The president-elect of Kiwanis International, Katrina Baranko from Albany, Georgia, will be the interclub luncheon keynote speaker at the Alabama District's Midwinter Conference in Prattville Feb. 17-18.

Inspiring speakers and educational sessions plus fun, games and a Mardi Gras theme await Kiwanians at the Marriott Hotel and Conference Center in Prattville.

The registration fee runs from \$100 to \$150, depending on how many meals you sign up for. The \$100 fee includes the Saturday interclub luncheon. Add \$25 for Friday's evening buffet dinner and \$25 for Saturday's networking breakfast.

'Amazing growth trajectory': New clubs adding up

The Alabama District's club-building momentum is continuing in 2022-23, with two new clubs organized before the holidays and four more scheduled.

Eight new clubs — one per division — were added in 2021-22. The Alabama District led North America with the highest net positive percentage membership growth at 3.9 percent.

With the two organized in the fall and four more planned, the district is on track for six and is looking at locations to add more clubs. More clubs and members mean

Kiwanis-sponsored state spelling bee scheduled March 18 in Birmingham

The 2023 Alabama Spelling Bee, a signature project of the Alabama Kiwanis Foundation, is scheduled for Saturday, March 18, in Birmingham.

The statewide bee is set to start at noon in University Hall at the University of Alabama at Birmingham.

According to Susan McDougal of Huntsville, executive director for the Alabama Spelling Bee, more than 730 schools across Alabama have registered for the Alabama Spelling Bee program (the school registration deadline was Dec. 31).

There are 56 counties represented, with Kiwanis clubs sponsoring four of their respective county spelling bees.

She gave some tips on how Kiwanians can help in their home areas.

Two counties do not have a county sponsor: Marengo and Conecuh.

"If your club is in one of these two counties or close by, please consider sponsoring the local bee to give your club exposure, along with serving the students in your area," McDougal said.

"If you already have someone coordinating the bee in your county, reach out to that county coordinator and offer prizes to the winners, offer to be judges or serve in another official capacity, and encourage schools in your area to participate next year by offering to pay the registration fee," she said.

Contact information for McDougal and other Spelling Bee information also can be found at that site.

"This is a signature project for the Alabama Kiwanis Foundation, and we would love to see more participation from the clubs in our district," McDougal said.

Like father, like son: Kiwanis service has become a Bradley family tradition

Civic club service can become a family tradition. Just take a look at the Bradleys' involvement in civic work in the Birmingham area.

David Bradley is a 43-year charter member of the Hoover-Metro Kiwanis Club who has served in almost every position, including president twice, vice president, and secretary. Most importantly, he taught his son to serve, too.

At various times, David headed fundraising, pancake breakfast, golf tournament and other committees, as well as serving on the club board from 1979 to 2019 and having perfect attendance many of those years. At the state level, he served on the Alabama Kiwanis Foundation board and was annual club giving chair in 2019-22.

Different roles, different clubs

Sometimes David and his son, Owen Bradley, a Kiwanian for 20 years, work on fundraising or other service projects for the same purpose but through different roles and different clubs.

David's club last year spearheaded what started as a local project to help Maranathan Academy get a library. Other Kiwanians joined in, and soon Owen, a member of Homewood-Mountain Brook Kiwanis, headed up the first Kiwanis "Speed Stampede" run through Homewood as a fundraiser for Maranathan.

Several years ago they were members of the same club, when Owen was a dual member of the Hoover club while serving as a lieutenant governor.

Both started with Key Club

Both father and son were involved in Key Club. David, now 72, attended Gadsden High School, where his Key Club supported the citywide Gadsden Kiwanis Pancake Day. That experience was "a great introduction to Kiwanis," he said.

Owen, 43, said, "Some of my earliest memories are going to Kiwanis service projects with my dad, like his Hoover club's Pancake Day at Green Valley Elementary School and their Christmas tree lot fundraiser." Later Owen was a Key Club member and officer at Hoover High School, and since then he has been a member of four different Kiwanis clubs.

After earning bachelor's and master's degrees at the University of Alabama, Owen began work in the banking field and, in 2003, joined the Kiwanis Club of Tuscaloosa. When he moved to Birmingham in 2006, he first joined the Birmingham Metro club, which is no longer active, and then the Homewood-Mountain Brook club about 2015. He served as president of both clubs.

For Homewood-Mountain Brook Kiwanis, he also has been Pancake Day sponsorship chairman, as well as race director for the Speed Stampede that raised funds for Maranathan Academy (see related story in this Kiwanis Kourier).

That event was of special interest to Peter Mancuso of New York, a runner himself, who participated while visiting Birmingham in February 2022 to address the Alabama Midwinter Conference in his role as president of Kiwanis International.

"It was very moving to be able to raise over \$10,000 for Maranathan Academy, which provides funding for critically at-risk children to have a chance at a real education," said Owen, who is a corporate commercial real estate banker for Renasant Bank.

"Giving back to people in need around your local community is truly how to make the world a better place," he said. "In high school, I lettered in community service as well as soccer, so community service has been a part of my life for 25 years."

A family pastime

How did Kiwanis become a father-son activity?

"Being a good Kiwanian does take some time," said David. "From an early age, Owen saw my Kiwanis involvement, and I included him in Kiwanis activities when appropriate.

How a small private school became a statewide project for Kiwanians

A year ago at the Alabama Midwinter Conference in Birmingham, Kiwanians met the executive director and several students of Maranathan Academy, a small private school that helps at-risk students. Members of Hoover-Metro Kiwanis and others were already helping the school, and statewide fundraising started at that conference. Deborah O'Hara, a past president of the Hoover club who won the 2021-22 Past Governors Award for her support of Maranathan, takes a look back at the service project's beginning a year ago and gives an update.

I first met the founder and director of Maranathan Academy, a small, private school for critically at-risk stu-

dents, about three years ago. Her name was Donna Dukes, and when she spoke to our Hoover-Metro Kiwanis Club, I was absolutely blown away by her presentation.

For me, as a former educator, it was riveting. Her demonstration of commitment and love for these children was moving, as was her determination to set them on a path away from poverty, dependency, bullying or crime, and toward education, self-help, mindfulness, honor and work ethic. And this was still going on amidst the additional challenges that Covid dealt them.

I knew I wanted to help as much as possible. I began working with the students who needed extra help in math. I also filled in as the math teacher for a

few weeks until they found a full-time math teacher. That gave me the opportunity to see what the students were really like, and I fell in love with them! Being able to work with them one on one was a chance to connect in a way that was rewarding.

Mentors and more

There were also a number of our club members — Bob Brown, Jerry McClain, Bill Hart and Dave Patton — who were willing to serve as mentors for the students.

While the pandemic was a deterrent to very much interaction with the students, we thought of other ways to help the school. Bob Brown (a past district governor) and I began talking to other

Kiwanis clubs to help Ms. Dukes get speaking engagements. We also spent time talking with past governors Scott Sims and Colean Black, members of the Homewood-Mountain Brook Kiwanis Club, about a vision for helping Maranathan Academy, and they were all in to help in any way.

Eventually Maranathan Academy was able to move from renting some small space in a church in downtown Birmingham, to a building where they could have more room.

We learned from Ms. Dukes there was a great need to convert one of the rooms into a library, and there was a huge need for books and shelving.

Looking for ways to help

We began to think of ways to help Maranathan achieve this goal. My husband, Charlie O'Hara, was in charge of drawing up a plan to build shelving for the books. Charlie picked out the wood for the shelving (paid for by our Hoover club) and we put together a team.

Bill Hart, Bob Brown, Tim Smith and Dave Patton all gathered in our garage to construct the shelves. They were able to bring some of the cut wood to the school, and Charlie showed a few of the boys how to drill and connect the shelves together.

While this was happening, the Feb. 19 date was

approaching for the Alabama District Midwinter Conference to be held in Birmingham.

Money made at Midwinter

District Governor Scott Sims had the idea to hold a "fun run" on the morning of the conference. Owen Bradley, a member of the Homewood-Mountain Brook Club and an avid runner, completely designed and organized the run, with the proceeds to be donated to Maranathan Academy.

A special guest, Kiwanis International President Peter Mancuso, also participated in the run/walk.

With the proceeds from that "Speed Stampede," plus a large donation from the Homewood-Mountain Brook club and donations from other clubs and individuals, a check for \$12,000 was presented to Maranathan Academy.


Sims invited Donna Dukes to speak at the conference. She also brought with her five of her students who joined her newly formed Key Club at Maranathan.

After her very moving speech and a standing ovation, we asked the audience to try to contribute, if they could, a small amount to our library book project. Our goal was to collect \$832 to buy one set of books, but our conference audience members were very generous in their donations, and we collected \$2,043.

I had previously contacted Josh Barronton, business development manager for Barnes & Noble, and he was able to offer a 30% discount on the books.

I asked Bob Brown to work with him and the school's English teacher to produce a list of the books they wanted. They asked for a set of classic literature titles, and with the donations and the discount we were able to buy two complete sets plus 10 additional titles.

It was nice to find out from the English teacher that the students really liked the classic literature.

All of this happened over the course of a year and a half of just talking to others about Ms. Dukes and Maranathan Academy, and letting others know about how great the school was.

Dedication ceremony

When the bookcases were finished and delivered to the school and the painting was done, the books were shipped. Since so many people and clubs contributed to this project, we printed stickers and placed them in the books to show they were donated by the Alabama District of Kiwanis.

Then our last action was to hold a small dedication ceremony at the school after the new school term began. The



books were placed on the shelves while the students were out, and on the day of the dedication ceremony, the students were shown the completed library. We could see immediately how pleased they were. That was worth it all!

A check, a plaque

We had a dedication prayer, and then our Hoover-Metro Club presented Ms. Dukes with a \$9,000 check for Maranathan Academy. And finally we presented them with a small plaque, which read:

The books and shelving for this library are dedicated to Maranathan Academy in honor of the tremendous effort, love, and commitment demonstrated by the faculty and students.

With admiration, from the Alabama District of Kiwanis, 2022.

I don't believe I've ever participated in any charitable donation or any service project

that was as pleasurable, heart-warming and fulfilling as this service project.

In my view, this was a statewide service project, and one in which every Kiwanis member in our district had a hand, either physically or with a donation by themselves or their club.

This is a wonderful school with wonderful people, and it is worthy of our ongoing support.

Talladega-Lincoln area gets the first new Alabama Kiwanis club of '22-23

Alabama District Governor Mary Hoerlein got her term off to a fast start with the addition of a new club in the first month of the new Kiwanis year.

The Kiwanis Club of Talladega-Lincoln was organized on Oct. 27 with 17 charter members.

The recruiting effort for this new club was led by Division 4 Lt. Governor Marvin Wagoner, with tremendous support from Kiwanis International Club Opening Specialist Rogena Woods-Mitchell, who is also governor-elect for the Louisiana-Mississippi-Tennessee District.

Alabama's Immediate Past Governor Scott Sims was on hand to speak to the new club and help oversee the election of officers.

Kristi Sayers, a former member of the Kiwanis Club of Indian Springs, was elected charter president. Others elected include Lisa Johnson, vice president/president-elect; Bernadette Doles, secretary; and Danna Crocker, treasurer.

The new club quickly got right into service (see photos, Page 22). They delivered food for Thanksgiving dinners to 10 families and then boxes of Christmas gifts to more families.

"He heard me say many times that my rewards were far greater than any sacrifices that I had made," David said. "While Owen being a Kiwanian made me happy, that was his decision!"

Through the years, they have both attended many Kiwanis conventions. Their Kiwanis clubs have had many joint projects, too, from reading to children at Birmingham Head Start to working with challenged youths at Maranathan Academy, plus social events such as Kiwanis Night at a Birmingham Barons baseball game.

Serving more children

David likes doing community service because "receiving so many smiles and heartfelt thank-yous from the children we have served is a very reinforcing reward." This especially applies to the Hoover club's projects such as serving meals at Camp Smile-A-Mile, which benefits children who have survived cancer, plus their parents and siblings.

He gets to see the connection between the fundraising

and the children who benefit. "During the three years I served as the Alabama Kiwanis Foundation chair for Annual Club Giving, each year we set a new record amount of money donated by Alabama clubs," David said. "That allowed for additional Alabama children to be served by the Alabama Kiwanis Foundation."

David had more ways of serving others. After he graduated from the University of Alabama, he volunteered in the Alabama Air National Guard for a six-year term. 2023 Signature Project Contest deadline near

Has your Kiwanis club thought about entering its Signature Project in the annual worldwide competition?

It's time to do it.

Kiwanis International's deadline to submit entries is Jan. 27 at 11:59 p.m. EST (10:59 in Alabama).

Alabama Kiwanis Past Governor Mark Kellerman, district contest coordinator, says Alabama clubs should gather the information on their projects, such as the estimated number of people participating and the number served, and complete the online forms soon. (Entry forms must be submitted entirely online, so allow extra time to handle technical difficulties.)

The Alabama District had the top prize winner in the large club category in 2019, when the Kiwanis Club of Montgomery took home top international honors for its long-running fair, a project that thrills thousands of children while also raising funds that are donated to organizations serving children in the Montgomery area.

Then in 2022, the Kiwanis Club of Decatur was named a top 10 finalist in the large club category for its many years of pancake days that raise money for projects serving children and teens.

This year, your club could be a winner.

The Kiwanis Club of Montgomery took home top international honors in 2019 for its long-running fair, a project that thrills thousands of children while also raising funds for organizations serving children.

What is your Signature Project? Think about what your Kiwanis club is known for in your community. It can be a service project or a fundraiser.

Signature Projects typically are recurring; they enhance the Kiwanis image; they demonstrate significant impact on the community in terms of money raised or children served; and they strengthen membership and partnership opportunities.

Growing for 7 years

This event has been growing each year since it started in 2017 to highlight the many types of service accomplished by Kiwanians. Winning clubs in both large and small club categories are recognized at international conventions.

More than 420 club entries from

around the world are received annually, helping everyone learn about the amazing things Kiwanis members are doing in their communities to help others.

To enter, clubs should complete the form at tinyurl.com/signature-project, containing questions about their club's signature project. It is recommended that clubs copy the list of contest questions from the link above to help them gather the information they'll need to complete the entry form.

Two levels of judging

The competition will be judged at two levels. After the entry deadline Jan. 27, Kiwanis International will send the online entries to each district, where judges will choose two Signature Projects to represent the district. Those two entries will include one from Group I clubs (27 or fewer members) and one from Group II clubs (28 or more members).

The district should send its two winning picks to KI no later than Feb. 17 for the international judging. Districts will be notified in early April if either of their club projects have been selected for the Top 10.


