MEMBER SPOTLIGHT ON Jim Gazay

Jim Gazay will be the 2023-2024 Governor of the Kentucky-Tennessee District of Kiwanis. He is a member of the Kiwanis Club of West Liberty (Kentucky). His father was an electrician in the coal mines and his mother



was a housewife. Although his parents lived in Breathitt County, his mother decided to give birth to Jim at a clinic in adjacent Morgan County. Breathitt County is where Jim grew up and went to school. The family lived in a house with no electricity or running water. From previous marriages, there were three older brothers and one sister. When Jim was two years old, his father died and he was raised as an only child by his mother.

According to Jim, in his early years he was a handful. He would run off from the house to be out in the woods by himself where he liked to camp and fish. His mother or another family member would have to go into the woods to find him and bring him to the house.

There were two contrasting sides to his school experiences. In elementary school, his grades were low. He was a student who was not doing well academically. Entering Breathitt County High School, he wanted to play baseball, and to be eligible for the team, he was required to enroll in an advanced English Literature class. His reputation preceded him and the students in that class wondered what he was doing there. Jim surprised everyone with his knowledge of the subject and the quality of his academic performance, and for the first time in school, he earned an "A." That teacher, and later another teacher, made all the difference in his life and when he graduated from high school he did so with an excellent academic standing. He was recognized for his scholarship and was the recipient of a special Social Science Award. By the way, he never did pursue his desire to be on the baseball team.

Deciding that he was not ready for college, during his junior year in high school Jim enlisted in the U.S. Navy through a delayed entry program. Called to active duty after high school graduation he was sent to the Great Lakes Naval Recruit Training Center near Chicago, Illinois. Following boot camp, he was given the first of two brief assignments assisting Navy recruiters to raise students' interest in joining the Navy.

If he joined the Navy to see the world: it worked. He was assigned to telecommunications school in San Diego, California. He went to a submarine base at Charleston, South Carolina. He was on ships sent to such locations as Bahrain, Iraq, Libya and Spain. Completing his first enlistment, he left the Navy to attend Miami University of Ohio for two years. He then re-enlisted and while he was on active duty completed college, earning a Bachelor of Science degree with a major in Sociology.

Jim had many challenging experiences in the Navy. Perhaps some of them could qualify as being exciting but most certainly they were all serious. Early in his second enlistment he was assigned to an aircraft carrier that had been converted and restructured from what once had been a battleship. That restructuring may have saved his life. The carrier was involved in a collision with an oil tanker which penetrated the outer structure of his ship. The outer structure that had been added prevented the tanker from penetrating the inner structure. If the inner structure had been penetrated his ship probably would have sunk.

When the United States was experiencing conflict with the Libyan dictator, Muammar Gaddafi and his terrorists, Jim's ship along with other U.S. Navy ships faced a confrontation created by the Soviet Union. Although the Soviets decided not to pursue the conflict, it was a tense and dangerous time.

Lisa, Jim's wife, was also serving in the Navy. She was a mission planner and served 21 years. She and Jim met on one of their assignments and he asked her for a date, but she declined his request. Jim is not one who gives up easily and at a later time, Lisa decided that our next KT governor just might be one of the good guys. She became interested in him and the rest is history. They married, but then, she was assigned to another part of the world and they were separated for a year.

Jim's leadership earned a promotion to Chief Petty Officer (E-7). He had been on active duty for 15 years, felt it was time to leave the Navy, and therefore, turned down the promotion, applying for an early release. Leaving active duty, he continued as a civilian employee for the Navy and later for the Army.

Returning to civilian life, Jim and Lisa located in West Liberty (Morgan County). Adjustment to civilian life was difficult following his intense and sometimes dangerous experiences. A friend who was also a military retiree understood what was happening to Jim, and he suggested that Jim join Kiwanis. Accepting the invitation, Jim found that Kiwanis helped him make a positive adjustment to civilian life.

During his travels to different countries, Jim had seen many tragic situations involving children and with a feeling of compassion, Kiwanis appealed to him. As is often the case with new members who demonstrate leadership skills, he was soon elected president of the club. While he was president, the lieutenant governor of Division 16 resigned. Jim was asked to complete the lieutenant governor's term. The result was that Jim simultaneously served as both club president and lieutenant governor of his Division. His abilities were obvious to other Kiwanians and exhibiting quality leadership skills he was elected to a second term as lieutenant governor of Division 16.

As a lieutenant governor Jim began to understand the Kentucky-Tennessee District mission, and that convinced him to become actively involved at the district level. His lieutenant governor visits to other clubs enhanced his understanding of Kiwanis . He became acquainted with Kiwanians in other clubs and he liked the kind of people Kiwanians are. Serving on several committees including the *Strategic Planning Committee*, his involvement was deepened and strengthened. He became a member of the KT District Foundation, eventually becoming Foundation president. He then decided to run for vice governor, was elected, and he is now the Kentucky-Tennessee District Governor-Elect. On October 1, 2023 he will begin serving as KT District governor.

Jim has been involved in so many ways in his community, and he maintains a very active and busy schedule. He has served on a number of church committees and he serves as a lay pastor of his church. During the terrible tornados of 2012 he worked tirelessly to help his community recover from the horrific damage inflicted by those events. His community involvement led him to decide to run for County Judge Executive of Morgan County. His first campaign failed by only 238 votes. He decided to run a second time; he won by 600 votes. At the time of this writing he is the County Judge Executive of Morgan County and we believe that in that

capacity he has brought positive changes to his community. Always a humble man, he credits others with much of what has been accomplished, but clearly, he is responsible for those changes and he works tirelessly for the people of his county.

As we approach the 2023-2024 Kiwanis administrative year we look forward to Jim's tenure as governor of the KT District. We predict that he will bring the same dedication and energy to the KT District that he has brought to his previous positions. With the fulfillment of that prediction, the KT District will continue to grow

in membership, and Jim Gazay will work tirelessly for children and communities in the KT District.





That statement does not always bring smiles and shouts of joy from students. Many children no longer have the opportunity of receiving two meals a day. The *Weekend Food for Kids Program* also stops over the summer. But, the need remains to help many of our area's children.

Tellico Working Together (TWT), an organization of local churches and Tellico Village civic groups were determined to help alleviate the food insecurity many local families face. The TWT group decided to contribute \$3,000, and they devised a plan to do just that. The funds were used to purchase ingredients to create 10,000 pasta meals.

On May 31, 2023, 45 volunteers packaged 10,400 pasta meals in less than one and a half hours. The packaged meals were distributed to the Family Resource Centers in Lenoir City, Loudon County and Monroe County.

BUDDY BENCHES ARE APPEARING "EVERYWHERE"

Buddy Benches are appearing throughout the East Tennessee Counties of Loudon, Blount and Monroe. The Tellico Village Kiwanis *Buddy Bench* Project began in the summer of 2019. Buddy Benches were invented to combat loneliness and bullying in schools. Sometimes called a friendship bench, these benches are provided on school playgrounds as a way for students to signal to others that they are feeling lonely and isolated and need a friend to play with or someone to talk to.

This is how the *Buddy Bench* project proceeded. On May 11, Kevin Meyer, Tellico Village Kiwanis member and *Buddy Bench* project coordinator delivered benches numbers 27, 28 and 29. Two benches



were delivered to the *Good Neighbors Shoppe* in Lenoir City. Bench number 29 went to Eagleton College and Career Academy in Maryville. The Builders Club of Eagleton College collected 200 pounds of plastic and contributed half of the cost. The Kiwanis Club of Maryville covered the remaining cost. On Thursday, June 8, Kevin delivered three more benches; bringing the total to 32. Tellico Village Library sponsored bench number 30. Bench number 31 was delivered to Cherokee Bluff, Loudon and number 32 went to Timber Ridge in Loudon. Cherokee Bluff and Timber Ridge are established affordable housing developments.

This information might be useful in understanding what is involved in the *Buddy Bench* project. It takes 200 pounds of unrecyclable plastic caps and lids to make one Buddy Bench. Kevin Meyer, collects, sorts, and weighs the plastic. He then brings the materials to Green Tree Plastics in Evansville, IN. The plastic is converted into a "Buddy Bench" via an extrusion process. Green Tree Plastics produces the benches using 100 percent of the plastic, with no hazardous chemicals, non-organic fillers, non-organic color concentrates added. Kevin waits for the finished benches and drives back to Tellico Village the same day. A round trip takes approximately 11 hours.
