

Kiwanis: A Legacy of Service and Community Pride

At school, I often ask students to send me a brag sheet when writing letters of recommendation. As Kiwanis President, I can't help but feel that our club deserves its own brag sheet be proud of! Here are just a few reasons why:

Strength in Numbers: The International Kiwanis Club is a global force for good, with over **550,000 members** across more than **80 countries**, dedicated to improving the lives of children and communities. We currently have 97 members in the Olympia Chapter, one of the largest clubs in the region. Let's set our sights on 110 by year's end!



Service Hours: In December alone, members reported 430 hours of service, spanning projects, Key Club support, committee work, and even unaffiliated community volunteering.

Keeping Families Warm: Our Firewood Crew has delivered 80–85 loads of wood to families in need over the past year, providing warmth during the cold months.

Investing in Youth: We support Olympia and Capital High Schools with seven \$1,500 scholarships each year, including Key Club, Achieving by Believing, Service Above Self, and Leighton Johnson Trade Scholarships.

Leadership and Legacy: Our club boasts leaders like Sam Reed, former Washington Secretary of State, who championed electoral integrity, voter accessibility, and historical preservation with grace and dedication.

Growing for Good: With three garden locations and our new garden manager, Jess Colson, we help lead us in producing thousands of pounds of fresh food for the Thurston County Food Bank this year. Jess" is an Ohioan, who has a wide variety of experience in farming and vegetable farming both in Ohio and Washington and recently worked with our club's great volunteers to host 50 4-H students at the annual Kiwanis Day of Giving on Feb. 15th.

Community Support: We volunteer at the pivotal Mile 25 aid station at the Capital City Marathon, giving runners a final boost with the encouragement of our Kiwanians and Key Club members.

Empowering Youth: Speaking of Key Club, we have around 160 members across our sponsored high schools, actively contributing to the community and making a global impact.

Olympia Kiwanis Foundation Scholarships



George Yantis, Jr. 1916-2008

George served as President of Olympia Kiwanis in 1976-1977 and provided piano accompaniment for club songs for many years. He was a five term Thurston County Commissioner (only person in history to date). He helped found Capital Lakefair and served as grand parade marshal of Capitol Lakefair in 1993 and 2003.

George Yantis was born in Olympia, Washington on January 16, 1916, and graduated from Olympia High School in 1935. He enrolled at the University of Washington to become a lawyer but changed his major to engineering after three years. In 1942, two years after graduating with a bachelor's degree, he enlisted with the Army Corps of Engineers, and served in the South Pacific from 1943 to 1945.

Returning home, he shaped the landscape of the South Puget Sound region working as an excavating contractor and serving as a Thurston County commissioner from 1949 to 1950. (At that time, terms were two years, not four.) He served as a commissioner again from 1959 to 1976. He was responsible for creating the county planning department but might be best known for his role in the relocation of the Thurston County Courthouse from Capitol Way to its home atop the hill overlooking Capitol Lake.

George was designated in 2001 by Big Brothers/Big Sisters of Thurston County as one of the first "living legends" in the county. He was elected to the hall of fame at Olympia High School in 2004.

He said that the best thing he has done in his life is to serve 20 years as a 4-H leader and 35 years as a 5th grade Sunday school teacher at St. Johns Episcopal Church. He served on the Thurston County Fair Board and also designed and maintained the sound system at the Thurston County Fairgrounds. George Yanis, Jr passed away April 30, 2008. He was 92. He had a great work ethic and was always wanting to help people.

POLICIES OF THE OLYMPIA KIWANIS CLUB May 2022

AP19: MEAL GUESTS (continued from February Kiwanis Korner)

AP19.06: Grant and Award Recipient Representatives: One grant recipient or representative of the organization is a Club guest. All others attending for the presentation pay for their own meals. AP19.07: Special Invited Guests: At the discretion of the House Committee, certain additional guests, invited by our Club, may receive a free meal. Forest Festival and Lakefair Royalty are Club guests. Chaperones, relatives or others present for the event will pay for their own meals. AP19.08: Key Club Members: The club will pay for lunch for 2 Key Club Members and their school advisors, per Key Club per quarter, to encourage attendance at our meetings by Key Club members.

AP20: PAYMENT CARD INDUSTRY (PCI) COMPLIANCE

This club policy regarding PCI compliance will be reviewed and/or amended periodically. If a PCI certification is required, then the Board will review and approve.

• Only club members trained in the use of the terminal shall operate the terminal, and the training shall also include security as it relates to credit cards, credit card numbers, and this policy.

• The standard card processing terminal will be secured when not in use. *If credit card numbers are written down, imprinted with received in electronic format, or printed in full on paper, they shall be stored in a secure manner and destroyed immediately after input into the credit card machine. The exception is receipts produced by the terminal, with only 4 or 5 digits of the credit card number, which may be stored by the club.

• In the event of a compromise to customer credit card numbers or the terminal itself, the club will immediately notify the credit card processing company, Board of Directors, and follow instructions which may include notification of the appropriate law enforcement agency.

Mackenzie concluded her employment at the Thurston County Food Bank and is pursuing her other life's goals. **James Worth**, Garden Coordinator, was with us for one year and has decided to pursue his advanced degree.

The Thurston County Food Bank and Kiwanis club of Olympia have hired a new Gardens Coordinator. Jessica Colson "Jess" has a broad experience needed to be successful . She is learning quickly, working with experienced volunteers and calling on professionals in the field. As we prepare the fields for planting, start seeds in the greenhouse and get ready for the work ahead, the Food Bank Gardens need your participation. We are at the point of forming "volunteer days" during which vegetable gardening tasks will be completed. There are "light work" and "heavy work" activities, something for everyone. If you are yearning for some good physical activity right now, let us know. In the coming weeks there will be volunteer opportunities to join others in working to make this valued project a success. President Matt's comments on the Washington State 4-H Convention highlights our work. It was inspiring to see nearly 100 students helping with three projects supporting those in need.
