

Special Kiwanis Presentation

Diversity, Equity and Inclusion: History and Future, A call for Systemic and Individual Action

There are two major cases that support the importance of diversity, equity and inclusion (at a systems level). The Social case states that each individual should be able to access opportunities that allow them to access meaningful careers, pursue their passions and pursue lifelong learning opportunities which lead to a family sustaining wage. The Business case states that there is a persistent skills gap in the United States. A company's bottom line depends on the training, attracting, hiring and retaining of qualified diverse talent.

To address both social and business cases for systemic inequalities or discrimination, the federal government enacted the Civil Rights Act of 1964. This act was signed into law by President Lyndon Johnson on July 2, 1964. The Act was enacted to prohibit discrimination in public places, provided for the integration of schools and other public facilities, and made employment discrimination illegal. At that time, this Act was revered as the most sweeping civil rights legislation since reconstruction (archives.gov).

The Civil Right Act identified the following as protected classes or groups of individuals who should be protected from discrimination:

- Race
- Color
- **National Origin**
- Gender
- Religion
- Disability (1990)
- Age (1967)
- Sexual Origin (2020)

Title VI was enacted as part of the landmark Civil Rights Act of 1964. This Title prohibits discrimination on the basis of race, color and national origin in programs and activities receiving federal financial aid.

The purpose for the establishment of Title VII was to level the playing field by requiring employers to consider only objective, job related criteria in making employment decision. This Title prohibits discrimination in employment circumstances.

The Title VII of the Civil Rights Act created the Equal Employment Opportunities Commission (EEOC) to implement the law. Due to Title VII and the EEOC, employers have Affirmative Action statements visibility posted on websites and on all hiring advertisements. Affirmative Action is a federal policy established to promote members of groups that have previously suffered from discrimination, in areas in which people are underrepresented in education and employment. Affirmative Action (created July 1, 1996) is the governmental policies and practices seeking to include particular groups

based on:

- Gender
- Race
- Sexuality
- Creed
- or Nationality

The U. S. Department of Education's Office for the Civil Rights (OCR) was established to

oversee and enforce these laws. The OCR was created by the Department of Education Organization Act of 1979, upon the Department's establishment, on May 1980, to investigate alleged violation of the Title VI. The mission of the OCR was to ensure equal access (inclusion) to education and to promote educational excellence throughout the country through various enforcements of the Civil Rights Act. (catalog.archives.gov)

The Fair Housing Act of 1968 and the 1977 Community Reinvestment Act were federal laws enacted to prohibit home lending discrimination ("redlining"). These federal laws ban discrimination based on someone's race when a person is trying to rent or buy a home, as well apply for a mortgage. It also made it illegal to impose predatory interest rates or fees (Equity).

The Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) was signed into law by President George H.W. Bush on July 26, 1990. This as a civil rights law, is some of the most comprehensive pieces of civil rights legislation that prohibits discrimination based on disability. The ADA guaranteed that people with a disability have the same opportunities as everyone else

to participate in mainstream life. The law was enacted to allow persons with disabilities the right to enjoy employment opportunities, to purchase goods and services and to participate in state and local government programs and services. It is modeled after the 505 rehabilitation Act of 1973, which addressed discrimination based on disability (ADA.gov).

Title IX, of the Education Amendments of 1972, protected people from discrimination based on sex in educational programs or activities that receive federal financial assistance. As a result, any school that receives federal money from elementary to university level must provide fair and equal treatment of the sexes in all areas, including athletics (history.com) (Equity and Inclusion).

On June 15, 2020, the U.S. Supreme Court issued a landmark decision affirming that the prohibition on sex discrimination in Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 extends to discrimination based on sexual orientation and gender identity, and gender identity (Equity).

The U.S. has made great gains at addressing systemic inequalities and discrimination over the past fifty years. Although great advances have been made, there continues to be work to be done. As we continue to focus on systemic inequalities, let us also place a priority on identifying the root causes.

As we move forward with the DEI work, let us consider practical strategies to close the opportunity gaps that continue to plague our nation. Let us look at the following as root causes and vehicles for continual inequalities, discrimination, harassment and hate. Policies/ Processes (voting redistricting, voting laws); Environment (food deserts, location of companies expelling hazardous waste); Instruction (funding for inner city and rural low income and minority public schools); Beliefs/Expectations (beliefs that Asian Americans brought COVID to the states; Mexicans are taking our jobs); People (the browning of America.)

Let us now begin to do a deeper dive into the root causes of inequalities and look inwardly not only outwardly at systems.

Questions to answer:

- Are we able to not only look at systems, but are we able look inwardly at individuals, communities and ourselves?
 What are our beliefs and expectations of ourselves, others? What are we teaching our children? What are our children learning and from whom?
- Do we believe that different means deficit?
- Are we willing and able to shift from a deficit- based thinking to a strength based thinking paradigm? Are we ready for a paradigm shift? Are we prepared to learn or relearn about people who may be different from ourselves?
- Are we ready to take on the work, as individuals and communities to become equity-minded leaders?
- Are we ready to use an equity lens to assess how we communicate, think, and treat one another?
- If we are prepared to start the work of becoming equity- minded leaders, the following three components have been presented by Bensimon, Dowd and Harris (2007) in Accountability, Equity, and Practitioner Learning and Change as first step in the advancement of developing an equity lens and developing equity minded leaders:

Being race- conscious (It's no longer time to be color-blind.)

Being aware that beliefs, expectations and practices can be unintentionally discriminatory through implicit biases. Being willing to actively and intentionally work to dismantle systems that perpetuate inequality and discrimination. Everyone has an important role. Everyone can make a difference!!!

Key Leader Camp Finally Returns to District

Finally dates have been set for Key Leader this fall. Camp Dates are:

- Camp Mihaska in Bourbon, MO, on October 21-23, 2022
- Camp Tanako will be November 4-6, 2022

The fees for the camps have been reduced to \$195 for student participants and \$150 for student facilitators (camp counselors). The \$150 fee would also apply to adults chaperones and volunteers. The fees were lowered from \$225 for student participants and \$175 for student facilitators in past years. This lowering of fees was possible due to the \$10,000 grant from the Earl Collins Foundation. The lower fees will help get the students back in to the camps after a two-year hiatus.








Union Kiwanis Club held its 7th annual Student Photo Contest
