Planning for Tomorrow

What will your club do if its treasurer resigns tomorrow? Who has access to the clubs checking account and savings account? Where are bills sent? Who has the club's credit card?

Have you thought about what will happen if your long-time club secretary can no longer fulfill the required duties? The club secretary not only takes notes at meetings, but the club secretary is also the primary point of contact for the District

and Kiwanis International; maintains the clubs records and ensures that membership data is accurate and up to date. Is there someone else who can step in?

What about a committee chair, your Service Leadership Program Advisor, service project leader, chief fundraiser? What will your club do if one of these key volunteers is on longer available?

Every successful organization, whether it's a Fortune 500 company or a service club, has a succession plan. A succession plan outlines who will take over what duties, who has the storage locker keys and computer passwords, if an individual is unable to continue in their role with the organization.

A succession plan doesn't need to be an encyclopedia. But it should contain the information needed to continue serving our communities with minimal disruption. Here are just some of the simple steps every club should take:

- Appoint an assistant club Secretary and assistant club Treasurer, and make sure they are trained and ready to take over if needed.
- Make sure that there are at least two individuals with access to the club's checking, savings, and other
 accounts. Be sure to review this information annually to make sure that those individuals are still available
 and able to act on the club's behalf.
- Make sure that there is a club member that is willing to step in for the Club's Service Leadership Program Advisor.
- Work with your Service Leadership Program club's Faculty Advisor and the school system to make sure there
 is someone to take over that role.
- Outline the steps for conducting your service projects and fundraisers, including contact information and roles and responsibilities of volunteers.
- Document the usernames and passwords needed to access social media accounts or edit the club's webpage and share the information with the club secretary or president.

I know this seems like a lot to do; a lot of information that needs to be documented. But it needs to be done. I know the consequences of not having a succession plan firsthand. My club recently lost a long-time member who was responsible for our primary fundraiser. It took us several months to gather the information we needed to understand most of the tasks involved with running the operation and over a year later we are still learning how to keep things running smoothly.

There's no time like now, as we elect our officers and board members to serve during the coming Kiwanis year, to begin succession planning. It will be worth the effort.

New Sign Welcomes Seniors

It is no secret that we live in uncertain times. Wars, major weather events and other catastrophes are happening in our world. People find themselves displaced – sometimes permanently. But Kiwanis is and can continue to be a force for good when it comes to helping with refugees in our communities.

Kiwanis International partners have taken leading

roles in helping refugees. For example, UNICEF, a Kiwanis partner with whom we joined forces to raise \$110 million to help eliminate maternal and neonatal tetanus from the world, is actively involved in assisting refugees around the world, including those whose lives have been completely disrupted by the war in Ukraine. Another Kiwanis International partner, the National League of Cities states on its web site that it recently passed a Board resolution in support of the local government officials in Ukraine who are currently mounting a defense against the military assault of the Russian government. Summer Slide and Your Kiwanis Club

"Summer Slide" is a term given to the situation that occurs when students lose some of the achievement gains made during the previous school year. At best, the students don't continue their academic progress. Summer slide happens during the approximately twelve-week summer when traditional-calendar schools are not in session. This is a significant problem that affects a high percentage of young people, particularly those from lower income families in the upper grades.

How can your Kiwanis Club help? There are some avenues your Kiwanis club can explore to help alleviate the problem, including:

- 1.) Contact administrators in your local school districts and offer your club members' volunteer services. Most school districts operate summer reading and math programs for all grade levels. There are often volunteer opportunities for a Kiwanis club to partner with the schools to fill the need. These are not high-stress roles and are a great opportunity for your Kiwanis club to provide community service. It is, also, very rewarding to Kiwanians to watch the young people progress.
- 2.) Contact local literacy centers. Many communities support privately-funded literacy centers that frequently need volunteer tutors to read with clients. There is a heightened need for help during the summer. If volunteer tutoring isn't something your club wants to tackle, consider donating books and/or circulated, reading book backpacks.
- 3.) Support summer enrichment programs. Many schools, churches, "Y"s, and community centers offer summer enrichment programs in many different subjects, not just in reading and math. Frequently, classes are offered to learn foreign languages, cooking, chess, art techniques, gardening, leadership skills, archaeology, puzzles, science, sports, music, insects, and musical theater. Researchers have found that keeping children engaged mentally can help to slow or even reverse summer learning loss. Individual student and course sponsoring opportunities are often available.
- 4.) Sponsor children to summer Day Camps. There are numerous summer day camps available throughout Ohio. Many are hosted by colleges and universities, and encompass challenging curricula for middle and upper grade students. Contact local school counselors to see if they are aware of students who may be attending summer programs and are in need of financial support. Consider sponsoring a Kiwanis scholarship program through a local college or university.

Scholastic, Inc., is a partner with Kiwanis and offers many programs that can help your club support area students during the summer and throughout the school year. Using your computer's/phone's search engine, search for "Kiwanis Scholastic" and you will reach a Scholastic page on the Kiwanis (kiwanis.org) website. That page includes multiple links to programs offered by Scholastic. The Scholastic website (scholastic.com) includes an extensive section of books and other materials available to parents (and non-teachers). Great resources for your club's project.

Community service looks different for every Kiwanis club, but all projects fill needs identified through a collaboration between Kiwanians and target organizations. Summer slide could be a unique issue for your Kiwanis club to tackle.



It's that time again! Clubs should be planning and holding club elections. Key Club, Circle K and Kiwanis Clubs election reports are due by June 1st. Even if your club has multiple year terms or if you are not changing officers—they must be reported via the secretary dashboard.

Kiwanis Brings Christmas Joy to Beloved Park

Coldwater Memorial Park each summer is abuzz with laughter as families swim in the community pool and socialize at ball diamonds and playgrounds.

But as the temperature drops each fall, the town's 1-square-mile park becomes deserted except for the

occasional squirrel.

That all changed during the 2021 Christmas season.

How it all started

Coldwater Kiwanians in 2020 discussed ways the organization could give back to the community. One suggestion was to





decorate the park for Christmas/ Kiwanis members Nancy Hartke and Molly Hay were immediately on board. They felt the park had much to offer long after the summer months ended. The retired educators offered to chair the event.

Community happily jumps on board

Hartke and Hay met multiple times with each other and eventually with other community members to lay the ground work for "Christmas at Memorial Park."

"It truly was a community project!" Hartke said. "So many volunteers worked together to help the idea become a reality."

The response to the public announcement in January 2021 was overwhelming, they said. Individuals, groups and businesses were quick to volunteer time, resources and funds to the Christmas project.

"Nancy and I worked well together but we couldn't have done it without all the different committees, town and business support and the many volunteers," Hay said. "We appreciated help from the entire Kiwanis family including K-Kids, Builders Club, Key Club and Aktion Club, and Kiwanis International for donating shirts and sending a photographer."

Committees were formed a flurry of fun activities were scheduled for the first two weekends in December.

Christmas fun for everyone

Approximately 2,000 people attended the kick-off December 3 featuring a Christmas parade and "Flip the Switch" lighting event. Students from the local school's FFA class drove decorated farm equipment in the parade. Other entries included golf carts with strings of lights and one very large, inflatable Grinch.

The walk-through display in the park featured a 200-foot lighted tunned guarded by life-sized toy soldiers. Walking snowmen, gingerbread, and other holiday characters greeted visitors and posed for photo opps.

The back-to-back weekends included pony rides, ice skating, a Santa village and a dreamy winter wonderland scene at the amphitheater. Santa and Mrs. Claus greeted children in Santa's village at the gazebo.

A special Kids Day was held, and prizes awarded. Totally Promotional donated many of the prizes and provided banners to thank event sponsors.

Families and businesses participated in the Christmas card walk, and young students decorated ornaments for trees in the park. Everyone enjoyed free cookies and cocoa at the Coldwater Kiwanis trailer.

"One young man found the park so mesmerizing that he proposed to his girlfriend during the holidays."
Hartke explained. "A Hallmark moment for sure!"

Many people were found dancing on the winter wonderland stage as they basked in the Christmas spirit she said.

The Psychological Toll of Weather Disasters

Spring is the season many of us can't wait to see during the long cold months in Ohio. As the cold winds and bare trees of winter start to give way to lush green landscape of summer, the skies often fill with angry clouds and destructive winds and rain. Violent tornadoes and flash floods endanger life and property.

When lives are lost to extreme weather, we honor and mourn the dead. When homes and businesses are

damaged or destroyed, we can add up the cost and rebuild. The emotional cost survivors pay is harder to quantify, but no less real.

People react to these disaster-related emotional traumas in a variety of ways. Mental health professionals identify some typical reactions: nightmares, trouble concentrating or remembering things, feelings of withdrawal and disconnection, feelings of anger and irritability among them.

Physical symptoms can follow, including headaches, digestive problems, muscle aches and more.

How will you react if you're displaced by a flood, tornado or other extreme weather event? The best predictor is how you've reacted to other emotional traumas in the past. Everyone has a different history.

What should you do if you're caught up in a disaster? Turn to the coping methods you've used in the past – beginning with finding strength in connecting with people you know and trust. Consider members of your family, trusted friends, a favorite teacher or member of the clergy.

It's also important to keep an eye on others you know who are suffering the emotional toll of a disaster. How are they coping? Talking can help – and when the reaction to trauma persists, in you or others, it's time to seek a mental health professional for further assistance.

Here's hoping Ohio springtime is gentle with us, so we don't suffer the harms outlined above.

Spring and Summer Safety Reminders.

At long last it looks like spring and soon, summer is finally here. Families will be outside enjoying the fine weather with recreational activities and sprucing up their homes and yards. It has long been touted that gardening is an excellent means of boosting both mental and physical health. Soil microbes improve your immune system and sunshine helps boost vitamin d. What is rarely brought up, are the dangers which yard work can

present to children.

It isn't because adults don't care about the perils of working outside, it's more of an assumption that nothing is going to happen, or children will "know better." This often has devastating results.

Obviously, chemicals used on the garden can be of concern, herbicides and pesticides improperly stored or used can create devastating results. Recent research has shown that even low levels of pesticide poisoning can impact young children's neurological and behavioral development. Evidence shows a link between pesticides and neonatal reflexes, psychomotor and mental development, and attention-deficit hyperactivity disorder.

Certain plants are also toxic, especially Foxglove, Lily of the Valley, Bluebells, Hydrangea, Oleander and several types of lilies. Several of these plants can have a direct impact on the heart, especially Foxglove and Oleander and could prove fatal. Young children need to be closely watched to ensure they do not ingest any of these lovely, lethal blossoms.

Were you aware that each year, over 9,400 children are harmed via lawn mowers? Lawn mowers accidents account for 16% of all traumatic amputations for children under the age of 18. Children under the age of five are more likely to suffer fatalities from being ran over, backed over or falling off a lawn mower. Parents should never allow a young child to "ride shotgun" on a lawn mower, these machines are not recreational vehicles and treating them so only courts tragedy.

As children age and approach the responsibilities of mowing grass, the American Pediatric Association has established a set of recommendations for safety which include wearing safety goggles or eyeglasses and

closed toe shoes when using lawn equipment. I would add the use of earmuffs to protect hearing as well.

Several years ago, I saw an eye-popping display of what can happen when a mower blade hits an object. I heard the distinct "chunk" of something being whacked and saw something go flying out the discharge cover. I walked over to our fence and saw a toy car embedded halfway into the new oak post. If a toy can be driven into something this solid- what do you think a rock, toy, branch or dog bone could do to a person? The soft tissue damage could be fatal and the possibility of losing eyesight needs to be considered as well. We must make certain our children (or pets) are not in the path of a lawn equipment when it is in use.

We want families to enjoy the great outdoors together, we just need to ensure steps are taken to remind parents of common-sense perils which need to be considered.

Gardening centers and retail facilities which sell yard equipment and gardening materials would benefit to have flyers with gentle "reminders" to distribute to customers. Libraries could make these available in their community engagement centers. Kiwanis Clubs could challenge their K-Kids and Builders Clubs to create posters to promote yard safety for a public service promotion with the local health department.

Let's all work together to make certain our children are safe at home.
