More Minutes: MAR 2025 Minutes already approved by the board. Note: in the foundation meeting an amendment was added to the minutes.

Finance Committee recommended board approval of the Club Financial report. Treasurer Recruitment discussions included support for a stipend that also covers dues, clarified qualifications (only one required), and a proposal for brief budget updates at meetings.


Membership Committee proposed temporarily easing new member requirements (reduced from 5 to 3 actions) to lower barriers to joining, with a reevaluation in September. The board took action to approve this recommendation.

**Reception Desk:** The greeter role was discussed; it was suggested to make it optional or provide alternative ways for new members to connect. Reception/check-in support was requested; Kurt was thanked for his ongoing help.

Secretary's Report included website and roster updates. Concerns about sharing member contact info online led to a decision to distribute the roster via confidential

#### Olympia Kiwanis Foundation Minutes by Jonathan Lindsay

Minutes: April 24, 2025, Kiwanis Foundation Board Meeting APPROVED via Email: APRIL 30, 2025

**Finance Report:** • Finance Committee recommended board approval of Foundation Financial report. • Shawn reported a low checking balance and authorized transfers of \$15,000 (scholarships) and \$41,000 (Leighton Johnson Fund) to support foundation projects. The accounting of these transfers (whether to treat them as income) was discussed.

- Credit Card Fraud Incident: O Shawn discovered fraudulent \$1 transactions via the donation portal, traced to card testing activity from abroad. The donation and dues payment buttons were temporarily disabled, and Shawn will work with the payment processor to add fraud protection filters before reactivation.
- Garden Fundraising & Budgeting: Onexpected \$800 in garden donations were received, likely from Derek's fundraising efforts. Shawn emphasized that garden projects should be budgeted annually, except in emergencies.
- Receipts & Accountability: O There are ongoing issues with missing debit card receipts. Shawn is drafting a treasurer's manual to clarify the process for receipt accountability.
- Fundraising Campaign "Caring for Kids": 
   O Email outreach is planned for Tuesday, targeting Kiwanis members and past donors, with follow-up via physical mail and a second email. Jonathan will lead the pitch, and Matt emphasized expanding outreach beyond last year's contacts.
- Plant Sale & Membership Recruitment: 

   The plant sale is upcoming, with promotion needed. Volunteers are required for two shifts, and additional event volunteers are still needed. Sign-up sheets have been prepared and will be promoted at the next meeting.
- Distinguished Member Scholarships Discussion: O The tradition of rotating scholarships among 13 distinguished members was discussed, with new names proposed. There was a debate on whether to continue this practice, as it complicates administration. Gender equity concerns were raised, with suggestions to rename the scholarship program to "Distinguished Kiwanian Scholarships" and create a webpage to memorialize honorees. (continued on page 4)

So, we're looking for someone to fill that vacancy through next year. ### **Olympia Kiwanis Foundation Scholarships**

## Patrick D. Sutherland 1922-1995

Patrick Sutherland was President of Olympia Kiwanis in 1994-1995. He served in both the Washington State House (1949) and Senate (1951) and was elected Thurston County Prosecutor five times, 1974-1994. In 1994, he started the Kiwanis Law Enforcement Officer of the Year Award program which continues today.

Pat Sutherland was born in 1922. He graduated from the University of Washington in 1946 and received his law degree from the University of



Washington Law School in 1949. In 1949, he was elected to the Washington State House of Representatives from Seattle's 37th Legislative District. He served one term in the House and then was elected to the Senate in 1951.

In March 1959 he resigned to accept an appointment to the Public Service Commission, now known as the Utilities and Transportation Commission. He served on the commission through 1966. He also served as President of the Washington State Association of County Officials (WACO).

Pat was Thurston County prosecutor from 1974 through 1994. He was President of the Olympia Kiwanis 1994-1995. While a member of Olympia Kiwanis Club, he began the annual club recognition of local law enforcement officers with the «Law Enforcement Officer of the Year» program. These awards continue to be given annually to honor those law enforcement officers in local agencies who make a difference in their communities and their departments.

Pat Sutherland collapsed and died exercising at an Olympia athletic club in August 1995. He was 73. Pat will be remembered for his positive attitude and cheerful countenance.

## AP23: FAIR AND BALANCED PROGRAMS

All Club programs, including luncheon speaker selections should be balanced and either nonpartisan or bi-partisan in political or religious content. When it is not possible to accomplish this at a single event, subsequent events should be arranged to achieve a balance in program themes or subjects.

## AP24: BOARD AUTHORIZED SERVICE ACTIVITIES

- To comply with International Club policies and our insurance coverage, all Club sponsored activities that may occur outside of the Board of Directors and weekly Club luncheon meetings shall have prior approval of the Board of Directors.
- This includes the activities of all Club Committees, Satellite Clubs, sponsored youth activities such as Key Clubs and Circle K Clubs etc.

#### AP25: MAJOR EMPHASIS SERVICE PROJECT

- The Board of Directors may choose to commit the Club to a major or large dollar fundraising service project or capital campaign for a non-profit organization whose mission fits with the Kiwanis objectives.
- Applicants must submit their requests in writing to the President or a Club Director.
- The requests must state the purpose and dollar goal of the project, amounts raised to date and the amount requested of the Club.
- Applicants must also be available to make a presentation to the Board and/or the Club members prior to the Board acting to approve or reject the project.
