Ice and snow have kept me home more than planned the past month. But that also gave me more time to help plan future events that hopefully will bring better weather.

I had five speaking appearances on the calendar for last week, but I wound up making only two — the first and the last. The first was before a Jonesboro Rotary Club, whose program chairman had asked me to talk about



the state of the newspaper industry. The last was an occasion with a happier future — breaking ground for a headquarters cabin at the Beatrice Johnson Kiwanis Youth Kamp near Russellville.

In between I had been scheduled to visit the Springdale, Huntsville and Gravette Kiwanis clubs, but heavy snowfall in Northwest Arkansas caused that trip to be postponed. I do hope to try again soon.

That was my first trip to the Youth Kamp, and I was quite impressed with the work done so far. With snow still on the ground and wind whipping through the pavilion, the ceremony went on, rather briskly, and we turned a few shovels-full of dirt.

The headquarters cabin is badly needed, and the foundation board has a good start on raising funds for it, especially because of major grants from the Earl Collins Foundation. Unfortunately, the cost has doubled from when the project was planned in 2019 — to just over \$200,000.

Beatrice Johnson bequested 160 acres to our district when she died in 2008, provided that we build a camp for children. Since then the foundation board has been developing the facility while raising funds to pay for it. Much volunteer labor has also gone into the development.

Beatrice Johnson had a vision that this quiet place near Piney Bay could become a wonderful camp for kids to enjoy and learn about the outdoors. So do many Kiwanians who have been working on the camp for more than a decade.

Then-Governor Don Leupold gave the camp a big boost when he made it his signature project in 2015-16. And my predecessor, Carla O'Brien, did the same last year.

I figured that if two St. Louis area governors could do so much for an Arkansas camp, I could do at least that much as an Arkansas governor. So I've continued the camp as the district project and suggest that clubs all over Arkansas and Missouri contribute whatever you can to help.

That contribution could be in the form of a check, or your club might be able to put together a work day at the camp. You could present a check to me when I visit a club, divisional or regional meeting. Or it could be done at the Educational Leadership Conference March 10-11 in Springfield or the District Convention Aug. 11-13. With any of those means we can get a picture and some credit for your club's contribution.

Mid-Year ELC Details

Registration is under way for the first midyear conference of the Missouri-Arkansas District of Kiwanis since February 2019. It will be held March 10-11 at the Holiday Inn & Suites in Springfield, Mo.

This midyear event has been reformatted as an **Educational Leadership Conference**, and the content will focus on programs that can help Kiwanians develop their leadership skills, knowledge of the organization and abilities to serve their communities.

With the later date we are hoping for better weather, and we have built a fine program designed to promote learning and sharing of ideas.

To get the weekend started with some fun, we are offering a night at the **Pythian Castle** (https://pythiancastle.com/), a beautiful, historic building in Springfield that offers various forms of entertainment. The castle will host our early-arrivers for a dinner and Clue Adventure Game that will test our wits and give us a chance to see the interior of the building.

Pythian Castle is an ornate mansion built in 1913 as an orphanage by the Knights of Pythias. Later it was owned by the U.S. military and used to house German and Italian prisoners during World War II. In addition to games and special events, ghost tours are offered at the Pythian.

The cost of the Friday night event, including dinner, will be \$50 per person. The conference registration fee, which will include a continental breakfast and luncheon, is \$35 per member or guest. Registration should be completed now at https://k14.site.kiwanis.org conventions. Deadline is Friday, March 3.

Saturday's program will revolve around three vital panel discussions — "Awesome Club Service Projects," "Winning Fund-Raising Projects" and "Growing Your Membership Roster."

The luncheon will feature remarks from **Dan Leikvold of Lead**, S.D., a distinguished Kiwanian who is now a member of the Kiwanis International Board of Trustees.

After lunch we'll split the meeting room for concurrent technology sessions. District Secretary Angie Oshia will lead a hands-on discussion, "Mastering the KI Dashboard," aimed especially for lieutenant governors, club secretaries and others who want to know more about getting the most out of the organization's online features.

On the other side Sarah Moreland Byrne, digital media specialist for Kiwanis International, will "zoom" in to present "Strategies for Using Social Media as Club Tools," focusing on Facebook but also touching on other platforms.

Bring your tablets or laptops to either session so you can follow along with the illustrations and information offered.

The day's agenda will wrap up with three rotating roundtable discussions — "Becoming a Divisional, Regional or District Leader," "Protecting Our SLP Members" and "How to Boost Your Own Club." An experienced district officer will lead each discussion and encourage a sharing of ideas. Attendees will be divided into three groups so that all will be able to sit in on each 20-minute session.

The conference will wrap up about 4 p.m.

Our group's rate at the Holiday Inn & Suites, which is at 2720 North Glenstone Ave., is \$129 per night. Our block of rooms will be held until Feb. 24.

University students enjoy the relaxing traits of canine company as they cram for end of semester college exams.

Furthermore, the Kiwanians learned of the training requirements, examination testing, temperament qualities, and teamwork required by the dogs and owners in order to serve the public at the many places and festivals where the PET Dog teams visit. Elder care centers and hospice are also popular visitation sites. PET Dogs are dedicated to enhancing the life experiences of all through interaction/contact with therapy dogs.

The dogs have been taught that when their owner fastens a Pony Express Therapy Dog vest on them, "it is time to work!" Almost magically, barking and playfulness cease, and the dog's calming, appeasing, and soothing

traits take center stage. A few of the Oregon Kiwanis members are considering training their dogs to the Canine Good Citizen Standards to test to become a Pony Express Therapy Dog team as a way to broaden the Kiwanis Mission of "Giving to Kids and Community".
