

Remembering Bob Eberhart

Robert Ebehart passed away suddenly Friday, July 10, at the age of 80. Many of you expressed shock at his passing. Mary Lou McFadden wrote, "Bob parked next to me at last Friday's meeting (in late June). We chatted a bit on the way into the Manor!! May he Rest in Peace!!!"

Bob joined our club in 1998. According to Secretary Joe Wolfe, Bob served on our Board for four years. "He introduced us to the Tram driving project at MIS which we worked for many years until the members got 'burned out' and the flag project was adopted," Joe says. The MIS project brought in about \$12,000 a year for the club. President Beth says, "He LOVED Nascar Racing!"


Bob had 17 years of perfect attendance, participated in most of our projects, including the summer Kids' Movies, Newspaper Sale and Interclubs. Bob especially loved the Flag Project. President Beth adds that Bob was very committed to the 'Any Soldier' project, Racing for Dollars, the Chili Golf Classic and passionately pushed every year for support to the Aware Shelter.

Bob was a graduate of Lehigh University (in Pennsylvania where he grew up). He served his country in the Army, in South Korea. He was twice elected to the Jackson Public School Board. His obituary reads, "he strongly advocated for school breakfast programs, the Back-to-Back youth exchange program and high academic standards."

At Immanuel Lutheran Church, Bob helped with its food pantry and made food deliveries.

He also was a sports coach and served on the board of the Irish Hills Girls Scout Council.

Bob leaves behind a wife, Elayne, five children and 11 grandchildren.



Jackson Kiwanians Celebrate and Learn during the International Convention

100 years old! What a celebration! We have the first woman in any service organization as our international president! Thank you Sue Petrisin!

Yes, the convention was a great celebration and the proposals voted on gave a clue to the organization's forward thinking:

- 1. Passed: giving greater flexibility regarding club meeting frequency;
- 2. Passed: the district board may designate another district officer to attend important local meetings if the governor can't attend;
- 3. Passed: allows district conventions to be held up to September 25 (extending timeline 10 days);
- 4. Passed: allowing the district vice-governor to be a delegate-at-large at international conventions:
- 5. Passed: to permanently adopt corporate memberships;
- 6. Failed: not allowing web-based voting at international conventions, for locals not able to attend:
- 7. Passed: raising the international dues \$10;
- 8. Failed: not allowing international dues to be adjusted annually;
- 9. Failed: not allowing changes in wording of international authority regarding foundations and affiliate entities.

Our local attendees took advantage of the great workshops offered. Chandra and Adam Howard, Jim and I gathered great input about playground ideas, Kids Against Hunger ideas, planning our own 100 year celebration in two years, working with the media, Eliminate, enriching our service leadership clubs, The Formula, membership enrichment, trends about generation Z, partnering in the community, identifying if we are perceived as a philanthropic or service oriented club; social media and signature projects. Makes for some great future programs don't you think? Sounds like a lot of work too, doesn't it?

Well, we had some fun too! The theme throughout the weekend was a look back through time. We enjoyed a huge pancake lunch, at the downtown square of Indianapolis, which accepted donations for the Eliminate Project. Homeless people were welcome guests and no one went away hungry. Club's Donation to Birthline Helps Moms Like Sierra

In the July newsletter, you learned that our club donated \$1,000 to Birthline for the purchase of six cribs/toddler beds. Birthline sent us a thank you letter and wrote this: "The clients take classes in the Earn While You Earn Program to obtain Baby Dollars plus keep scheduled appointments, keep prenatal appointments, go to school actively, work 20 hours week, bring in new clients, etc. For the mattresses, they must pay Baby Dollars and take two SIDS classes and for cribs they pay Baby Dollars and must write a meaningful essay about what they have learned and benefited from attending classes."

In one of those essays, client Sierra shared what she learned from those classes. She wrote "The more lessons I take, the better I feel about myself, my marriage, and my parenting. It helps to know that I am not alone and that there are other people going through the same situations that I am... (They have) made me a more understanding and better person, parent, and wife."
