




KIWANIS KONNECTION




Our Brick Sale is going well

Community Cleanups

In Sheraden, spring cleaning continues well into the summer! In partnership with the Sheraden Neighbors Community Group, the City of Pittsburgh, and members of the community, Kiwanis members held a few cleanups to help tidy up the neighborhood. This included picking up litter from the sidewalks, gathering hard to recycle or dispose of items, and gathering debris that just seems to end up in alleyways.

In July, a cleanup was held on a hot, sticky Saturday morning, and people came out in force to walk the neighborhood and pick up trash. There were also a couple of great guys in trucks driving up and down many of the neighborhood alleyways to collect garbage. This effort actually inspired the neighborhood to continue the cleanup over the rest of the weekend, and many people continued to add to an ever-growing pile of trash. By Monday, the workers from the City of Pittsburgh came with some heavy equipment and very large trucks to clean up the mess. It ended up taking them a couple hours and many trips back and forth to the dump to haul it away.

In September, the City held their annual Garbage Olympics, a competition throughout the City of Pittsburgh hosted through their Clean Pittsburgh Commission. This fun event is meant to encourage neighborhood cleanups with a fun competition. There are prizes handed out for things like most garbage collected, weirdest item found, and most volunteers. Each year Sheraden Neighbors makes sure to sign up a team for the Sheraden Neighborhood, and the Kiwanis Club of Sheraden is always happy to lend a helping hand. With limited time for this event, we still managed to gather up a substantial amount of trash and cleaned up a few of the busy streets of the

neighborhood. Although the big community cleanups are wrapping up for the summer, Kiwanis members will still be out in the neighborhood maintaining community trash cans and keeping their blocks tidy.

Our second Little Free Library, built by two amazing Kiwanis sisters from Trinidad and Tobago during the 2024 Kiwanis International Convention and purchased by our member Shawn Smith, has been installed at the Crafton Heights United Presbyterian Church (CHUP) on Clairhaven Street in Crafton Heights. The box was initially



filled with a special collection of 14 diversity books from the PA District of Kiwanis Justice, Equity, Diversity and Inclusion committee, as well as some other books from our Club. While we will continue to refill the Little Free Library, the staff at the CHUP and the Open Door will also contribute to the Library. This site was selected because of the number of children who pass by the church to attend the Open Door youth center and participate in activities at the church, and for whom the closest public library is not within walking distance, as well as the CHUP members who are willing to help maintain the library.

When Kiwanis International came to Pittsburgh this summer, the city—and our club—rose to the occasion. The 2025 Kiwanis International Convention wasn't just a gathering of members; it was a celebration of service, fellowship, and a chance to show the Kiwanis world what Pittsburgh hospitality looks like.

he week began with a proclamation from Allegheny County declaring "Kiwanis Week." It was a fitting kickoff to an event that would soon fill downtown with gold towels, pirate hats, and the unmistakable energy of Kiwanians making memories together. Sheraden played a starring role. From the moment guests arrived, Marianne Muraska and Maureen Reynolds anchored the District Information Booth, guiding and welcoming attendees with grace and humor. Jeff Carter was everywhere—helping at the information booth, setting up the District Lounge, and pitching in wherever he was needed. Meanwhile, Keith and Tracy Smith worked tirelessly behind the scenes, doing the kind of quiet, steady work that kept everything running without a hitch. The Sheraden Kiwanis Foundation even supplied materials for the towel screen-printing station, which became one of the most popular stops of the convention. Thursday's rooftop party may have been rained indoors, but the Steel City Dragon Dancers kept the energy sky-high with a dazzling performance crafted especially for our guests. On Friday, the Aktion Club Convention brought together members from Pennsylvania and Ohio for an inspiring morning, and that evening, more than 600 Kiwanians packed PNC Park to cheer the Pirates to victory over the Mets. Our delegation lit up the Jumbo tron, and the evening closed with a drone show tribute to Mister Rogers—"A Beautiful Night in the Neighborhood."









Saturday's House of Delegates brought a moment of history: Cathy Szymanski was elected Vice President of Kiwanis International, the first Pennsylvanian to hold the role in over 80 years. Later that day, our own Barb Carter was elected as Governor of the Pennsylvania District for 2025–26. The night closed with the Roaring '20s Gala, a fitting finale to a week already packed with milestones. For me personally, the weekend carried a humbling surprise. During the House of Delegates, I was presented with a Hixon Fellowship, thanks to Governor Tom Harp and Governor-Elect Barb Carter. It was a moment that left me speechless—and deeply grateful. ICON 2025 was possible only because of the dedication, patience, and generosity of countless Kiwanians. To those who volunteered their time, donated items, extended grace when things got hectic, and promoted this convention far and wide—thank you. FLAGS OVER SHERADEN

Our Flags Over Sheraden project, which involves hanging American flags on every telephone pole along Chartiers Avenue from Jeffers Street to Corliss Street for the flag holidays, started the year off great with the Memorial Day holiday. Having purchased the new flags and poles last year, the flags looked bright and majestic, as they should. Since there are multiple flag holidays from late May until early July, we leave the flags up to save time. But this year, disaster struck! On June 18, a semi-truck turned into the parking lot belonging to Conroy Funeral Home, and pulled down wires and four telephone poles on which our flags were hung. When the contractor for Duquesne Light came to replace the damaged poles, they also took our flags and their brackets.

Thankfully, member Pat McGowan was able to provide us with the contact information for the trucking company representative and we were able to file a claim for the replacement of the four flags, their brackets, AND the brackets for the Christmas holiday flags as well. The company was very responsive and we received a check for the full replacement costs. We were able to replace brackets on three of the four poles, but will still need to purchase the new flag kits for next year.



Foundation Updates

The foundation board is committed to ensuring the long-term success of the foundation and the Kiwanis Korner Pavilion. The brick sale is ongoing as a source of revenue to make the necessary repairs and pay the associated costs of owning a property. Andrea Cuda has taken advantage of the auto pay for our water run-off charges on the pavilion. Our non-profit status with the county is still under review but should be finalizing in the next few weeks.



After a thorough assessment of the pavilions current needs, the board has prioritized resurfacing the pavilion and upgrading the electrical infrastructure of the pavilion. We are planning for the addition of more outlets and improved lighting. Shawn Smith is in the process of applying for a grant from Scott Electric to help offset the costs associated with these electrical enhancements.

On October 5, 2025, we will be hosting Bike Pittsburgh as the starting and ending position for a neighborhood walk. We would like to invite all members of the club to join them, if you are able and available. This is a great opportunity to show people from outside the community what a great neighborhood Sheraden is!

Connection & Fellowship – Here, we truly excelled. We joined the St. Patrick's Day Parade as a Region—a tradition that will continue. We started Kiwanis Night at PNC Park, another success that's here to stay.

ICON 2025 - Hosting Kiwanis International in Pittsburgh is nothing short of a triumph, and I'm proud of the role Region 2 has played in making it happen.

Meet Every Club - One promise I kept: I had the privilege of visiting every club in our region, and those conversations remain the highlight of my term.

Gratitude and Passing the Torch

I owe special thanks to Wayne Meyer, Lt. Governor of Division 5, for his steady hand and faithful leadership, and congratulations to David Bigley of Scottdale, who has stepped into the role of Division 8 Lt. Governor with energy and commitment.

It all starts with the members of a Kiwanis club (Sheraden) under the leadership of a PRESIDENT. In our case, that is Maureen Reynolds. In our club, we have officers and an elected board of directors to advise, guide and provide leadership for our club.


Clubs are then clustered together in a division under the leadership of a LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR. For us, that lieutenant governor is Wayne Meyer for District 5.

Several divisions are clustered together into a region under the leadership of a TRUSTEE. Beginning October 1 that trustee is Janine Surmick, from the Greensburg club. Shawn Smith is leaving after three great years as our Trustee of region 2.

All of the regions are then combined into a district headed by a GOVERNOR. (Pennsylvania). On October 1, Tom Harp turns over the role of PA GOVERNOR to our own club Member Barb Carter. Not all states are their own district, but because Pennsylvania has so many members it qualifies as its own district.

Various districts are clustered together under the leadership of an INTERNATIONAL TRUSTEE. Our International Trustee will be Cathy Tutty.

The International trustees then report to the INTERNATIONAL VICE PRESIDENT (25-26 Cathy Szymanski), the PRESIDENT Elect (25-26 Hope Markes) and finally the INTERNATIONAL PRESIDENT (25-26 Michael Mulhaul). Just like any large corporation, there is a chain of leadership that provides the checks and balances that keep our Kiwanis organization running.
