
Why We Join - And Why We Stay

The Kiwanis Food Bank Gardens have had a magical spring and summer. Now we transition to fall and winter crops. In our thirty-fifth year of operation, we can be proud of what we have accomplished, in the past and this year.

More than the weight produced and delivered to the Thurston County Food Bank, 24,577 pounds to date, the variety of crops from lettuces, basil, rhubarb, cabbage, garlic, fava beans, peas, onions, beets and more demonstrate the talents of our team. The Gardens' Coordinator Jess Colson and summer employees, Ethan, Willow and Jules, along with dedicated volunteers help reduce food insecurity in our community. Kudos to all who have joined our team to make our efforts rewarding.

With spring and early summer crops harvested, we turn our attention to late summer/ fall crops in the ground and fall/winter crops currently being planted. Potatoes, squash, cabbage, broccoli, cucumbers and beans and more beans are coming along.

A final Note: This season will be our last at Calliope Farm. Olympia Kiwanis Foundation has an Agricultural Agreement with Calliope Farm owners. That five-year agreement ends in 2025. The future ownership of that land is under review. The property owners and farm manager decided to end the agreement. Kiwanis Club of Olympia appreciates the opportunity to use that farmland for more than seven years. The Kiwanis Food Bank Garden Committee is now looking for additional land to continue our work. Suggestions to the Committee are appreciated.

Olympia Kiwanis Foundation Scholarships

Robert "Bob" Bigelow 1927 - 2005

Bob Bigelow was Lt. Governor of Kiwanis for Mason and Thurston Counties, a long time Board Director of Olympia School District and was named a "Living Legend" of Thurston County. A decorated Marine wounded at Iwo Jima, Bob was a partner in Bigelow's Office Supplies with his wife, Betty.

Robert Bigelow was a member of the Waterfront Kiwanis for many years. He was an active volunteer and leader for the March of Dimes *Walk America* annual fundraiser.



A partner in the ownership of *Bigelow's Office Supplies*, Robert "Bob" Bigelow and his wife Betty worked tirelessly for the children of Olympia and Thurston County. Bob was a positive and vocal advocate to allow women into Kiwanis, which occurred in 1987.

A former U. S Marine during World War II, Bob was a patriot and a leader who worked throughout his life to change the world, one child and one community at a time. Bigelow, who served in World War II, was wounded when he and fellow Marines landed on Iwo Jima. He was 17. He also served on the Salvation Army Board of Directors, and could be found every December ringing the bell and the Christmas kettles. Bigelow was named a Living Legend of Thurston County by Big Brothers, Big Sisters in 2002. He spent 60 years as a volunteer for the March of Dimes, served 18 years on the Thurston County Civil Service Board and served on the boards or as a volunteer for the YMCA, YWCA, Thurston County Fair, Friendship Board, the American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars and Senior Services for South Sound.

Bob had a great sense of humor, and always had an appropriate "story" for every situation.

One day, while at Kamp Kiwanis undergoing Lieutenant Governor training, Bob woke up and announced he had a "dream". He dreamt that at the Capital City Lakefair celebration and parade this year, there would be a Kiwanis "float" display, representing the 8 Kiwanis Clubs in Thurston County. Bob took his dream back to the local Kiwanis clubs, and made it a reality. Members from each Kiwanis Club walked beside a trailer handing out balloons along the route to children with lists of the Kiwanis Clubs in Thurston County and their community contributions from the previous year.

AP28 (continue)

c. The Club and Foundation may solicit sponsorships to support a specific event or activity in accordance with a plan for the event or activity that (a) defines the types of sponsorships and incentives to be provided and (b) is approved by the Board of Directors of the Club or Foundation. d. A sponsor may be any organization or individual, whether a member or not, that is offered the opportunity to provide cash or in-kind products or services as a supporter of a single event in exchange for incentives offered by the Kiwanis committee organizing the event. The organizing committee may group sponsors in terms of the value of the contributions (i.e., gold, silver, bronze) and offer more incentives for bigger donations, but the amount of the donation by any group bears no specific relationship to the incentive(s) provided.

e. To provide sponsors with greater visibility and thus to encourage greater participation by sponsors, the Club and/or Foundation will prepare and display free standing signs at regular club luncheon meetings and other club events that list all current sponsors. The names of the private or public organizations to be listed shall be subject to the approval by the Board of Directors. While any member may recommend a sponsor for listing, the Treasurer shall periodically review the list and make such recommendations as necessary to include all current sponsors and remove any that are no longer current. f. Political candidates or advocates of a ballot issue, when invited as guest speakers, may distribute one piece of display material per attendee.

g. The distribution of advertising or display material of any kind for candidates or ballot issues is not permitted unless specifically related to the program for the meeting.

If more than one household member is paying, the first member is \$200 and the second is \$170.
