Financial and Governance Updates

- Financial Report Approved: The club's financial report was presented as "pretty normal" and subsequently approved.
- Fiscal Review Committee: The need for a Fiscal Review Committee to audit financial records was raised. Matt Grant will review bylaws to form this committee, with potential members names discussed.
- June 30th Meeting Location: The June 30th meeting will be held at Squaxin Park Rose Garden for a fee of \$167 with attendees bringing their own lunch and encouraged to make voluntary donations to offset the cost. Jonathan will reserve the garden.

Membership and Communications

- Membership & Education Committee: The club currently has 97 members. The Membership Committee will lead the June 9th program, gathering feedback on why members joined and stayed to aid recruitment. An informational table will be present at upcoming plant sales.
- It was reported that the transition to all member badges to the "blue badge" is ongoing.
- Kiwanis Engage & Member Day: Kiwanis International's new "Kiwanis Engage" platform is launching in July. Jonathan is re-evaluating "Member Day" as a potential club management tool due to its advanced features and will bring a recommendation to the board. NOTE: Member Day rate is \$25.00 per month
- Bylaws Conversion: Jonathan will convert PDF bylaws to Word documents for Shawn to edit sections related to finance and membership dues.
- New Board Members: Joel Hansen and Deb Clemens were welcomed as new board members.

Upcoming Events and Initiatives

- Key Club 100-Year Anniversary: Matt proposed an event for Monday, June 16th, from 12:30 PM to 1:45 PM at Olympia High School to celebrate the Key Club's 100th anniversary. It may include pizza, cake, and a "raise the paddle" fundraiser. Matt Grant will finalize details with students and the Key Club budget, with the Foundation potentially covering costs if needed. It was noted that students from North Thurston Kiwanis Clubs should be invited and that the Key Club Lt. Gov is a Timberline student.
- Kiwanis Club Informational Signs: Discussion occurred regarding outdated Kiwanis Club informational signs around the city, particularly on Martin Way, Plum Street, and Black Lake Boulevard. Steve will contact the City of Olympia to inquire about current policies and standards for these community service club signs. Jonathan will check club archives for past agreements.

• Donation Envelopes: Shawn has acquired 500 new donation envelopes for mailings.

- **Budget Revision:** The budget for the current fundraiser was adjusted, reducing anticipated income from \$30,000 to \$22,000 and eliminating a related \$8,000 expense line.
- Johnson Fund Clarity: A clarification was provided on the Johnson Fund income, explaining its net zero impact on the P&L statement due to offsetting entries, which helps avoid skewing operating income with market fluctuations.
- Financial Report Approval: The financial report, including updated March investment activity, was approved.

Fundraising Initiatives

- Garden Sale: The annual garden sale is set for Saturday, June 7th, from 10 AM to 2 PM at 3839 11th Avenue NW, featuring a variety of plants. Volunteers are needed, and plant donations are welcome. The goal is to raise \$5,000 for the Garden Committee.
- Trailer Sale: A large "Load Trail" brand trailer, deemed not easily usable by the club, will be sold for an asking price of \$6,000 (with negotiation leeway). Proceeds will go to the Foundation's general fund.
- Online Donations: Current online donations exceed \$1,600.
- Fundraising Push: A 5-10 minute fundraising push is planned for the June 9th meeting, focusing on member participation rather than just monetary goals, with a target of 75% member involvement.
- Capitol Campus Garden: Recent work at the Capitol Campus garden involved 24 students, parents, and 10 Kiwanis volunteers planting winter squash, harvesting 200 lbs of spring onions, and weeding. Lettuce and cabbage crops are thriving.
- Food Bank Collaboration: The collaboration with the Food Bank is positive, with Kiwanis contributions partly funding two new seasonal employees.
- Avanti High School Interns: Two student interns are successfully working at the garden through an Enterprise for Equity grant.

Daffodil Sale Planning

- **Pre-sales:** Pre-sales for daffodil bulbs will begin at the June 7th plant sale, with bulbs available for pickup in September.
- Logistics: A standard receipt book will be used for sales. Bulb pickup will likely be at the garden on a designated Saturday, with full contact information collected from buyers for tracking and future communications. A spreadsheet will be used to track sales and pickups.



Olympia Kiwanis Foundation Scholarships

Glen Tolman 1922-2012

Glen Tolman was a 58 year member of Olympia Kiwanis and served as the Club Secretary/ Treasurer from 1962 through 1965. Glen created the first Olympia High School Key Club, which was chartered in 1971. He worked for the Boy Scouts of America and later owned a financial planning company.



All five of his children graduated from Olympia High School. His daughter, Lynn Urvina, joined the first Olympia High Key Club with his encouragement and has since also served as the Olympia Kiwanis Club President (2014).

In 1988, Glen was presented with the *Kiwanis Tablet of Honor* for his efforts towards the *Kiwanis International IDD Project*, to raise funds to eliminate Iodine Deficiency Syndrome (which caused goiters and developmental delays) in children worldwide. In partnership with UNESCO, IDD has been virtually eliminated world wide.

Glen was proud to be a veteran of the US Army Air Corps, having served on the European Front during WWII. He moved his family to Olympia in 1956 when he accepted a position here with the Boy Scouts of America. He loved the beauty of the Pacific Northwest and never returned to his native Idaho. Glen sold insurance for many years, and had owned his a financial planning company before retiring to travel with his wife Janet, and work in his garden. Glen supported strong schools and youth serving organizations his entire life.

POLICIES OF THE OLYMPIA KIWANIS CLUB

May 2022

AP26: LEADERSHIP SUCCESSION

Each incumbent committee chair shall have the responsibility, in concert with the President Elect, to recruit and train his/her successor

Further, the President Elect shall have the responsibility to see that this process of selection and training of committee chairs takes place during the year the President Elect serves in that position.

Each year, either a replacement committee chair should be selected and trained, or the incumbent committee chair should agree, to continue for another year, if approved by the President.

Each committee chair should have a job description for his/her position, together with a timeline of what activities / tasks should be completed, for his/her committee.

AP27: DUES:

AP27.01 Dues for club membership are \$200 per year paid in one installment.
*There is also a discount for family members. A family member is an active member residing with one or two other active members of this club in the same household. There shall be no membership distinction made between family members. This discount is effective as long as it is provided by Kiwanis International and the PNW District.

• Members may pay for other members.

AP27.02 A family member is an active member residing with one or two other active members of this club in the same household. There shall be no membership distinction made between family members.

AP27.03 Former SLP members receive a \$42 dues reduction in the first two full administrative years of membership following the first partial year of membership. as provided in the following table (includes all membership types).

Dues for April through September will be at the Kiwanis International New Member Fee rate.
