The lieutenant governor of Division 11 last year and this current year, Gerald Beckham passed away in mid-October. Both were strong hard-working Kiwanians, and we will miss both of them. Remember their families and friends in your prayers and thoughts and actions.

Now, the good news. I have attended several officer installations, and they were great. I also attended my first Division Governor's visits and had an enjoyable time with Divisions 1 and 11.

Congratulations to Past Governor Lynn for having the smallest member decrease of the Kiwanis districts in the United States. She and her team did a great job limiting membership loss to just 13.

We are still overcoming effects of the pandemic. Kiwanis clubs are resuming meetings, deciding how often to meet and transitioning back to meeting in-person, although some people are still not comfortable being in meetings with others. This year things have continued to improve, vaccines are improving and available (I have had all four shots and a flu shot). Let us work hard to recruit new members who will help us increase our service and who will help us reach out to new areas that also need our Kiwanis services.

We still need a few more lieutenant governors. If you are interested let me know. Requirements include experience as a past Kiwanis club president or secretary and the willingness to help Kiwanians and clubs. Last summer Kiwanis International approved a policy allowing lieutenant governors to serve in divisions other than their home division. So, if a neighboring division near you needs a lieutenant governor and you are willing to serve, let us know. We also need people to assist Bob Lambert increase membership this year. Increased membership will help support and grow existing clubs, and will build new clubs. If you are interested let me or the KT District office know.

There are abundant and excellent opportunities in November and December to serve the children. It is easier during the Thanksgiving and Christmas seasons to find things we can do to help them. Include what you do in your monthly reports and send articles and pictures of your activities to the *KT Notes*. Send me some pictures and you may appear on the KT District website. Invite me to help with your projects.

As we work on our projects this year, remember we need people to volunteer their help; so tell people about Kiwanis and invite them to join. The more members we have the more service we can provide. We need to work hard on our service projects to improve things as if the world depended on it....because the world **IS** depending on us to provide our service!

MEMBER SPOTLIGHT ON Sue Fleschner



Sue Fleschner, a Bowling Green (Kentucky) Kiwanian is a person who believes strongly in helping others — a volunteer with the energy and enthusiasm of two or three Kiwanians. Sue was born in Cleveland, Ohio the fourth of five children. Her two brothers and two sisters are leading successful lives in North Carolina and Ohio and all have children.

Sue owes much to her mother and credits her with setting a positive example for her family. Her mother was a homemaker and an active volunteer for her church and community. She was the person who guided Sue to be the kind of person she is today. Sadly, her mother passed away at the age of 44 when Sue was only 13 years old. Sue learned many important

lessons from her mother in those 13 years. Sue's father, who was also a great role model, owned a small manufacturing business and in spite of poor health he continued to work well beyond the usual retirement age. He retired two years before he passed away at the age of 89.

Sue attended school in Highland Heights, a suburb of Cleveland. She was an excellent student who had a special interest in music. Her teachers and principal found her to be capable, reliable and responsible and because of these and other attributes she was given the job of working in her elementary school office at lunchtime. During her high school years, she obtained her first job, working at Woolworth's Department Store. She also volunteered in a hospital, was active in theater, and she sang in the A Capella choir and the swing choir. She was an honor student who was invited to join the *National Honor Society*. In her senior year in high school she was elected Homecoming Queen. With her mother's death she assumed added responsibilities for taking care of her family and their home.

After high school graduation Sue decided to move to Michigan, searching for a new life. Michigan and Ohio had an agreement that made it possible for higher education students from each state to attend college in the other state without paying out-of-state tuition. She was accepted by Eastern Michigan State University where she worked her way through school as a residence hall advisor and as a waitress in a Greek restaurant (she loves Greek food), earning a Bachelor's degree in communication technology. She was also invited to pledge Alpha Gamma Delta Sorority. Involved in all these activities, Sue continued to be active in her church.

Working at a variety of jobs Sue continued her education at Oakland University where she earned her Master's degree in counseling. In her employment various businesses were her clients as she designed and developed training programs for employees, and worked with business leaders to ensure effective organizational change. Finally, over a period of 10 years of taking classes and working at her job, she earned her Doctor of Philosophy degree (PhD) at Wayne State University.

While she was finishing the requirements for her PhD degree, Drew, the first of her two children was born. She has one son and one daughter. Drew is now a student at Full Sail University (Orlando, Florida) taking courses on-line and majoring in graphic design. Alyssa Is a student at Murray State University (Kentucky) where she plans to earn a Bachelor of Science degree in veterinary technology. Sue is justifiably and immensely proud of her children who have been very supportive, accompanying her to Kiwanis conventions and conferences. She calls them "real troopers" and says "they are Kiwanians at heart."

A job transfer took her to Bowling Green and it was there, in 2007, that she began a unique professional arrangement. Arriving with 10 years of experience in higher education, she was able to acquire a part time position in the Communications Department at Western Kentucky University. Sue felt especially blessed, being able to continue her own consulting firm – OD Solutions – while at the university.

Her career made possible the opportunity to be self-employed, work out of a home office, to be available to her precious children, and to later serve as an active member of Kiwanis. Invited to speak to Bowling Green Kiwanis about a mission trip to Nepal, she was invited to join that club and in 2009 Sue became a Kiwanian.



Sue has served Kiwanis in many ways. She was elected to serve on her club's board of directors. She became involved in various service activities and because of her service, she has been honored with a number of awards. She served as the Western Kentucky University Circle K advisor and Greenwood High School Key Club advisor. Finding other ways to contribute, as Coordinator and Advocate and as a major donor, she has traveled across the KT District, motivating Kiwanians in their support of the ELIMINATE (MNT) Project. As part of that involvement she was invited to join the Kiwanis-UNICEF delegation, traveling to Haiti to visit MNT vaccination clinics in that country. It was on that trip that she began to understand the importance and effectiveness of Kiwanis leadership in saving the lives of women and children. She has served as KT Kiwanis Children's Fund chairperson. She is a Dr. Wil Blechman Fellow, a Kiwanis Founders Circle and a John E. Mayfield Legacy Society member. In addition to her Kiwanis involvement, she continues to be involved in volunteer work serving on the St. Vincent DePaul Store board in Bowling Green.




