A Week That Matters

The National Weather Service has called the United States "the most severe- weather-prone country on Earth."

The risk of severe weather in the Midwest is greatest during the season just ahead, when Ohio faces the possibility of strong winds, lashing rain, floods and tornadoes.

The Ohio Emergency Management Agency acknowledges this threat with its Severe Weather Awareness Week, March 22-26, 2022. It's a perfect time to consider the things we can all do **before** emergencies happen.

It's a good time to review your emergency plan for your home. Where in your home will you take shelter during a severe storm? Is your severe weather emergency kit ready, containing everything you'll need if a storm interrupts electric power to your home? Are you familiar with different kinds of weather alerts? During Severe Weather Awareness Week, you'll hear test weather alerts on TV, radio and your mobile phone.

As Kiwanians, we can do more - by learning how to become volunteers in relief operations. Volunteers do important work - but not before they're trained. How do you find the training? Invite representatives from the Red Cross and your local emergency management agency to speak at your club.

Kiwanians and their clubs can also help relief efforts by contributing to the Ohio District Kiwanis Foundation's Disaster Relief Fund – the fund that offers emergency grants when disaster strikes. Visit odkf.org and choose the Governor's Project link to learn details on how support the project.

You and your fellow Kiwanians will learn how you can help when the need is greatest.

Thanks, everyone, for your support of the Governor's Project. I hope you'll make sure your own home disaster plans are in order. As Governor Craig Smith reminds us, never underestimate the impact of a disaster.

"Mission: Advance Task Force" Applications Being Accepted -Jim Janosik, Executive Director

I am fond of the quote "you're either riding the wave of change, or you're under it." Change happens all the time in our organization, and how we handle change can either be positive (by being proactive) or negative (by being reactive). One of the changes that will affect our District at some point in the future is how our District board is structured and operates, a model that largely has not changed since Lt. Governor's were added back in the 1920's.

In recognition of needing to plan for a possible future change that meets today's needs of our District and its clubs, Governor Craig Smith and Governor-Elect Dave Kuhn are announcing the creation of an ad hoc committee to address this issue.

The "Mission: Advance Task Force" will be composed of up to 11 appointed Ohio Kiwanians that will represent clubs of various sizes and in various regions, as well as a few ex-officio members. The Task Force will select its own chair, vice-chair, and scribe from amongst its members, and will be empowered with the tools necessary to conduct meetings, research, and outreach activities. The following is a list of boundaries, considerations, and deliverables for the Task Force.

Boundaries

- The team is not obligated to recommend implementation.
- Review does not include: staffing other than recommendations for a new paid position(s); physical/virtual office needs; changes to the Governor office.
- The team may benchmark with other Kiwanis Districts and/or other non-profits.
- The team should solicit direct input and proposal feedback from members of Ohio District Kiwanis by conducting regional roundtable discussions with clubs.
- Recommended changes to District Bylaws and Policies must be approved in accordance with District and KI Bylaws in effect at the time of the recommendations.

Considerations

- Effect on leadership pipeline.
- Potential for regional dominance by a small number of clubs.
- Does implementation create a new layer of bureaucracy?
- What is the status of Past Lt. Governors, if implemented?
- Should associations of past officers be included as committees?
- Should the District add a Vice-governor position preceding Governor-elect?

Deliverables

- The team will maintain records of meetings and all documents used as references.
- The team will maintain drafts of all recommendation documents until final approval by the House of Delegates, Board of Directors, and/or KI.
- The team's chair will make end-of-quarter reports to the Executive Committee.
- A report of the team's recommendations, which will include:
- * Potential positive and negative impacts on the District
- * An implementation schedule for any recommended structure changes
- Proposed amendments to District Bylaws
- Proposed revisions to District policies

With a goal of bringing a finalized proposal to the District Board in March 2023 for a decision to bring forth to the 2023 House of Delegates, the District Board structure modernization would be slated to take effect October 1, 2024 in order to allow enough time for the changes to be implemented. Social media is something that people are using every day and most likely multiple times a day. It's a great way to stay connected to those near and far, learn about local events in your area and be a great place for personal expression. It's also a wonderful way to promote your Kiwanis club and share more about the wonderful things you are doing in your community each and every day.

The challenge with social media is that attention doesn't always equal membership growth. Even the potential members that reach out to you through social media need to be guided into membership. Here are a few ways to use social media to help grow your club's membership:

- 1. **Respond quickly and offer lots of details.** Respond to messages within 24 hours and provide necessary context to give the person insight to what they will experience when meeting you.
- 2. **Keep your social media up to date.** A potential members isn't going to know about what your club is all about if you aren't posting regularly. Try to post content on your channels at least once a week that gives a potential member an idea of what your club does in the community and the impact you are making throughout the year.
- 3. **Do some advertising!** Utilize the advertising opportunities on each platform to reach more people in our area. A small amount of money can go a long way in getting your message to more people.



It was Christmas Eve. My husband and I were a bundle of nerves, and I was on the verge of tears. We sat in the parking lot of the Children's Services Building waiting to pick up our foster daughter. She had just spent her first overnight stay with her birth mother, and we had been plagued with "what if's" the entire time. Prayers for her safety had flown from my mouth continually. Now, she was a half hour late returning.

Finally, an overpacked car pulled into the drive and Baby Girl's mother jumped out of the backseat and proceeded to thrust the toddler into my arms before jumping back into the car and leaving without a word. That precious child wrapped her arms around my neck and refused to let go, even to be strapped into her seat. So, I rode back home in the backseat, with her clutching my head against her chest, because my hand was not enough.

The plan was to simply give her a bath, feed her, then return for Christmas Eve services at our church. It wasn't to be. We gave her a snack as soon as we returned home while her little tub was filled for a bath. It wasn't until her diaper was removed that I made the horrific discovery. The diaper was saturated, so filled with urine it was a wonder it had stayed on at all. I don't think it could have held another drop. She was red with a violent rash and even worse, the delicate skin between her legs was coming off in long strips. It was a miracle this child was not shrieking in pain.

I called a pediatric nurse friend, who told me to document it and gave me suggestions on care. She stated there was nothing the emergency room would be able to do for her beyond what she suggested. For a week, I teared up every time I changed that baby's diaper. I was angry at her mother, beyond words.

In hindsight, I realize now, it was unlikely the mother had extra diapers, but we were following instructions for the visit regarding supplies. It doesn't lift the burden of guilt I have carried for six years for our possible contribution to Baby Girl's injury.

Diapers are such a simple thing; we don't really give them much thought. There is an assumption they are made available through programs like W.I.C. or S.N.A.P., but they are not. Like baby wipes, ointment, and other personal care items they are not covered in any sort of program for families struggling to make ends meet. If they are lucky, the local food bank might have small packs available which might last 3-4 days.

The lack of clean diapers can greatly imperil the health of a child (and adults), it can spread hepatitis A, meningitis, staph and cause urinary infections, severe bacterial diarrheas and even renal failure. As we discovered, it can cause the delicate skin around genitals to break down from constant contact and provide open wounds for infection to set in.

A lack of diapers can also have a direct impact on a family's ability to seek employment or attend school. Most daycares and early education programs require a full days' worth of disposable diapers for each child attending. Without such a resource, parents will be required to stay home from school or work without access to childcare.

So, what can be done? Donating to diaper banks or even to the local food banks, either community based or through local charitable entities such as "Walk the Talk Ministries" or "Emergency Clearing House" can make a stark difference. Most food banks tend to repackage boxes into bundles of 20-25 to make the donation go further.

The Bottoms Up Diaper Bank located in Lancaster will be participating in the "World's Largest Diaper Drive" on May 7 in conjunction with other diaper banks in Youngstown, Akron, Canton, Cincinnati, and Columbus. Their goal for their local drive is to collect 500,000 diapers through donations from schools, churches, schools, businesses, and civic groups. Diapers will then distributed through established food banks and various shelters who have requested assistance.

Even if we do not have immediate access to a local diaper bank, we can step up to donate diapers or pull-ups of all sizes to our local community shelters and food banks so families in need can access these vital items. Most organizations will even accept partial packages since children outgrow them so quickly.

It would be terrific if our service community could come together to help protect our youngest members on Diaper Drive Day on May 7, and throughout the rest of the year. No one should ever have to be in a soiled diaper a moment longer than necessary

Your Kiwanis Club and Teacher Appreciation Day

A mainstay of Kiwanis Clubs is their close connection to students and schools. From elementary schools through colleges and universities, Kiwanis supports students, directly, through leadership programs, accomplishment rewards, and many forms of volunteering. A great way to support students in a distinctive, indirect way is to do something for the individuals who have the greatest impact on the students' learning, the teachers.

Teacher Appreciation Day is an event held annually in the United States to honor and appreciate teachers and to recognize their lasting contributions to education, society and the lives of their students. Teacher Appreciation Day is Tuesday of the first full week of May and is the focal day of Teacher Appreciation Week, a week-long celebration of the work of teachers. This year's Teacher Appreciation Day is May 3, 2022.

Consider tackling one or more projects to recognize and thank teachers in your community. As a Kiwanis club, decide on several projects you'd like to do. Create a goal for your project, check approximate costs, determine the availability of materials and workers, and agree on the scope of the project(s).

After your club's initial planning, contact your local school district's superintendent's office to discuss how your Kiwanis club can recognize teaching staff in the local school buildings. Present your ideas to the administrator for feedback. If your club is already working with (a) particular school(s), speak with the building principal about honoring the teachers in that/those school(s).

Here are some ways your Kiwanis club can, with prior approval, honor teachers in your local schools:

- ◆Cakes, cookies or doughnuts to the school office office staff will place in the appropriate location,
- ◆volunteer to cover recess, cafeteria, and/or bus duty,
- volunteer to read in elementary classrooms,
- deliver thank you notes to all teachers,
- give gift cards to all teachers,
- ♦ assemble and give mason jars of treats,
- ♦hire a masseuse/masseur to give massages during plan periods,
- hire a barista to make beverages,
- cater lunch for staff,
- provide supplies for ice cream floats,
- ◆bring in food or ice cream truck (pay for lunches or ice cream),
- ♦do a lunch cookout,
- ♦host a "thank you" breakfast,
- purchase business cards for teachers,
- ◆present "From the Desk of" note pads or sticky notes,
- ◆give personalized coffee mugs (include your Kiwanis club name on them),
- arrange for dinner between school and evening parent-teacher conferences (this would have to be a pre-Teacher Appreciation Day event),
- ◆pay for a highly-visible billboard thanking teachers from your Kiwanis club,
- ◆rent a popcorn machine (w/supplies) in teacher lunchroom, for the week,
- •place "thank you" banners in the front yards of schools,
- ◆coordinate with local and national restaurants to offer Teacher Appreciation Day deals,
- ♦ set up weeklong prize giveaways with one winner announced each day. Winner picks a prize from a selection of gift cards.

As you consider honoring school teaching staff, consider recognizing other groups within the school – nurses, librarians, nurses, secretaries, custodians, bus drivers, and principals. There are fewer staff members in each of these groups, but all are part of the education process of the young people.

Take this opportunity to solidify the Kiwanis-school connection. The payoff is worth the work and funds invested. You will be recognizing the local schools' teaching staffs and the community will have a greater knowledge of what Kiwanis is all about.

Ohio District Kiwanis to Co-Sponsor Family Membership Amendment

Do you enjoy your Kiwanis membership? Would you like to share it with others? Do you want to strengthen the membership, service, and finances of your Kiwanis club? If your answer to these questions is yes then the proposed Kiwanis International by-law Family Membership amendment is for you and needs your support.



The Ohio District of Kiwanis International, along with the Pacific Northwest District, the New England & Bermuda District, and the Texas Oklahoma District, is co-sponsoring a family membership amendment to be voted on at the Kiwanis International Convention this June in Indianapolis, IN. In summary the proposed amendment would allow for the following:

- ⇒ One family member sharing a residence with a current Kiwanis member may join the same Kiwanis club and pay only 50% of Kiwanis International and District dues (assuming Ohio passes a similar by-law amendment which is a requirement of the proposed International amendment).
- ⇒ A current Kiwanis member that qualifies for family membership may convert to the family membership plan, but the dues reduction would phase in over two years paying 75% of International and District dues in year one and then 50% in future years.
- ⇒ All other member related fees including, but not limited to, insurance, local club dues, etc shall remain fully payable. Although clubs will have the option to also reduce the club portion of the dues if they desire.
- ⇒ A new club being formed must have 15 full dues paying members before family members can be added.
- ⇒ Family members will have full rights and privileges of club membership.
- ⇒ Family membership may not be transferred to another club.

Many of you may remember when Ohio participated in the family membership pilot program several years ago that was later discontinued by Kiwanis International. The pilot Districts, Ohio, New England and Bermuda, and Pacific Northwest, all found value in this membership option as a way to strengthen club membership, increase service, and bring new ideas to their clubs and have chosen to continue to work to try and bring this additional membership option to Kiwanis International. During the pilot program and by analysis of data thereafter, Ohio found that when members joined as family members sharing their Kiwanis experience with another family member, they tended to be more active in their clubs and remain a Kiwanis member longer because it was an experience and service they were sharing and had in common.

It takes a two-thirds vote of delegates in attendance at the Kiwanis International Convention to pass this proposal. A similar proposal was presented in 2018 and 2019 with favorable votes of about 53% in 2018 and about 60% in 2019. Close, with an improving trend, but short of the two thirds needed for passage. Therefore, we are asking for the help of Ohio Kiwanians to plan on attending the Kiwanis International Convention in Indianapolis in June and help support the Family Membership Amendment. Other benefits of attending the convention include hearing interesting and motivating speakers, attending educational workshops to learn new ideas to bring back to your club, and networking with other service minded individuals to share and gain new ideas. Once the new officers are in place, the outgoing and incoming officers can work with their sponsoring Kiwanis Club to review the previous years activities and plan for new or improved activities for the upcoming year.

The following is a guideline:

Aktion Club-Election of new officers should be conducted at a meeting during the spring or summer. The new officers should

assume their responsibilities on October 1.

Circle K-Election results must be submitted no later than April 1 to Circle K International and their District Secretary. Therefore, elections of officers and directors must take place prior to that. Spring Officers Training (SpOT) is generally held in late April or early May, all officers are encouraged to attend. Officers are encouraged to review distinguished club officer criteria under District Convention Contest as a guideline. https://ohiocki.org/district-convention-awards/

Key Club-Elections must take place between February and March and reported to Key Club International as well as the Ohio District Office by March 31. Report forms are available on the Key Club District website under Convention forms. In last month's issue of the Buckeye Bulletin, there were some great resources provided for clubs to help manage their own Foundation. When a club starts their own Foundation, this does help get around the classification of Kiwanis as a 501(c)4. By having a club Foundation, a Kiwanis Club can designate this entity as a 501(c)3 and benefit from tax deductible donations as well as the other perks that come along with this designation. I would like to provide another resource

that your club could utilize to help in this process. The Ohio District Kiwanis Foundation has a program called Club Advised Funds, or CAFs for short. These funds are set up to help clubs have a 501(c)3 'branch' of their club. One of the major benefits of having a CAF is that a club does not have to worry about all of the extra, sometimes overly complicated, paperwork that comes with setting up, and maintaining, a Foundation. In simple terms, a club can invest their money with ODKF's larger pool of investments. ODKF maintains ownership of the CAF but the club may use the growing fund to support their projects. The club needs to simply request a disbursement through the ODKF board for a charitable non-profit organization. In order to set up a CAF, a club must have an initial investment of at least \$5,000. Once that amount is secured, the club should schedule a meeting with the ODKF Executive Director to discuss the process and ensure a CAF is a good fit for the club. There is also an agreement form to be completed. The club should also have their board of directors approve the establishment of the CAF with ODKF and designate two members who will be responsible for the depositing of funds. Once the ODKF board approves the CAF, the club can then deposit the initial \$5,000, or more, into the fund. It really is an easy process.

Some clubs may not have the initial \$5,000. If that is the case, perhaps a mini CAF would work for the club. In this program the club makes an initial deposit of \$2,500. Then, the club has up to two (2) years to make enough deposits to reach the \$5,000 level. If for some reason the club cannot deposit enough money by the end of the two (2) years, the original amount will be returned to the club without investment earnings.

A CAF does come with a 1% annual fee of the portfolio balance for administration related tasks for funds that total less than \$100,000. If your fund is more than \$100,000, the fee is .75%. Additionally, there are fees charged by the financial advisor which are about 1%. As stated earlier, ODKF assumes all responsibility for filing necessary paperwork to start and sustain the CAF.

There are currently almost 40 clubs in Ohio that maintain a CAF through your Ohio District Kiwanis Foundation. The process really is an easy one and ODKF works hard to ensure that it stays easy for clubs that want to start a CAF or a mini CAF. Columbus Kiwanis Club Succeeds in Spite of Virus

Through two pandemics, two world wars, the Great Depression and other economic disruptions, Kiwanis Club of Columbus has maintained its support of children and families in need in central Ohio. This year, despite virus-induced restrictions on all its fundraising events, Columbus Kiwanis Foundation Trustees have just approved donations totaling \$58,000 to 12 area non-profits.

Grants range from a low of \$2,000 up to \$14,000, providing support for both new and expanding community projects, some of which include in-school programming at 11 Head Start locations; a soccer program for 250 immigrant and refugee youth from low-income families; a summer camp reading program for elementary age children; and support for children, teens, and their families whose lives have been impacted by pediatric cancer.

During this year's grant cycle, 14 requests totaling over \$90,000 were received by the Club, according to 2021-22 Club President Dan Lacey. "I marveled at the ingenuity of our members to quickly revise old and proven fundraising projects in ways that maintained our corporate and community partnerships while permitting continued member participation without face-to-face interaction," Lacey said. "The result is that we've managed to sidestep Covid's limitations and continue our Club's century-old commitment to 'improving the lives of children one community at a time."
