Aktion Club "FLIES" At Recent Leadership & Education Day

After the cancellation of the 2020 Ohio Aktion Club conference and the 2021 event becoming virtual, the 2022 Leadership & Education Day returned to being in-person. The annual conference, held at Westerville Central High School, celebrated this year's theme – "I Believe I Can Fly". Twelve Ohio Aktion Clubs were in attendance and included our three newest clubs from Columbiana, Clermont, and Ashtabula Counties. 110 enthusiastic Aktion Club members, Advisors, Kiwanians and guests greeted one another and enjoyed the day-long event.

Host Club for this year was The Aktion Club of Knox County. Club members opened the morning session, followed by a welcome from Westerville Mayor, Diane Conley. For the first time, ALL of Ohio's K-Family Governors – Kiwanis Governor Craig Smith with Governor-Elect Dave Kuhn, CKI Governor Margaret Lee, and Key Club Governor Giovanni Stabile -- extended warm welcomes along with our ODKF President, Jason Miller.



Highlighting the opening session was the keynote address, "Kickin' It With Caden" featuring Caden Cox and his dad, Kevin. Caden made history this past Fall by being the first football player with Down's syndrome ever to play on any NCAA campus. Featured on ESPN, Caden is a place kicker for the Hocking College "Hawks" in Nelsonville. Along with his dad, Kevin, Caden shared how he set high goals and worked to achieve them. As a sophomore at Hocking College, Caden has already set his next goal and hopes it might be going to OSU where he wants to play football for -- none other than -- Ryan Day! Knowing Caden, he will make that dream come true.



The rest of the day was filled with workshops, a service fair with new projects Aktion Clubs might adopt and perhaps team up with their sponsoring Kiwanis Clubs. After lunch, attendees took a musical break. Zayne Harshaw, lead guitarist for his band, Blue Spectrum, demonstrated his musical talents, including the ability to play a variety of guitars along with his recent venture into singing. His opening number was "I Believe I Can Fly", the inspiration for this year's theme. Along with mom, Gwendolyn and dad, Gene, Zayne shared how he overcame autism to teach himself how to play guitar at the age of 14 and go on to start his own band. Needless to say, wannabe groupies all crowded around him for autographs and pictures.

The afternoon session included a paper airplane contest to see how well Aktion Club members can "fly" as well as information about this year's upcoming Kiwanis International Aktion Club Awards and Recognition Program and how members and clubs can submit entries.

Capping the day, was the presentation of awards. "Awesome Member" awards were presented to Aktion Club members nominated by Columbiana and Licking County Advisors for going above and beyond this year. Awards to "Awesome Facility Advisors" were presented to Marta Mohr of Seneca County Opportunity Center, David McManus of Licking County, and Michelle Sharratt of Medina County. Licking County Kiwanis Advisors -- Jennifer Lewis, Alice Lewis, Mike Wesley and Gary Wimer all received "Awesome Kiwanis Advisor" awards. Final presentation of the day was the "Tom E. Crawford Service Award" sponsored by The All Ohio e-Medina Kiwanis Club along with the

Crawford Family. This year's award presented to an outstanding club went to The Knox County Aktion Club.

Thanks goes to the 12 "Aktion Champion" sponsors who supported this event and enabled us to keep registration costs to a minimum. Community Service That Is Good ... For All Involved

Continuing education is good for the teacher and for the student. Continuing Education classes keep one's mind sharp and, for the teachers, provides service to the community. The learner gains new knowledge and/or skills and the teacher feels good about helping to pass along knowledge and/or skills. The interaction between the teacher and the learner is an important

part of our social makeup and maintaining our mental agility.

There are a variety of ways your Kiwanis club can be involved in continuing education. The settings are different for every community but the offerings are similar across the state. Local public school districts, private schools, colleges/universities, parks and recreation departments, senior centers, and literacy centers are some examples of promising venues and sponsors. For the learner, classes can be taken for the enjoyment of learning new skills, personal enrichment and growth, and increasing one's knowledge in an area of interest.

Participation in continuing education programs allows community members to learn new skills and, for teachers/ presenters, the opportunities to hone their skills as they prepare to teach others. This is a great chance for Kiwanis-member teachers to share their passions about a particular subject or activity, and, if one's forte isn't teaching, to be the learner. If members are not retired, the break from the day-to-day work routine is good for one's own mental health.

Class offerings *include* dance, music, theater, games, art, crafts, exercise, tax preparation/finance, photography, local history, languages, computer skills, cooking, and writing. The list is limited only by the skills and interests represented in the Kiwanis club. Contact the organization that fits your club's interest, to offer your Kiwanis club's members as teachers. The Junior Achievement (JA) program frequently needs teachers. The JA program works with all grade levels in subjects from general career education through job-specific classes and programs.

Kiwanis clubs can develop their own seminars and sessions to teach fun and mind-challenging lessons/subjects. The comprehensiveness of the activities will determine how quickly the program can be implemented.

When seeking out continuing education opportunities, let your club's skill sets and time constraints guide decisions. Stick to subjects you're comfortable with — better yet, certified or otherwise credentialed in — and avoid overwhelming time commitments.

Support your Kiwanis club's members and provide community service by making a connection with a continuing education program. It's good for all involved.

ed, you can contact your Lt Governor or another club in your division to possibly deliver your basket to the convention.



This really could be the coolest summer of the rest of your life.

The headline stopped me in my tracks. This could be the coolest summer of the rest of your life. Then, under the headline: Summer began with an oppressive heat wave. Get used to it.

By the time I found this story (on the news website Vox.com) we had already seen temperatures in the mid-90s in Ohio – and 100-degree-plus temperatures had already covered large portions of the United States. At the

already covered large portions of the United States. At the same time, an unprecedented heat wave settled over Europe. Temperature records in excess of 103 degrees blanketed London and the United Kingdom.

Weather records show heat waves have consistently increased in frequency, intensity and duration since the 1960s. What if the headline turns out to be true? What if future summers make us look back at summer 2022 as the last "cool" summer of our lives?

One thing states and localities will need to do is make more shelters available for vulnerable people, because extreme hot weather kills. People without access to air conditioning, especially the elderly and chronically ill, are at severe risk.

This trend in a changing climate also suggests that the forces bringing unprecedented heat to the northern reaches of Europe are not finished with changes to the other three seasons. The forces that are unleashing fires and floods and destructive storms are likely to continue. For our part of the world, think of extremely heavy rain, powerful storms, floods, windstorms and tornadoes.

These weather events require emergency response followed by months of work to deal with injuries and destruction. Ohio District Kiwanis Governor Craig Smith's 2021-2022 Governor's Project has been aimed at helping Kiwanis Clubs learn how to contribute to the work that follows a local or regional disaster. Most important: invite representatives of your local disaster response agency and the Red Cross to your club. Learn what you can do and what training is required. Also important: support the Ohio District Kiwanis Foundation's disaster relief fund, which responds with grants to local clubs when disaster strikes.

The ODKF fund was very important to us in the Dayton region when 20 tornadoes struck on Memorial Day, 2019. ODKF grants made a difference for hard-hit neighborhoods.

Sorry to say it, but more of the same may be on the way in the years ahead. That's why it's important to support the Governor's Project now. As Governor Craig Smith puts it, "Never underestimate the impact of a disaster."



Back to School Blues

The conversation was rather amusing. Standing in front of a display showcasing back to school supplies, I heard a plaintive voice complaining about having to return to school. The list of grievances were long, not wanting to get up so early, all the homework to deal with, the costs of supplies, the chaos, kids being rude, and so forth. Recognizing the voice, I popped around the corner and reminded my friend Kim, she was getting payback for

forcing all her friends to play school all the time when we were kids, especially since she was always the teacher. She continues to be so to this day.

She gave a very inappropriate response, then grinned. I noticed her cart was loaded down with items from the school supply lists. Crayons, pencils, tissues, scissors, disinfecting wipes, folders, etc., she looked a bit grim as she explained that for her classroom there was at least 7 children who would not have the wherewithal to bring the items on the school list. Having just completed buying our son's supplies, I knew this was going to be a pricy undertaking for her, as well as many other teachers in our school systems.

This is the perfect time to "adopt a class" for clubs or communities. I especially like the idea of "back to school wish trees". This is where classroom staff create a list of items which would be especially useful in their classrooms, then it is attached to a tree in an area with high traffic, like a big box store, church, or grocery store. Much like the angel trees you see at Christmas. Good Samaritans (like Kiwanis members) select a tag and then return a week later with items which had been purchased in a bag or box with the label attached. The bags and boxes of school supplies are then delivered to the appropriate school and classroom prior to the start of school.

The other item, which can be very helpful is to help create a "clothing cupboard" for children in Head Start, preschool or kindergarten, which would be needed in case of accidents, they would have clean/dry clothes to wear. Again, something that some families cannot provide, especially during winter months.

Finally, the creation of book bags with requested classroom items, needed for each grade. Often a child in foster care does not have these items, and once the back to school sales are over, they can be very expensive for foster families to obtain, if they can find the items at all. The child is already aware, they are different, because of their home situation and possibly because they are in a different school, but, having the basic items will help them fit in more quickly. Guidance counselors and teachers would appreciate receiving these items, and so will the children we are serving.

Finally, consider a "Paper drive" for your school. Construction paper, tissues, paper towels, resealable baggies, colorful copy paper, facial wipes, folders, disinfecting wipes, lined paper, and even new, current reading materials for teachers to divide among their classrooms (Scholastic Gift Cards work well too!) More often than not, the budget teachers have to work with will not stretch very far as far as classroom supplies, and having help from the community will provide some relief from purchasing everything themselves.
