

Kiwanis Club of Athens, Tennessee, Bags Groceries to Support United Way



Members of the Kiwanis Club of Athens, Tennessee, are used to serving food to raise money. But they've also proven to be good at bagging it.

Athens Kiwanians again participated in the 17th Annual United Way Celebrity Bagging Event hosted by Food City. During the event, always held on the Tuesday prior to Thanksgiving, teams of local "celebrities" bag groceries in onehour shifts throughout the day to support the local United Way serving their store's community. Patrons are encouraged to provide "tips," all of which supports United Way's efforts in various communities across East Tennessee, northern Georgia and Alabama, and southwestern Virginia.

Since 2018 when the Athens store opened, the Athens store has been the number one or number two store for fundraising out of the more than 30 stores that compete each year. The Athens Kiwanis Club team has always been the top team at the Athens store, always raising more than \$1,000 in tips within the hour, all of which pairs with the



tips of other teams at the Athens store to support the United Way of McMinn & Meigs Counties, which supports a variety of children-centric programs that are also supported by the Kiwanis Club of Athens, Tennessee, including the McMinn County Imagination Library and Athens-Mc-Minn Family YMCA, among other organizations and causes.

In addition to the eight Kiwanians serving on the Athens Kiwanis team, other Kiwanians also participate as members of other teams competing throughout the day, which greatly increases the Athens Kiwanis Club's overall impact in raising funds for this vital community effort. More than 20 Kiwanians from the Athens club are involved in both the planning and execution of the event and as baggers, meaning Kiwanis makes up more than one third of the communitywide group that comes together to make the event happen each year and raise more than \$7,000 for the local United Way.

Signs of Child Abuse

Department for Community Based Services staff are tasked with making a variety of decisions impacting children and youth, from whether a report meets acceptance criteria for child welfare intervention to determining the finding of an allegation of abuse, neglect or dependency. As well as decisions in active cases such as removals, placements changes, and reunifications. These decisions are guided by various processes and regulations, some of which have changed recently. This session will provide an overview of Kentucky's Safety Model, including review of new Structured Decision-Making tools, acceptance criteria, and other recent regulatory changes. Participants will better understand DCBS protocols and signs around child maltreatment and what it means to be a community supporter and a mandatory reporter.
