was across from the Heinz Museum and less than 10 minutes from the Convention Center.

Highlights

Terry Bradshaw opened the Convention with a humorous and inspiring presentation about the Service that Kiwanians provide around the world. He filled in last minute after Henry Winkler and Martin Sheen bailed. He intertwined football, common sense analogies and a knowledge of who Kiwanis was and what we stood for. Numerous top-notch workshops were presented, including one on Membership by our own **Rocky Roland** (*Alpena*).



Friday – brought our early morning District Caucus, more workshops, visits to the Kiwanis Store plus visits with Candidates and Kiwanis Vendors at the Convention Center. Friday night, we had a fun District Event at the Ballpark. With "Eat-in-Seats" tickets we all ate too much, watched the Pirates win a game and enjoyed a drone show all between rain showers.

Saturday Morning featured the Delegate Session. Paul Palazzolo, Kiwanis International Executive Director, as part of his presentation, highlighted what Clubs were doing around the world. **The Michigan District's own Jackson Club** was one of the Clubs recognized!

Michael Mulhaul of Interlaken, New Jersey, U.S., was elected president and Hope Markes of Hanover, Jamaica, was elected president-elect during the House of Delegates at the 2025 Kiwanis International Convention in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, U.S. Cathy Szymanski of Erie, Pennsylvania, U.S., was elected vice president and will also serve as our Board Counselor during the 2025 – 2026 Administrative year.

Timothy Sheppard of Cheyenne, Wyoming. U.S., and Amy Zimmerman of Beavercreek, Ohio, U.S., were elected trustees for the United States and Pacific Canada Region. Also joining the board in October for three-year terms will be Shinichi Yoshikuni of Tokyo, Japan, and Jon-Fadri Huder of Samedan, Switzerland.

The House of Delegates also voted on proposed amendments to the Kiwanis International Bylaws which require a 2/3 majority to pass. **Sue Petrisin** presented the following amendments:



- **Proposed Amendment 1:** Language Cleanup and District Submission of Resolutions. Submitted by the Kiwanis International Board, this amendment will clarify the current language of the Kiwanis International Bylaws requiring districts to be in good standing to submit resolutions. With the rewording, districts and clubs also can better understand the deadline for submission of resolutions. *The Amendment was Approved.*
- **Proposed Amendment 2:** Regional Boards to Propose Resolutions and Amendments. Submitted by the Kiwanis International Board, this amendment will allow the boards of Kiwanis regions to propose resolutions and amendments, beginning October 1, 2025. *The Amendment was Approved*.
- **Proposed Amendment 3:** Remote Voting for Kiwanis International Business was not approved. Submitted a fourth time by the Capital District Board, this amendment was submitted to provide for candidate nominations and initial review of proposed amendments and resolutions at the Kiwanis International convention, with final voting via secure remote voting. *It failed garnering a lower percentage than last year*.

The 2026 Kiwanis International Convention will be held in Manila, Philippines, June 25-27. We hope a lot of Michigan Kiwanians will join us. We will have more information in the near future.

Next on to Kalamazoo for our 2025 Great Lakes Conference! Join us August 15th, 16th and 17th for tons of fun, educational opportunities, fellowship and did I mention fun? Cathy Szymanski will be joining us! See you there!



Each recipient says that the values and skills they have learned in Key Club and Circle K International (CKI) will form the basis for the difference they'll make. In fact, each of these brilliant scholars is already paving the way for those who will come after them. And some of them are already planning to join Kiwanis!

The Children's Fund is honored to help them continue their education in the upcoming academic year.



Mohammed Ali Al-Sabeh *Kiwanis Children's Fund Scholarship*

Mohammed Ali Al-Sabeh recently graduated from Crestwood High School in Michigan, U.S. He served the Crestwood High School Key Club as underclassmen director and president before going on to positions at the district and international levels, including as an international trustee. In his first year of Key Club, Al-Sabeh launched the "Mittens for Michigan" project, which has provided over 600 giant mittens filled with comfort items for pediatric cancer patients. He also helped his school's Key Club grow from 30 members to more than 100. In addition to shadowing medical professionals as an intern, Al-Sabeh is a math instructor at the Mathnasium Learning Center, where he has organized a monthly raffle and STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Math) Day to motivate his students. His mentorship has extended to roles in Aspire United Education's STEM Mentorship Program and Crestwood Science Club, and to volunteer student teaching in the Dearborn High School special education classroom. As electrical lead of his school's robotics team, he raised thousands of U.S. dollars to provide robotics mentoring to elementary and middle school students. Al-Sabeh plans to study biochemistry at the University of Southern California before becoming a UNICEF ambassador and neurosurgeon working with the Agency for Healthcare Quality and Research, where he will work to break down systemic barriers to healthcare.

Working with Haslett High School's Sustainability Club and National Honors Society, as well as Haslett Middle School's Builders Club and Conservation Club, Key Club members will level the area, fill in a pond, cultivate a native plant and pollinator garden, and install seating so students and teachers can use the courtyard to hold classes, study and socialize. Grant funds will help purchase grass seed, mulch, picnic table kits and plants.

Senior Prom for Seniors

Saint Joseph High School Key Club, Michigan, U.S.

No, that project name isn't redundant — every spring, the Saint Joseph High School Key Club gives residents at a local retirement home the chance to relive their high school proms. A Youth Opportunities Fund grant will help the club bring in a band, dance floor, refreshments, door prizes, pictures and a chocolate fountain. Then it's time for intergenerational bonding as senior citizens and Key Club volunteers don their finest, dance the night away and, of course, crown a prom king and queen. The project has been so successful that Key Club members have gone on to be regular volunteers at the retirement home and launched a project to record residents' life stories.

Woodhaven Kiwanis Cereal Drive

Summer is a time for youngster to expand their horizons. It is a time for sports, bike riding, and creative play. No youngsters should have to spend their playful summer hours worrying about food insecurity, yet many downriver children do. The Feeding America Network estimates 14% of Wayne County residents face food insecurity. Following the model set by the Professional Nurses Association at Michigan Children's Hospital and Jay Towers from Jay Towers in the morning, Woodhaven Kiwanians partnered with area schools to collect cereal for local food pantries.

Students at Bates, Brownstown Middle School, Erving, Gudith, Hedke, Wegienka, Woodhaven High School, Woodhaven Upper Elementary, and Yake School collected cereal and fill 137 cases with cereal. Each case held 20 to 25 boxes of cereal. Bob McCoy, Club president, explained, the youngsters truly "Stuffed a School Bus" with cereal. Additionally, Woodhaven Kiwanians purchased 1,800 boxes of cereal, filling most of a second school bus.

Saturday, May 31st, Woodhaven Kiwanians, friends, and students head out to deliver 400 to 450 boxes of cereal to seven Downriver pantries. They visited Our Lady of the Woods (Woodhaven), Fed by Faith at Faith Lutheran Church (Brownstown), Helping Hands at Community Lutheran Church (Flat Rock), St. Philip's (Trenton), Downriver Food Pantry, St. Stephen's, and the Downriver Salvation Army.


