- 1. CALL TO ORDER: Shawn -- Club meeting at 12.05
- 2. MINUTES: Approval of the minutes for the Club Board meeting of August 2024: Shawn moved approval and Curt seconded, which was given without dissent.
- 3. FINANCIAL REPORT: There was some discussion of line 1144 and how it will be updated at the end of this FY. There also was a question about whether we currently have a Lt. Governor (with the associational expenses.). It seems we do not, but Derek V will contact PNW Kiwanis to see what lies ahead for this position. It also was asked where we stand on member's payment of dues for FY 24-25. Jonathan said that 38 had paid to this date. This tracks with what has happened in past years, when many will pay at the end of September. There are some resignations, but not many.

Following this conversation, Charles moved and Shawn seconded that the report be approved, which was given without dissent.

- 4. SECRETARY'S REPORT: KCO membership remains at 104. Charles has submitted monthly reports through August for FY 23-24, as required by KI. There has been no response. He has followed the same procedure as outlined in the minutes for our meeting in July.
- 5. BUDGET: Shawn moved and Karen seconded that the proposed budget be approved, which was given without dissent.
- 6. INSTALLATION: This event on October 3rd at Olympia High School is well underway, with the promise of good attendance. There was some discussion about timing for when the silent auction is closed.
- 7. OPEN FLOOR. Open floor. No items raised. Next Meeting: Date and time to be determined. Shawn adjourned the club meeting at 12:31.



- 1, Call to Order: Shawn -- Foundation meeting at 12:31.
- 2. MINUTES: Approval of the minutes for the Foundation Board meeting of August 2024: Moved and seconded by Shawn and Curt for approval, which was given without dissent.
- 3. FINANCIAL: Review and Approval of Foundation Financial Reports as of August 31st, 2024: Moved and seconded by Karen and Shawn for approval, which was given without dissent.
- 4. BUDGET: Foundation Budget for FY 24-25: was reviewed. Karen moved and Shawn seconded that the proposed budget be approved, which was given without dissent.
- 5. NAMED SCHOLARSHIPS: Distinguished Kiwanians who have scholarships named after them are set in OKF policy 7D.

Olympia Kiwanis Foundation Scholarship Wayne Thomas Gruen

1939 - 2018



Wayne was born in Greenwell, Illinois and attended the University of Illinois earning a BS in Civil Engineering and a BA in Sociology. He went on to earn a Master's in Traffic Engineering and retired from the WSDOT as State Traffic Engineer in 1998. Most of the things Wayne accomplished in the Community were done jointly with his wife of 56 years, Carol. They worked together on many projects, including being ballot inspectors for the Thurston County Auditor's Office.

Wayne was a member of Olympia Kiwanis: 1984 - 2018, 35 years. He served as club president 2008-2009. He was also awarded the Kiwanis International Legion of Honor.

Wayne served as chair of the House Reception and Club Meetings Committee and as a member of, at least, four other Club committees. He worked on the Kiwanis Wood project for over 20 years. Wayne was a leader in the project with local Rotary and Lions clubs to procure and erect Service Club Entry signs at the major entrances to the City of Olympia.

Wayne contributed repeatedly to the Scholarship Endowment Fund. He sold vegetables at the Lacey Community Market to raise funds to support the Kiwanis gardens. He helped plan and manage the Casino Night Club fund raiser. He also served as a "Chef" for the Kiwanis roast beef booth at Lakefair, multiple years.

Wayne's contributions to the community extended beyond Kiwanis. He served as the Lay leader at the First United Methodist Church of Olympia and held or shared most of the leadership positions supporting the Church, including Bread and Roses, Camp Quixote and support to Rosie's Place. He chaired the Thurston County Hunger CROP walk for over 20 years. Wayne also served as a lead at the Olympia Community Kitchen (Catholic Community Services and Salvation Army) and worked on several Habitat houses. He served as a leader with Interfaith Works.

POLICIES OF THE OLYMPIA KIWANIS CLUB

May 2022

AP09: MEMBERSHIP EXPECTATIONS and RESPONSIBILITIES

- Attend and participate in at least one Club Committee activity per year.
- Participate in at least one service project activity per year.
- Attend as many weekly Club meetings as possible.
- Pay annual membership dues in full and on time.
- Honorary (free) membership status shall be reviewed annually by the Board.
- Encouraged to make an annual financial contribution (beyond dues) to a Club administrative or service project.

AP10: LEAVE OF ABSENCE

If a member will be absent for a period of 12 consecutive weeks or more, they may request a leave of absence from the Club prior to the absence. If the Board approves the request, the member will receive a \$2.00 per week credit toward future dues payments not to exceed local dues paid by the member.

Notification of any officer or Board member in writing, by e-mail or by phone will initiate the leave request and it will then be addressed at the next Board or Executive Committee meeting.

AP11: MEMBERSHIP DROP

Club policy is to give notice to members that their annual dues are due by October 1st of each year and then if unpaid, to give two more subsequent reminders of overdue dues in the last quarter of the calendar year. A person who has not paid their dues for a period of three months after they are due will be automatically dropped from Club membership.

AP12: USE OF MEMBERSHIP LISTS

Each club member is entitled to a membership directory that lists how to contact club members. This list is to be used for Club purposes and to encourage social interaction. Member's addresses and personal information shall not be used, given or sold for commercial or political uses.

HOW OUR GARDEN GROWS by James Wirth

This last month we were sowing cover crop, cleaning onions/ garlic, clearing more fields, and in true changing over of the summer season fashion harvesting tons of veggies. We are looking at sunny volunteer shifts this week with cooler temperatures in the high 60's, time to start breaking out the

Snaps this week go to the **Olympia Kiwanis Club** who started the garden project 34 years ago and who enable us through funding, garden committees, and so much more to keep our gardens going strong.

We had 37 volunteers this week and it shows with harvest numbers up to 1,583 lbs of crops for distribution through the Thurston County Food Bank.

We harvesting lots and lots of veggies! We are looking at a mixed bag of rain and sun.
