#### **Dear Fellow Kiwanians:**

tals in the two states.

With my term down to less than 30 days, this will be my last column as governor of the Missouri-Arkansas District. It has been an honor to follow in the footsteps of many great Kiwanians who have served in this position since the district was formed in 1950.

Since last Oct. 1 we've put almost 9,000 miles on our vehicles to visit clubs, divi-



sions and regions, as well as attend conferences, conventions and other events. That doesn't include air miles to a Governors' Conference and the Kiwanis International Convention. We'll add a few more miles this month.

Last week First Lady Pat and I traveled to St. Louis for charter ceremonies of the new Wentzville and Lake St. Louis clubs and a Region IV meeting, both of which were well attended. While we were there, we delivered about 200 books to the St. Louis Children's Hospital as part of the first lady's project. We figure that Mo-Ark clubs have donated somewhere between 1,500 and 2,000 (we lost count) books, games and toys to the project, and we've delivered them to five different hospi-

At the Region IV meeting I was presented with checks totaling \$1,200 for the Beatrice Johnson Kiwanis Youth Kamp, which is my project. That puts the total for the year over \$18,000.

I'd really like to reach \$20,000 so if your club hasn't contributed, or you want to make a personal contribution, make the check out to BJKYK, with the notation "Governor Roy's Project," and send it to Jerry Martin, 6357 Firefly Catch Ave., Springdale Ark. 72762.

The camp is still under development, but it's already benefiting young people and will for many years to come.

We'll still take more children's books because the hospitals go through them quickly. If you'd like to send a check to Pat (3617 Alabama Road, Jonesboro, Ark. 72405), she will buy books, and we'll deliver them. Or you can order them through a company that specializes in book projects for kids, such as Scholastic, a Kiwanis International partner. You can find information under "Partners" on the KI web site.

With the Kiwanis year nearing its end, I'd like to remind club officers that this is a good time to make annual contributions to our foundations and service leadership programs. Here are the 2022-23 giving guidelines.

# Kiwanis Club of Harrisonville Celebrates 100 Years Congratulations!!!

On Sunday, June 11th, Harrisonville celebrated its 100th anniversary. The Harrisonville club recently held its largest fundraiser of the year – its annual Strawberry Days sale. It was once again a successful event. The event has been held for 75 years. It's a big fundraiser.

The group's service projects include a kindergarten reading program, High School Key Club, the Jerry Tabb Monopoly Tournament, Christmas Family Adoption, a Boy's State and Girl's State sponsorship and mock interviews with students.

However, their biggest and best project helps them celebrate the 100th anniversary. The club held a groundbreaking ceremony at City Park followed by a celebration dinner at the Community Center.

What began as a reminder of a pending historic anniversary turned into a major project that costs hundreds of thousands of dollars and will impact the Harrisonville community for generations.

The project is estimated to cost about \$340,000, according to Sonya McLelland, former president of the Kiwanis Club and current co-chair of the 100th anniversary committee. She said about \$247,000 of that will be for equipment, with the rest being an "In-Kind" donation through the Parks Department. The Kiwanis Club and the Parks Department are partnering together to improve the playground at city park. They will be constructing a large traditional piece of playground equipment, complete with slides, climbing wall and tunnel bridge. There will also be two parallel zipline tracks – one with a traditional seat and another suited for small children or special needs children.



#### **Kiwanis Children's Fund**

#### WE'RE HERE TO HELP YOUR CLUB

The Kiwanis Children's Fund is here to help as you begin planning the 2023-24 service year. If your club is seeking funding for a new project or planning to expand upon an existing project, it might be eligible for a grant. Eligible projects must support activities within at least one Kiwanis International cause area: health and nutrition, education and literacy, and youth leadership development.

Here are grants available to clubs in good standing with Kiwanis International and the Kiwanis Children's Fund:

#### Club grant

A club grant helps address an unmet need that affects children in your community or elsewhere — by supporting a project that provides long-term benefits that can be sustained by the club. The first step toward this grant is to submit a Letter of Inquiry (LOI) using our online grant-making platform, Foundant. An LOI provides the Children's Fund with an overview of how your club plans to meet a need in your community. You will be asked to provide a project overview, timeline, budget and community needs overview.

#### **Microgrant**

The microgrant program provides between US\$250 and US\$1,000 to support service projects for clubs with 35 or fewer members. There are fewer requirements and a shorter decision period than Club Grants.

Clubs can apply through Foundant beginning October 1. Applications received by the first of each month will

receive a decision via email by the 15th of the same month. Approved grants will be paid monthly beginning in December.

#### **Pediatric Medicine Support Grant**

Funded by generous gifts from the Kiwanis district governors in 2005-06 and 2006-07, the Pediatric Medicine Support Grant helps clubs execute service projects at local children's hospitals or medical facilities that provide pediatric care.
