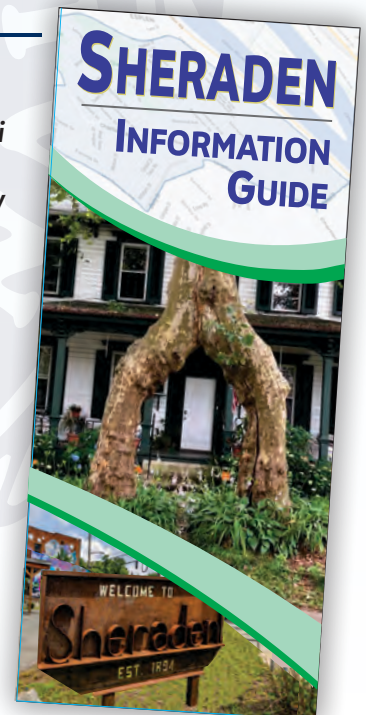


Our Brick Sale is going well

PCA Builders Club

The 2024-2025 PCA Builders Club is off to a good start. We have Di Stoehr, Karen Byerly, Maureen Reynolds, Tracy Smith, Marianne Muraska and Keith Smith helping out this year as each is able. 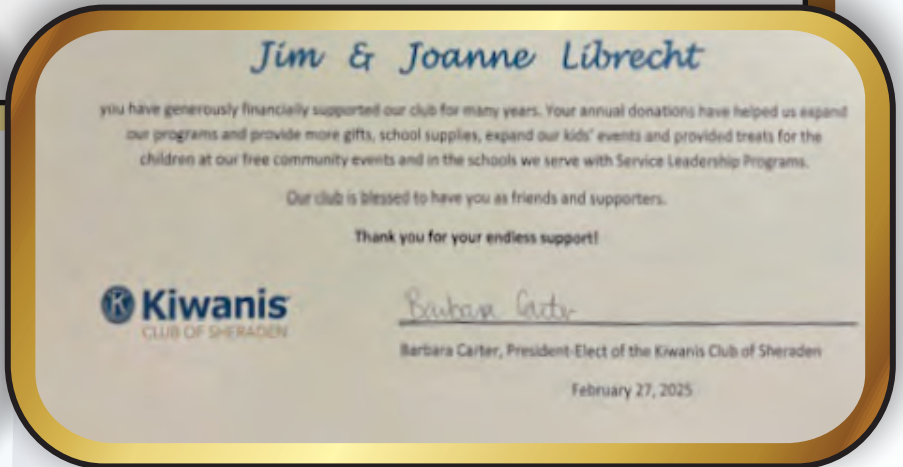

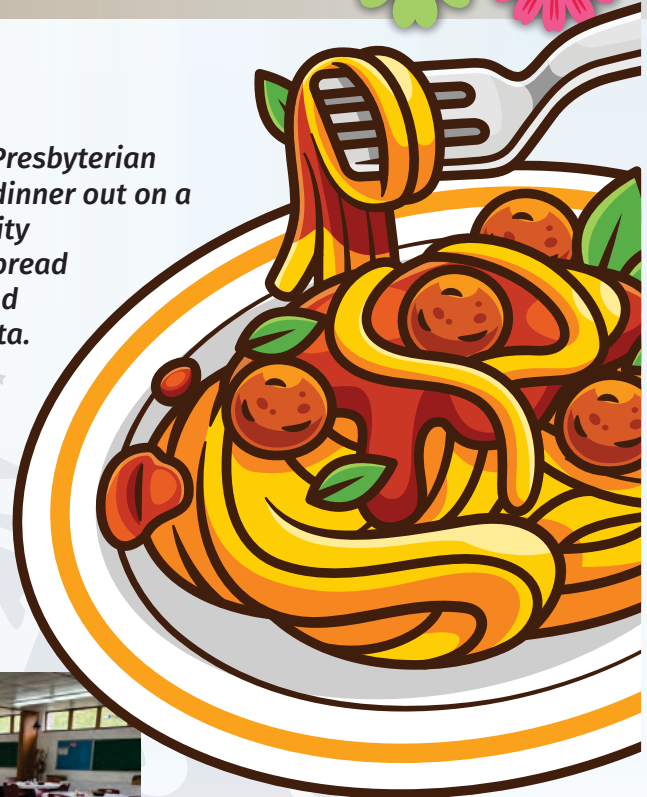


of the "Build a Box" section and filled 4 boxes with assorted titles for \$30 a box.
