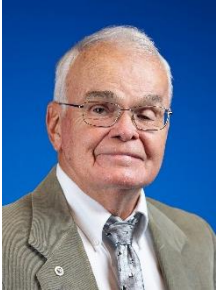

PAST GOVERNOR KEN CLAWSON PASSED AWAY



We are saddened to report that Past Governor Ken Clawson passed away on April 21, 2023. Ken was a member of the Kiwanis Club of Richmond (Kentucky) which he joined in 1964 and he was KT District governor during the 2001-2002 administrative year.

If you knew Ken, you know he loved to talk to people. He was a mentor to and encourager of many Kiwanians as well as of many people in his community and in his church. He was retired from the education profession and was a public-

school teacher and a public-school administrator. He was a scholar with an earned doctorate and was a college professor and administrator. When he retired from Eastern Kentucky University he was a university dean; but above all, Ken was a teacher.

In the eulogy at his funeral he was highly praised as a leader, a hard worker and a man of his word. Whatever the cause he agreed with, whatever responsibilities he assumed, (and he assumed many responsibilities), he was a committed person. Those of us who knew him realize how much those characteristics also described him and his involvement in Kiwanis.



Ken and Bobbie were married for 64 years, and she was committed to him and the Kiwanis he loved. It was a rare KT District Convention and Mid -Year Conference that did not find the two of them in attendance, working on projects, going to meetings, greeting, and talking to new and old friends. They both had many friends who loved them as much as they loved those friends. This picture shows them at one of the last conventions they attended.



We are all left with many memories of Ken Clawson. He will be missed, but because of the impact he has had on so many people and because he was here, the world will be a little better place in which to live. Thanks, Ken. Rest in peace.

MEMBER SPOTLIGHT ON Terrell Horne



Terrell Horne, is a past governor (1998-1999) of the Kentucky-Tennessee District of Kiwanis and a member of the Oak Ridge, (Tennessee) Kiwanis club. He is one of our oldest surviving past governors. It is safe to assume that he may have forgotten more than many of us can remember, but we discovered during our interview that he has a marvelous memory of the past.

Terrell's parents had to deal with adversity. His father was a banker in Florida where Terrell was born, but the Great Depression of the late 1920s and the 1930s changed his father's life when the bank where he worked closed. He moved his family to Americus, Georgia where he found a job managing a family lumber company. Terrell's mother was a housewife whose father was a farmer, and was later elected mayor of Americus. Terrell was one of three children; he had a sister and a brother. Growing up in Americus he knew Jimmy Carter before he was elected President of the United States, although Terrell says he didn't know him very well. His brother, however, was good friends with the future president. Terrell was quick to say that his family had no political involvement or influence with the Carter administration.



During the years Terrell attended Americus high school, students in that school graduated at the end of the eleventh year rather than the end of the twelfth year. He was an athlete playing on the football team, the basketball team and running track. He was active in the Boy Scout Troop in the community, achieving the rank of Eagle Scout at the highest level. Before he graduated from high school he was voted "*Mr. Americus*," and being a student who took his classes seriously, he graduated from high school with highest honors.

Terrell's wife, Connie also claimed Americus, Georgia as her home town. Her father was a pharmacist and he moved his family to Americus where he had bought a drugstore. When Terrell saw Connie for the first time he thought she was magnificent and the one for him. He courted this beautiful lady and they were happily married in 1951 in the Americus Methodist church. Today, 72 years later, they are still happily married.

Terrell and Connie had four children – they lost two and two survive. Their oldest surviving son, Terry, lives in Florida, and is a retired vice president of the Dictaphone Corporation. Amy (Thompson) resides in Oak Ridge and is retired from Bechtel National, Inc. as Administrative Services Manager. There have been 10 grandchildren and 16 great grandchildren. Terrell and Connie lost two grandsons. One was a victim of lung cancer, and the other (Terrell III) was a chief petty officer serving on a Coast Guard Cutter when he lost his life in the line of duty while intercepting smugglers. Terrell and Connie still grieve with the loss of both grandsons, and Terrell has great difficulty telling the story of Terrell III. As a result of his heroism, the Coast Guard commissioned the *USCGC Terrell Horne* in his honor, an honor of which Terrell is especially proud.

This Oak Ridge Kiwanian was from a Georgia Tech (*Georgia Institute of Technology*) family and he, therefore, knew from the very beginning where he would go to college. In the early 1940s Terrell entered Georgia Tech, graduating four years later with a Bachelor of Science degree (B.S.) in Engineering and Industrial Management. Except for one quarter when he went out for the wrestling team, he did not try out for any of the Georgia Tech athletic teams. Instead, he signed up for the Reserve Officer Training Corps program (ROTC). As it turned out that was a fortunate decision that affected the rest of his life. He completed that four-year program, earning a commission as a second lieutenant in the United States Air Force.

MEMBER SPOTLIGHT-CONTINUED

Graduating from Georgia Tech, he went on active duty with the Air Force and as it would turn out, he continued on active duty until he retired from the service. Early in his tour, he applied for flight school and was accepted. In his flight training at Enid, Oklahoma, he learned to fly the B-26, a combat ready bomber. He became such a skilled pilot that eventually he was assigned to duty as a flight instructor. He was an exemplary officer and a few years later, he was assigned to the Army War College in Carlisle, Pennsylvania. It was an assignment that resulted from a recognition of Terrell's superior contributions to the Air Force.

Terrell had many work and training experiences while serving for 27 years in the Air Force, moving his family to 14 different locations. Receiving his Wings in the early 1960s, he was sent to Viet Nam for the first of two combat tours in the Viet Nam War. His military career offered several opportunities for training and advancement, Earning a degree in Aeronautical Engineering. Additionally, during his military career he earned a second B.S. degree in Engineering from the Air Force Institute of Technology and a Master of Science degree in Business Administration from George Washington University.

In both of his professions, one as an Air Force officer and the other as a civilian working at the Atomic Energy Plant at Oak Ridge, Tennessee, Terrell held a wide range of jobs, experiences and managerial responsibilities at the highest levels. While serving as a pilot with combat experience, he had many challenges and a few close calls, but he feels that he is very fortunate to have not had any bad accidents. After his second tour in Vietnam, he was scheduled to be assigned to a base near Honolulu, but for some reason that assignment did not materialize. Instead, he was sent to the Pentagon

Terrell retired from the Air Force with the rank of full colonel. Returning to civilian life he again worked in the Pentagon, although briefly, but Terrell and Connie wanted to live closer to Georgia and this desire was fulfilled when the already mentioned job opportunity at the Atomic Energy plant in Oak Ridge materialized. He moved his family to Tennessee, working at Oak Ridge several years before retiring for the second time.

Joining Kiwanis at a very young age, Terrell had an unusual Kiwanis membership experience. His father was a Kiwanian and with his encouragement, Terrell joined the Kiwanis Club in Americus in 1951. When he went on active military duty and living in so many different locations, he was given a leave of absence by the Americus club. Years later (1981), with the encouragement and invitation of a friend, he joined the Oak Ridge Kiwanis Club. Not surprisingly, it wasn't long before he was asked to assume positions of leadership. He served as president and had a distinguished year and he was a distinguished lieutenant governor of Division 4. He served on a number of committees and he was a charter member of the Kentucky Tennessee Kiwanis District Foundation. In 1998 he was elected Governor of the Kentucky-Tennessee District of Kiwanis. Terrell's contributions and leadership in Kiwanis and his profound interest in determining ways to increase membership, have been recognized by his fellow Kiwanians, and he has been the recipient of many Kiwanis achievement awards.



The communities in which he has lived, particularly Oak Ridge, have been fortunate in having Terrell as a resident. Terrell has contributed to his community, making many contributions as a volunteer and leader, and his church has also benefited from his volunteer leadership service.

Terrell, throughout his life, has been an active and involved person. Asked about his hobbies, he responded, *"At the age of 94 and to be 95 in October, with macular degeneration, difficulty hearing and needing a walker to move from place to place, I spend a lot of time sitting in a chair."* Our response to that is – good for you; well-done Terrell Horne. After all he has done for Kiwanis, children, his community, the country, and the world, he deserves to rest for a while; but we would guess he is still thinking about things that can be done to grow Kiwanis membership and to make the world a better place (After interviewing Terrell and after writing this article, Terrell suffered a bad accident and as this additional note is being written, he is recovering in a Tennessee hospital; details can be found elsewhere in this issue of the KT Notes).

PROJECTS DONE IN CLUB MEETINGS

The club is already planning their next in-meeting project with the *Domestic Violence Shelter*.

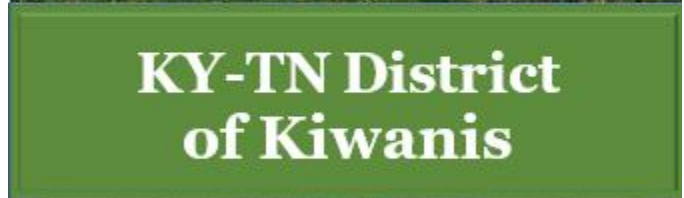
