"We Build" back as Kiwanis help Habitat for Humanity for One Day

The old Kiwanis slogan "We Build" is back in force this year as the Columbia-area clubs join Habitat for Humanity for a special "blitz build" project.

Habitat for Humanity has set an ambitious goal of building four new homes in 10 days — with the help of people like us.

While Kiwanians are encouraged to join other volunteers working to prepare the site each Monday and Thursday, on Sept. 19 the three Columbia clubs will turn out to help fulfill the dream of good housing for families in need.

Show Me Central Habitat for Humanity typically builds five or six homes a year. Families willing to partner with Habitat can use their labor to qualify for a zero-interest loan to make the house affordable.

This year, Show Me Central was selected as the national Blitz Build Project. That means that volunteers from around the country will gather in Columbia to build four additional homes from the ground up in 10 days.

Kiwanians from the Columbia clubs each year pool their efforts on a single project called One Day. This year, we will pitch in on the Blitz Build. Sept. 19 is our day to work in a variety of roles —

many of which require no building skills or hard physical effort.

The houses are being built at Habitat's new subdivision, Boone Prairie, located off Brown
