



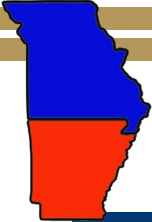

Governor Roy's Message



My year as governor of the Missouri-Arkansas District officially began Oct. 1 with the new Kiwanis fiscal year after 13 months of trying to get ready. I've chosen the theme "One Community," which you'll see on the lapel pins that I'm handing out as I visit clubs around the district. The pin features two Jonesboro kids — a brother and sister — in a photo taken by their dad, thus reminding us that we serve the children of the world, but especially our own community.

During the Kiwanis International convention in Indianapolis in June, KI's executive director, Stan Soderstrom, said in his annual report that almost everything good that happens in Kiwanis happens at the club level. That's certainly true, and I'm going to spend a lot of my time as governor stressing the importance of strengthening our local clubs so they can continue to serve their communities for many more years.

My Jonesboro club does important things in our community and has since it was chartered in 1935. Each of you could say the same thing about your club. That's why it pains us whenever a Kiwanis club ceases to exist, as several have in Mo-Ark over the past couple of years. Fourteen others had fewer than 10 members, according to the Sept. 1 KI membership report.

While at the district level we are committed to opening new clubs, especially in communities that don't have one, we're also going to do everything we can to help clubs that are struggling.

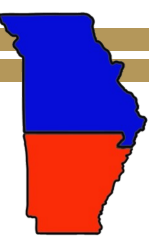
Past Governor Carla O'Brien has agreed to head a new Club Strengthening Committee, which identify and work with the clubs that need help and are willing to accept it. Revitalizing our clubs requires more than just the district staff and officers so we will call upon lieutenant governors to help us form a boost team in the area of a struggling club. The division LTG and other Kiwanians from the area are more likely to be accepted by the struggling club, and it's much more economical.

Barb Thompson has agreed to serve again as head of the Membership Committee, which will focus on opening new clubs, and we need to involve more people in that process. It's an exhilarating experience that every good Kiwanian ought to have.

Finally, I'd like to mention that I am continuing the same governor's project as Carla had — the Beatrice Johnson Kiwanis Youth Kamp — so I'll be raising money for that cause as I make my way around the district.

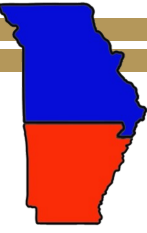

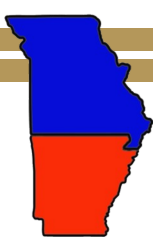

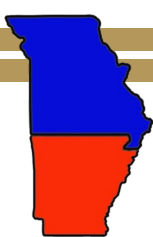

Key Leader Camp This weekend—Register your teens before its too late!

- Camp Mihaska in Bourbon, MO, on October 21-23, 2022
- Camp Tanako will be November 4-6, 2022

The fees for the camps have been reduced to \$195 for student participants and \$150 for student facilitators (camp counselors). The \$150 fee would also apply to adults chaperones and volunteers. The fees were lowered from \$225 for student participants and \$175 for student facilitators in past years. This lowering of fees was possible due to the \$10,000 grant from the Earl Collins Foundation. The lower fees will help get the students back in to the camps after a two-year hiatus.

Children spend more than 44 hours each week “PLUGGED IN” to TV, games, phones or computers*. Our Kiwanis goal for MO-Ark should be to give them reasons and places to cut that number in half by one year from now.

We need to build outdoor play and learn space at Beatrice Johnson Kiwanis Youth Kamp to allow them to touch Nature and to use their imaginations!

Child size spaces for them ... alone!

- A child size path through the woods for exploring.
- A tree house, close to the ground.
- A play stage for acting, reciting, observing.
- A playhouse or gazebo with a planted roof! Grass, sedums — easy to touch, fun to feel varied textures!
- A willow branch structure — maybe a cave, a bridge, a hut, a secret place.
- Wooden toad stools cut from fallen trees to sit on, hide behind.
- Small shovels, trowels to dig in the leaf debris to search for beetles, bugs or worms.
- A big moss-covered log to walk along, to climb over
- Birdhouses, varied sizes, colors, textures, or plain for them to paint, then hang in the tent area
- Things to make noise on — empty wooden boxes, old re-purposed pipes, tiny brass bells to hang from a bush, an empty plastic bucket.
- Slate signs for changeable messages — such as look at this weird tree — and chalk close by.
- Mud — they know what to do with it!

- You could bring your own tents, food and make it a weekend adventure.

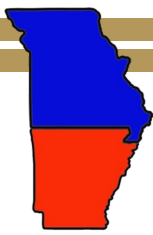

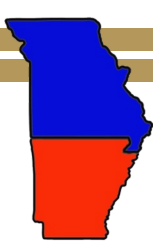

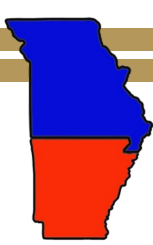

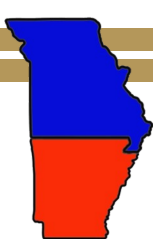


Union High School Key Club Holds Peanut Day

Springdale Receives Funds from Football Program

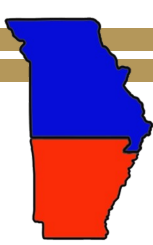

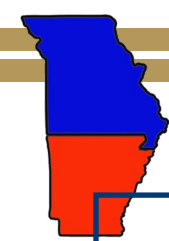

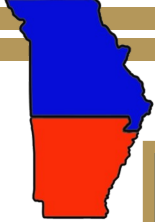
