



Minutes of Hybrid Board Meeting Held at The Broadway Christian Church August 17, 2021

Meeting was called to Order by President Dale Metcalf at 1:15 pm. Other Officers and Board Members present in person were Clyde Bentley, Janet Schisser, Robert Nelson, Ernest Hilderbrand, Norma Fair, Jack Miles, Valerie Shaw and Sally Robinson. Participating via ZOOM was Jack Meinzenbach. Absent were Liz Sensintaffar and Lynn Limback. Nonboard members present were Charlie Lee and John Haralson. A quorum was declared

Minutes from the last regular board meeting of July 20, 2021 had been distributed prior to the meeting via email. Approval of the minutes was moved by Jack Miles, seconded by Ernest Hilderbrand, and passed unanimously.

Financial Reports: Treasurer, Robert Nelson was unable to present a Treasurer's report as of July 31, 2021 but said he would email as soon as possible and present it at the September meeting. A copy of the Treasurer report will be filed with these minutes when received.

The Memorial Trust Fund Report as of July 31, 2021 was presented by President Metcalf. The total value of the MTF as of 7-31-21 was \$515.137.71. showing a decrease in value of \$10,776.84 for the month. The largest factor for the decrease was the transfer of \$11,000 to the Club Foundation to be distributed as grants. President Metcalf reported that the Money Market account at Simmons Bank was closed on August 4. and the \$5.551.35 balance transferred into the Central Bank of Boone County Money Market account. Ernest Hilderbrand moved approval of the MTF Report, Valerie Shaw seconded the motion and it passed unanimously. Report is attached to these minutes for the record.

New Member Application – There were no new member applications in hand.

Administrative Items:

 Discussion was held again about the in-person weekly Club meetings. The general consensus is that while members seem to enjoy being together, a lunch meeting in person does not work well for younger professionals, so is a recruiting problem. Also, it was agreed that the technology problems experienced for speakers and ZOOM participation must be resolved. Clyde Bentley will research options for improvements and Sally Robinson will help schedule a meeting with the Broadway Christian Church staff. Sally also agreed to continue ordering the lunch.

- *President Metcalf will work with John Haralson and Valerie Shaw to recruit someone to fill the Board member position vacated by Lynn Limback beginning 10-1-2021 when he begins serving as Vice President. The vote will be taken once Lynn is installed as Vice President.
- *Dale reported that Robert Nelson has resigned as Treasurer effective October 1, 2021. Discussion was held about finding a replacement.
- •Notice was given that Kiwanis International has eliminated the New Member Fee effective 10-1-2021, and both KI and District dues for new members will be prorated on a monthly basis. Janet Schisser moved that the Club dues be prorated on the same basis, Clyde seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.
- *It was acknowledged that Youth Protection Policy training for the current has already been done.

Committee Reports:

- •The Installation and Awards Banquet will be planned by a committee lead by Valerie Shaw and Clyde Bentley. The date will be set as September 28, 2021. Time and place to be determined.
- *Discussion was held regarding renewal of sponsorship of K-Kids at Benton Elementary. Janet Schisser will proceed with the renewal.
- •Clyde presented a report at the Club meeting about the Kiwanis Park long-range planning committee. A copy of the report is attached to these minutes for the record.
- *Sally Robinson reported that the Centennial Committee is planning a presentation to the Club for August 31, 2021.

Club History: Celebrating almost 100 years of service



A look back through our files as we prepare for our centennial

Kiwanis in the garden

As the Columbia Center for Urban Agriculture celebrates its annual Harvest Hootenanny Sept. 18, Kiwanians can look back at their own "deep roots" in community gardening.

As the Great Depression raged in 1932, the Garden Committee of the Columbia Kiwanis spearheaded a "Gardens the Unemployed" program. The program found backyards and vacant city ground for unemployed Columbian to till. The program provided seed, advice and a detailed planting plan. It also loaned gardening tools.

The result, according to the 1940 club history booklet, was that "Eighty-five families were richly fed, happily occupied and gloriously vindicated as abie and self-sustaining citizens, regardless of the Depression."

Later the Columbia Kiwanis teamed with the Lions, Rotary and the Federal Works Administration to establish a community garden that in 1940 produced 2,446 quarts of green beans, 2,234 quarts of tomatoes, 400 bushels of carrots and a cornucopia of other vegetables.
