What a year it has been for the Ohio District of Circle K International! With so many amazing accomplishments from this year, it is hard to highlight one area where we have grown this year and really impacted the community. But one thing I am so proud of from our term is the support of my Governor's Project, the American Red Cross.

When announcing the Governor's Project would be supporting the RedCross, I had no idea the support it would get from the District and the Kiwanis Family. The project had 3 objectives: challenging each Circle K club to host at least 1



blood drive throughout the year, challenging each club to have 25% of its members donate blood throughout the year, and fundraising \$2,000 for the Red Cross throughout the year.

I am proud to say that nearly half of our clubs hosted a blood drive, with 2 clubs hosting multiple of them throughout the year! We had numerous members roll up their sleeves to donate blood as well! But the number I am extremely proud of is the fundraising done for the Red Cross throughout the year. We were able to raise a total of \$2,207! That is such an amazing accomplishment for our District and I can't thank everyone who supported the project enough.

While my project may be over, I still encourage anyone willing to donate blood or help to financially support the American Red Cross. As many of you are aware, our District Convention ran concurrent with your MidYear Conference at the Crowne Plaza, Worthington. There will be a dedicated conference room that we plan to outfit with technology to enable quality hybrid/teleconference meetings. That room will be available to clubs, divisions, SLP's, etc. as needed. Additionally, there will be a hoteling office space that ANY member of the District is entitled to use during office hours. It will have a full work station and printing abilities. While the cost to move is not that great, we are taking this opportunity to modernize our office technology and some furnishings. To help raise funds for such, we are going to host an Open House Party on Saturday, May 14th from 12-4pm. You may find more information on that here. There is also the opportunity to support the District Office through our new Donor Wall. Donors will be recognized with their name on a leaf, similar to the sample photo that is posted on our website here.

Help Your Club Grow

The late Kiwanis Governor Bill Snellgrove always reminded our club, and all clubs he spoke to about membership, that it's not enough to add a few new members each year; for a club to continually grow it needs to increase its membership by at least 15% every year. This may seem a large target but is based on historic trends, one being that the average club has about 10% membership turnover every year. Bill was an engineer and very data driven, so I have no doubt he thoroughly

researched this. There are many things we can do to meet this goal.

One thing a club should consider is reducing its annual membership turnover. Each year clubs lose some members because they lose interest - the club's activities no longer meet their needs or fit their schedule. Many clubs have lost members because of the COVID pandemic; not to COVID but because they found other things to fill their time and meet their needs while our clubs were inactive, or projects were on hold. COVID disrupted a lot of members routines.

So ... how do we reduce our turnover, or even bring back those members we lost during the COVID disruption? One starting place is to use the Member Satisfaction Survey to find out what's important to your members. Some people prefer to participate in hands on service projects over attending meetings. Some members may want to attend meetings, but the meeting time doesn't fit their schedule. Some are interested in leadership positions, others aren't. The only way to know what your fellow club members want from their Kiwanis experience is to ask them what they want. The Member Satisfaction Survey provides a guide to answering that question and may lead your club to make meaningful changes that not only help retain members but bring in new members. And interest the 'lost" members we've enough they return to your club.

Okay, you've got the survey results, so now what? That depends on what the survey tells you.

Do club members find the meetings becoming a little monotonous or even boring? We all want meetings to be remembered as a with a meaningful experience. Make one of your meetings a "Club Trivia Contest" or "community Trivia Contest" with prizes. Offer a hands-on service project one meeting each month. Arrange a tour of a school, fire station, or food bank.

Do members want more opportunities for service. Cancel a meeting and ask each member to find somewhere in town to do an hour of service instead, and then report back at the next meeting. Partner with other service clubs, your Service Leadership Club, or other local group to provide additional opportunities for service.

Are members struggling to make the meeting time because of other commitments? Offer an alternate meeting day or time once or twice a month.

The most important outcome of conducting a Member Satisfaction Survey, or simply listening to a members needs and concerns, is they will know they are a valued member of the club. A club member that knows he or she is valued will be more engaged and active. Make sure that everyone who wants to participate has a voice during meetings. Be open to brainstorming, new ideas should always be welcome.

The Member Satisfaction Survey can be found on the Kiwanis International website under Achieving Club Excellence. I encourage every club to download the tool and use it as a guide to develop your own survey.

"Mission: Advance Task Force" Applications Being Accepted -Jim Janosik, Executive Director

I am fond of the quote "you're either riding the wave of change, or you're under it." Change happens all the time in our organization, and how we handle change can either be positive (by being proactive) or negative (by being reactive). One of the changes that will affect our District at some point in the future is how our District board is structured and operates, a model that largely has not changed since Lt. Governor's were added back in the 1920's.

In recognition of needing to plan for a possible future change that meets today's needs of our District and its clubs, Governor Craig Smith and Governor-Elect Dave Kuhn are announcing the creation of an ad hoc committee to address this issue.

The "Mission: Advance Task Force" will be composed of up to 11 appointed Ohio Kiwanians that will represent clubs of various sizes and in various regions, as well as a few ex-officio members. The Task Force will select its own chair, vice-chair, and scribe from amongst its members, and will be empowered with the tools necessary to conduct meetings, research, and outreach activities. The following is a list of boundaries, considerations, and deliverables for the Task Force.

Boundaries

- The team is not obligated to recommend implementation.
- Review does not include: staffing other than recommendations for a new paid position(s); physical/virtual office needs; changes to the Governor office.
- The team may benchmark with other Kiwanis Districts and/or other non-profits.
- The team should solicit direct input and proposal feedback from members of Ohio District Kiwanis by conducting regional roundtable discussions with clubs.
- Recommended changes to District Bylaws and Policies must be approved in accordance with District and KI Bylaws in effect at the time of the recommendations.

Considerations

- Effect on leadership pipeline.
- Potential for regional dominance by a small number of clubs.
- Does implementation create a new layer of bureaucracy?
- What is the status of Past Lt. Governors, if implemented?
- Should associations of past officers be included as committees?
- Should the District add a Vice-governor position preceding Governor-elect?

Deliverables

- The team will maintain records of meetings and all documents used as references.
- The team will maintain drafts of all recommendation documents until final approval by the House of Delegates, Board of Directors, and/or KI.
- The team's chair will make end-of-quarter reports to the Executive Committee.
- A report of the team's recommendations, which will include:
- * Potential positive and negative impacts on the District
- * An implementation schedule for any recommended structure changes
- Proposed amendments to District Bylaws
- Proposed revisions to District policies

With a goal of bringing a finalized proposal to the District Board in March 2023 for a decision to bring forth to the 2023 House of Delegates, the District Board structure modernization would be slated to take effect October 1, 2024 in order to allow enough time for the changes to be implemented. Spring has sprung in Ohio in time-honored fashion: with a string of 70-degree days followed by a number of 30-degree days. The big weather systems from Canada and the Gulf of Mexico have a way of battling it out in the atmosphere above our home state, unleashing great energy into our weather.

One result is well-understood: big storms power destructive tornadoes. Hopefully by now you have a plan for your family in case a tornado strikes: where to take shelter in your home, supplies you'll need in the shelter, and a plan to reach all members of your family during a weather emergency.

But tornadoes are not the only spring-weather hazard. Spring thunderstorms can bring heavy, saturating rain and rapid flooding to streams and low-lying areas.

You might think, if you live on higher ground away from streams, that the danger does not apply to you. But it well might, should you be driving your vehicle through an affected area during rainfall. The National Weather Service says more than half of all flood fatalities occur in vehicles.

The danger may not be obvious to you if you're driving and suddenly see a submerged section of road. The National Weather Service says just 12 inches of rushing water can carry away a small car - and even if you drive a large SUV, driving through flooded areas can make you vulnerable, too especially if the floodwater conceals a hidden hazard, like obstacles in the roadway or a missing manhole cover.


Here's what the National Weather Service advises: Never drive into flooded roadways or around a barricade. Turn around - don't drown!

WORKSHOPS

CKI members hosted four different workshops that touched on various topics that are important. Vivian Corey from The Ohio State University hosted a workshop about the importance of movement and the connection to an open mind. Margaret Lee from the University of Cincinnati hosted a Food Insecurity workshop to discuss the challenges faced by individuals to meet their needs in our community. Governor Ryan hosted a strategic planning workshop to reiterate the idea that setting up a plan will help strengthen your club even if it is a strategic plan that focuses on only major areas like recruitment and retention. Secretary-Treasurer Hannah Riley and River Hills LTG/DCON Chair Allison Knowlton discussed how to keep up with the K-Family and highlighted the Ohio District Kiwanis Family map that is in the process of being updated by the CKI and Key Club boards.

SERVICE PROJECTS & FUNDRAISING

Kiwanis members supported Home for Families (HFF) by donating numerous supplies they needed for "Welcome Home" kitchen, bathroom, and bedroom kits, as well as kitchen and bathroom cleaning kits. CKI members transported all of the donations to HFF along with assembling 100 personal hygiene kits.









In addition to assembling and delivering kits, CKI members raised \$204 through raffle baskets. All of the money from the raffle will be donated to the American Red Cross in support of Governor Ryan's Service Project.



Congratulations, Local Kiwanis Clubs

Longevity is something to be applauded, and that certainly was celebrated Thursday when two local Kiwanis clubs observed something quite special — their 100th anniversary.

The Toronto Kiwanis Club, led by President Jim Orsini, was established Jan. 31, 1922, and the Steubenville Kiwanis Club, led by President Melissa Greco, only days later on Feb. 9.

Both are part of Kiwanis International, one of the largest service organizations in the world, devoted to improving the world, one child and one community at a time. Kiwanis has more than 500,000 members of all ages and abilities in more than 80 nations, according to Kiwanis Ohio Gov. Craig Smith, who was among a group of state representatives on hand to extend congratulations.

The dinner was held at the Hellenic Hall at Holy Trinity Greek Orthodox Church in Steubenville and constituted an evening of reflections and proclamations; special guests and comments; the announcement of special projects each organization will undertake in honor of marking their centennial milestones; and Legion of Honor recognition for longtime members with 25 or more years of service.

Included in that latter mix were two members from opposite clubs whose combined commitment of service totals 110 years. Donald W. "Don" Clarke of the Toronto club is a 56-year member; Paul Brandt of the Steubenville Kiwanis has 54 years to his credit.

The dedication and hard work of the Toronto Kiwanis Club has been a major part of the community, with its officers and members untiring in their financial contributions to many individuals and organizations in the Gem

The Toronto club raises funds each year to assist underprivileged children with coats, hats, shoes and school clothes; provides two \$300 scholarships annually for Toronto High School graduates; and holds a luncheon for the graduating class' top 10 honor students.

In observance of its centennial, the Toronto club will donate \$1,000 to the

Much more to come from the Kiwanis tree-naming project

Mike Marks grows tropical bonsai trees in his house, and that's not all.

"I have trees from four continents, 18 kinds of rainforest ficuses," he said. "I like growing things, so yes, I like trees."

What does this have to do with the Bath-Richfield **Kiwanis** Club? Marks is president of the club. Two things that Kiwanians do is look projects for benefit organizations provide educational opportunities for kids.

According to club Vice President Sue Ann Phillipbar, Marks and club member Laura Yost proposed labeling trees as a Kiwanis project.

"This is something Mike and Laura have been working on for a long time," Phillipbar said. "It's kind of their project."

So Marks has branched out, pardon the expression, from merely nurturing trees in his home to implementing KNOT, which stands for Kiwanis Naming of Trees.

The essence of the Kiwanis project is to label trees by type, include their scientific name plus other information and a "fun fact." According to Marks, the club approved the creation of 72 signs representing 25-30 types of trees, each sign printed with the common name of the tree, its genus and species, a picture of its bark, nut or flower and a fun fact plus the Bath-Richfield Kiwanis logo.

The entire club membership contributed and researched the fun facts used. Marks said four arborists contributed their time to help identify each tree and supply the scientific information.

Marks and Yost wanted to get a jump on winter, so when December began with mild temperatures, several club members started attaching the signs to pre-selected trees along the Carter-Pedigo Trail in Richfield Village.

"We put up 20 of them," Marks said. "We wanted to get some of it done before the end of the year. We also are planning to put up 32 at Eastwood Preserve.

"But that work will have to wait until spring. In addition, Marks wants to expand the project to other parks in Richfield and Bath Township. The Richfield Heritage Preserve, operated by the Richfield Joint Recreation District, is a likely destination. Marks also wants to label trees in at least one park in Bath but has yet to hold discussions with township officials.

"This project has been one and a half years in the making," said Marks, who procured permission to use the CarterPedigo Trail from the Richfield Village Council last summer.

A couple of fun facts for those who won't be trampling through the snow to view the trees:

- * The Shagbark Hickory can live for more than 350 years, and Native Americans used its milk to make corn cakes and hominy.
- The Scots or Scotch Pine is a good nest for owls.

I wish to remind everyone that April is Child Abuse **Awareness Month.** There have been times when talking about this important reminder, that the person rolled their eyes and commented that it doesn't impact their family, I Sarah Roush have to remind them that it most assuredly does, just not in the way they expect. Childhood trauma is real. Almost Sarah@ohiokiwanis.org everyone I know can list at least one incident in their childhood which greatly impacted their lives. It may be a

positive incident or a negative, but there is at least one. That incident impacted the way they behaved or interacted from that point on. You may have developed a phobia (don't get me started about rats) or an exceptional awareness of a scent, or a sound which floods your brain with adrenalin, creating a fight or flight response. Compulsions of hoarding, whether it is food, money, or items can be tied to neglect. It may have made you wary of making friends easily, or resistant to authority.

Most of us are able to function with these, but what if that was all you knew as a child? The people who are supposed to nurture you are indifferent or abusive to you. Denying love, care, and basic human needs such as safety, food and shelter has a direct impact with human development and behavior by hindering the development of the prefrontal cortex of the brain. This leads to a lack of empathy and inability to easily discern right from wrong, and establish loving and functional relationships. That's why so many prison cell blocks are filled with individuals who had terrible childhoods. In 2020 there was 150,673 cases of child abuse for children

aged 2 to five years old in the United States. There was almost five deaths a day related to abuse and neglect.*

We may think of PTSD as something only soldiers endure, it is not. Toxic stress can take many forms, and the best way to deal with it (other than removing the source) is through counseling. Lots and lots of counseling with positive coping mechanisms. For example, the families in Ukraine are facing toxic stress created by war, entire generations will struggle with PTSD for the rest of their lives due to emotional trauma and unstable conditions they are struggling to survive in. Children, right here, in our communities are often also going through trauma which will have long term or deadly impact. In 2020, suicide was the second leading cause of deaths for older students, again, many coming from troubled environments.*

The COVID-19 shutdowns escalated the numbers of children impacted. Many parents struggled with lack of day care while trying to work from home, or suddenly becoming a teacher for their 9 year old who is floundering when remote learning. Having outlets which would have provided opportunities to socialize and children, such as parks, schools, recreational exercise for centers also created stress from isolation, and restlessness. Even separation from family such as grandparents and cousins created emotional issues.

While there is not a lot we can do as Kiwanians to offset these challenges, there are ways we can help. We can support mental health levies in our communities and ensure our schools offer counseling for students (and families) who are struggling, as well as for their caregivers.

We can support community education through webinars or forums available at affordable prices (or free) to attendees, through the local mental health organizations. We can ask the PTA's or school boards to offer information on resources available to parents and caregivers.

We can install "Buddy Benches" on playgrounds at schools and in the community, allowing children to indicate they are sad or lonely.

We can work to remove the stigma attached to mental health issues, regardless of what they are. By doing so, we support our children, our community and our future. We will hopefully reduce future crime, and create a healthier and more engaged community.


