JONI'S PLAYGROUND DEDICATION

"Joni's Playground" in the Armory Park, in Richmond, KY, was dedicated on Saturday, April 27 in honor of Joan Kleine, a longtime Richmond teacher and Kiwanian. More than 75 adults attended the event while more than a dozen children played in "Joni's Playground."

Dr. James 'Kirby' Easterling, a professor of Business at Eastern Kentucky University (EKU), and the 2024-2025 President of the Kiwanis Club of Richmond served as the Master of Ceremonies for the event.

Richmond Mayor Robert Blythe, a former fellow teacher with Joan Kleine and fellow Kiwanian, was the Keynote speaker. He said he frequently enjoyed visiting the park and watching children play in the playground in unique ways.

Kevin Zachary, Lt. Governor of Division 9 (Central Kentucky) of the Kentucky-Tennessee District of Kiwanis International, told of Joni's Kiwanis leadership as a two time President of the Kiwanis Club of Richmond and a two time Division 9 Lt. Governor. He observed that when Joni was the First Lady of the Kentucky-Tennessee District in 2009-2010, she and her husband, Gov. Glen Kleine, traveled more than 10,000 miles in the district visiting Kiwanis Clubs and Division meetings. She was know by third grade students in Richmond as the BUG Lady for starting and building up BUG (Bringing Up Grades) programs in four elementary schools in Madison County.

The last person to speak at the dedication ceremony was Christina Cornelison, the Director of the Madison County Public Library. She discusses the role that Joni played as a member of the Madison County Public Library Board and announced that A STEM creative lab for children, to explore both the arts as well as science, technology, engineering, and mathematics would be dedicated as the "Joan Kleine Creative Studio," at 2 pm on Saturday, August 24, at the Madison County Public Library, at 319 Chestnut Ave, in Berea, KY.

Joni was a retired teacher who taught science in the Madison County schools for most of her teaching career. She had supported the development of a grant proposal for A STEM creative lab while she was a library board member. It wasn't until after her death that the grant was approved. Subsequently the library board unanimously approve the naming of this creative studio in Joni's name.

At the beginning of the dedication program Dr. Glen Kleine, Joni's husband and past Governor of the KY-TN District, thanked the city leaders for naming the the playground in honor of Joni, thanked individuals who wrote letters of support to the city, thanked those who made donations toward the playground via Kiwanis and to the creative studio via the library. And he also thanked everyone for attending the dedication ceremony.

SPRINGFIELD DEDICATES SKATE PARK

March 8, 2024 was a proud day for the Kiwanis Club of Springfield, TN as a signature project seven and a half years in the making became a reality. A 6,000 sf, all-concrete skateboard park was opened to the public at Garner Street Park in the historic district of Springfield and brought boarding enthusiasts from near and far to enjoy the new recreational facility.

The park was built through a partnership between the Kiwanis Club and the City of Springfield Parks and Recreation Department and is the only skate board park in Robertson County. The idea began with the decision of the Kiwanis Club Board of Directors in September, 2016 to concentrate effort on creating a signature project that would become a lasting legacy of the club in the community and make an impact on the children and youth of Springfield.

At the suggestion of then club president Margot Fosnes, the Board voted to form a committee and look into the possibility of building a skate park to provide a much-needed alternative to team sports activities. Fosnes had seen the number of youth skateboarding in the downtown area and the resistance of businesses and property owners to let them skate on their sidewalks and ramps. The committee eventually recommended that the club pledge \$50,000 towards the project, to be raised through their traditional events like the annual golf tournament and Pancake Breakfast as well as through asking for direct donations to the project from individuals and businesses in the community.



SPRINGFIELD DEDICATES SKATE PARK

The project took a huge step forward when Parks and Recreation Director Terry Martin agreed that a skate park would be a great addition to the renovations being planned for the city's Garner Street Park in the heart of the historic district near downtown. With a location and matching funds offered by the City of Springfield, planning ramped into high gear. Local skateboard enthusiast and entrepreneur Adam Heffner, owner of Maker Table, a metal fabricating shop in Springfield, offered his support and expertise in the planning and advocated for an all-concrete build rather than a less expensive wood and concrete design. Heffner connected our committee and the city with Hunger Skate Parks, a design/build firm out of Indiana, and their advice convinced us that a concrete facility was both feasible and affordable.

With a new goal in place fundraising efforts intensified. A \$15,000 grant was received from The SkatePark Project, a non-profit founded by Tony Hawk to encourage the expansion of skateboarding accessibility. An anonymous

donor provided a challenge grant of \$40,000 which helped push efforts close enough to the goal to move forward with a contract and the pledge of additional club funds to meet the budget. In all, Kiwanis of Springfield raised a total of \$166,100 through fundraising events and partner donations and grants while the City of Springfield raised their match to \$53,900 to meet the \$220,000 goal. In-kind donations of steel from Maker Table, crushed rock from Vulcan Materials, equipment from Thompson Machinery, and sod from A & W Sod helped lower the cash cost so that a larger and more challenging design could be built. A one of a kind "wave" sculpture was also created and donated by Adam Heffner and Maker Table, adding a unique element to the park.

Since the grand opening, the park has seen a steady stream of skateboarders of all ages enjoying the facility and we look forward to hosting a competition and exhibition in early summer to further promote the park and potentially raise interest in securing funding for future expansion.



BUILDING AMTRYKES

With our lovely spring getting ready to switch to summer, it is happiness watching the kids out and about on their bikes and trykes.

Some children with mobility/balance issues used to not be able to join their siblings and friends riding bicycles around the neighborhood- thanks to the partnership with Kiwanis Club of Lexington Blue Grass and Bluegrass Ambucs over the last few years, that dynamic is changing.

We work with Ambucs (the group that trains physical therapists to fit kids for their bikes and trykes, matches families to the bikes and trykes, and then assembles the bikes and trykes) by assisting with building the bikes, and covering the cost of several bikes each year.

Bikes were presented on May 11, 2024 by Tom Bunch, Peter Gerdom & his wife, Gary Hoover, Shawn Tower, Darryl Stith, and Edye Bryant. The bikes are finely tuned by Ambucs Members, and the kids therapists once the kids get their bikes.

One of the younger girls was receiving her 2nd bike - she had outgrown the first one, and it was reused for another child.

My favorite part of the day was watching a set of brothers (aged 3, and 5), racing each other - the 5 year old on his new tryke, and the 3 year old on his regular tryke.



BOTTLE CAP BENCH PROJECT

Maryville Kiwanis Club members met on March 21 with Heritage Middle School Principal Josh Tidwell, along with Builders Club Co-advisors Melanie Duncan and Lara Vananda, and Patsy Russell, Maryville Kiwanis Builders Club advisor for HMS, and the members of HMS Builders Club. The students collected over 200 lbs. of bottle caps and lids and funded 50% of the bench project cost.

This bench is dedicated in honor of Patsy Russell who taught science for 2 years at Eagleton Middle School before helping open the new Heritage Middle School in 2000. She taught 8th grade science at HMS for 12 years and was the Builders Club Faculty Sponsor. Patsy has been a member of Maryville Kiwanis since 2012, served as club President 2016-2017, and currently serves as Lt. Governor of Division 5 in the Kentucky-Tennessee District of Kiwanis.

The bench project is a continuing effort coordinated by Maryville Kiwanis Club President Wanda Davis and the Kiwanis Club of Tellico Village President Kevin Meyer. This is the 50th bench Kevin has worked to have created throughout east Tennessee and the 6th one with Maryville Kiwanis.

AMTRYKE: A THERAPEUTIC TRICYCLE PROJECT

The Kiwanis Club of Maryville presented an Amtryke specifically made for him to 7-year-old Regal Toledo this week during their weekly meeting. Regal has physical and speech disabilities which severely limit his mobility. His parents, Manuel and Wendy Toledo and nurse therapist Shawn Megahan asked the Maryville Kiwanis Club for help. Regal's Amtryke can be adapted in many ways for seating and positioning of his head and body to insure a proper fit.

The Kiwanis Club of Maryville tries to help meet therapeutic needs of children with disabilities whose families are unable to afford this expensive equipment. An Amtryke is a therapeutic tricycle for children aged 18 and younger who are living with physical and developmental disabilities affecting their motor skills and strength. Maryville Kiwanians gain satisfaction by helping one more child, one more family, to live a better life in our community.

The Maryville Kiwanis Foundation paid for the cost of the Amtryke with funds raised through an anonymous donation and by the club's annual Charity Golf Tournament and Pancake Breakfast. A committee headed by Jerry Heiny with Steve Kiefer, Kent Willoughby, Robert Russell, Bob Ullom and Pete Davis put the Amtryke together.

Amtryke, established in 1994, is a company owned and operated by National AMBUCS, Inc. a nonprofit charitable organization which is dedicated to creating mobility and independence for people with disabilities.
