IT'S TIME TO HELP THE DISTRICT OFFICE By: P R Cook

"It's Time" was my theme for the year I served as Governor of the District. I have brought it back to life for this article. If you are reading this article, you have probably been responsible for getting a group together for a service project, for a dinner outing, for an outing for your church or for work. I want you to think back to that time and consider the difficulty in getting others to commit, send in the appropriate paperwork and show up for the event.

The District office has already spent several hours obtaining a site, visiting the site, going over details of the event for each day and preparing the convention issue to inform us of activities at our District Convention. We have the opportunity to be of assistance by getting our hotel reservations, completing our registrations, completing our Delegate certification on time and then showing up for the Convention.

The dates of this Convention were made available to our membership last year at our convention. Yet few of us entered that date on our phones so we could make sure we made our club members aware of the dates to help ensure that our Club would be represented. I understand emergencies do happen which must be handled and may affect our ability to attend our Convention, but recording the dates on our calendar early will help us avoid making other arrangements during convention time. Then, when the registration information is sent out, we can complete it and send it back to the District office. The early registration helps the office to make sure that minimums in the contract with the hotel are being covered.

There is a limited number of rooms the hotels will hold for us and there is a cutoff date involved. If you wait till after that date, you may not be able to stay at the Convention Hotel. Staying at the Convention Hotel makes it convenient to attend the activities lined up for the event. I realize members may belong to a Hotel chain program other than the Convention Hotel and you can get points or use points by staying with them and I understand that. But, staying at the Convention Hotel makes it easier to work with the hotel and to meet minimum requirements under the contract.

By completing your delegate certification prior to the convention, the District office is able to prepare the delegate book prior to the convention and make it easier to check delegates in as they register.

Please check out the May edition of Q and A. Information in that publication is provided to place an ad in the Convention program. This is a great opportunity to recognize a Club member for their contribution to your Club, to recognize a deceased member, etc. Advertising in the program helps offset printing costs and helps the overall Convention budget.

The May Q and A also reminds us to get our election reports completed on the dashboard. Doing so will be a great help to the District office. It's Time to help and Show Up!

Ashland woman is a Kiwanis pioneer

ASHLAND, Ky. — For about a year, Cynthia Champer has been attending meetings of the Ashland Kiwanis Breakfast as a guest. From now on, she will attend them as Kentucky's first female Kiwanis member.

Champer, who works in sales for a Huntington, W. Va. school supply company, was inducted into the formerly all-male club on Tuesday.

Last Thursday, attorney Suzanne Weddle was installed as a Glasgow Rotary Club member. She is believed to be the first female Rotarian in Kentucky.

Delegates to the Kiwanis' international convention last week voted to end the 72-year men-only tradition of the organization. Rotary International will take up the issue next year.

Champer said decisions by service clubs to allow women members would help women "feel more accepted for all business and professional organizations."

This article may contain sensitive material that causes a tug at your heartstrings. It's about child abuse; emotional abuse, physical abuse, and sexual abuse. "Oh my goodness, not in Kiwanis!" No, but we must make sure it doesn't happen to any of the 300,000 children we serve.

How many times have you heard, "He/ she was a perfectly good neighbor, never caused any trouble or acted weird?" "Or he/ she was so kind to the children, always helping and giving them rides to events." These are typical statements we don't like to talk about or even think about.

But fellow Kiwanians, it can happen.



All it takes is one terrible episode to ruin a child's life and the effectiveness of Kiwanis. To help prevent any negative events or even negative thoughts Kiwanis International is providing training to keep children and Kiwanis safe.

The presentation on child protection should be given to each Kiwanian. Included in these points are education, chaperones, criminal history background checks, overnight stays, transportation, medication, alcoholic beverages, tobacco, and marijuana, reporting, personal performance, youth and social media, behavior or social issues, and when rules conflict.

The one thing each Kiwanian can do, even before attending the training, is to have the background check. Many of us have had a background check in the past and feel it is unnecessary for another. Most checks are only for the state in which we live. Well, the Kiwanis background check is on the international level. If a Kiwanian has been connected with any abusive event anywhere in the world, it will show up. The report will indicate clear or not clear and will only be seen by the secretary.

Everyone should want to get the background check; however, it is only expected of the Kiwanians directly working in any SLP program and Aktion club. The cost is 35.00 which can be paid by the club if they so desire or by the individuals. The background check will be valid for two years.

At this time there are no club penalties for not getting all background checks. It is however, probable insurance premiums could rise significantly if background checks are not done.
