

## Olympia Kiwanis Foundation Scholarship Cortland Skinner 1913-2008

Cort Skinner was a 42 year member of Olympia Kiwanis and President in 1965-66. He also served as President of United Way and the South Sound Maritime Historical Society which founded the Harbor Days Tugboat Races. He was the Olympia Social Security Office Administrator and served as an Olympia Port Commission for two terms.

Cort was born in Spokane, Washington February 11, 1913 and graduated from Whitman College in Walla Walla in 1934. He joined the Federal Civil Service as a Junior Service Examiner, working for the Social Security Board in San Francisco, Fresno, Tacoma and Bellingham. In 1942 he became a



Commissioned Officer in the U.S. Navy and, subsequently, commander of a coastal minesweeper. He was especially proud of taking a crew of 110 enlisted men and 12 officers, with 85 of the enlisted personnel fresh out of boot camp, and molding them into a fully functioning ship's company.

After World War II he was assigned to the Social Security office in Bellingham and subsequently to Olympia, where he became the Office Manager and later Administrator. Cort retired in 1987. He served as an Olympia Port Commissioner in the 80's. Cort was married to Mary Gail and they had two daughters who graduated from Olympia High.

Civic activity was a motivating factor for Cort to join Kiwanis. Cort was also President of United Way, President of the Salmon Club, President of the South Sound Maritime Historical Association, and was on The Olympian Advisory Committee to the Editorial Page and on the State Capital Historical Society Board. Cort and his wife Mary Gail purchased a home and made it available for single mothers with children for many years. Courtland "Cort" Skinner, famous for his bow ties and positive attitude, passed away on May 13, 2008 at the age of 95.

#### AP17.02

- \* An attendee wishing reimbursement must present receipts for all allowable expenditures.
- Every Key Club delegate shall be responsible for at least one-third of their Convention registration fee and hotel expenses.
- The number of persons subsidized and the amount of the subsidy will be determined by the Board of Directors in their annual Budget.

## AP17: KIWANIS CONVENTION COST SUBSIDIES

## AP17.01. International and Pacific Northwest Kiwanis Conventions

- To encourage participation in the International Kiwanis Convention and the Pacific Northwest District Convention, the Club will make available budgeted subsidies for International delegate(s) and for PNW District delegate(s) to attend these annual conventions, as determined by the Board of Directors based on funds available.
- The Club subsidy funds may be used for convention registration or program fees, transportation, hotel costs or official convention meals. They may not be used for entertainment costs or spouse or partner expenditures. A delegate must present receipts for all allowable expenditures.
- Persons wishing to be a delegate must request the subsidy and the request must be approved by the Executive Committee or Board of Directors.
- When multiple requests for a subsidy are received, preference will be given to Club officers, then Committee chairs and then Club members.
- If a delegate(s) who has received the subsidy is unable to attend, the subsidy funds minus non-refundable convention fees shall be returned to the Club.

## **AP17.02.** Pacific Northwest Key Club Convention

- To encourage participation, the Olympia Kiwanis Club will make funds available for reimbursing the costs for Key Club members, teacher -advisor(s) and Club advisors.
- Club subsidy funds may be used for convention registration or program fees, transportation, hotel costs or official convention meals.
