PROGRAM

Max Heide introduced Anna Scott, director of Neighbors' House, a small, local, faith-based, nonprofit agency offering afterschool help and encouragement to kids in grades K through 5.

Neighbor's House began in 2003. It started as a stand-alone center in downtown DeKalb, but organizers realized early on they might have more success setting up programs in the apartment complexes where many poor and disadvantaged kids live. Currently, Neighbors' House operates three sites — one each in Cortland, DeKalb, and Sycamore — with more than 60 young children enrolled. That number swells over the summer: more than 100 kids take part once the school ends.

The guiding principle behind Neighbors' House is "Helping students reach their God-given potential." Throughout the year, volunteers help at-risk kids develop their reading skills and complete their homework. They also organize arts and crafts activities, group games, and try to build long-term relationships with children who may need guidance they aren't getting at home. Children get lessons in scripture as well: Neighbors' House requires that its volunteers identify as Christian.

It is important that the kids have fun, that they feel valued, and free to use their imagination at Neighbors' House. Currently, 76 % of the kids have been coming a year or more, and 100% of

the tutors are returnees. Eighty-five percent of them have been helping for more than three years. The summer program, especially, focuses on themes that small kids enjoy — stories about pirates or space adventures or who knows what. The program hosts holiday parties (where kids receive books and books), and sets up free family bowling outings for clients.

Neighbor’s House operates on a tight budget — about \$80, 000 a year — and Anna Scott highlighted some ways to donate money and time. The agency holds a 5K- race fundraiser each year on Thanksgiving morning, and is looking for ways to become better-known.

Anna Scott says that in the future, they would like to expand their services to serve middle school students too.
