Northwest Kiwanians Build Beds for Kids

Going to bed early for school has a new meaning for 50 children in the Northwest area of our state. On August 27, Kiwanians from divisions 1N and 1S joined together with Let's Build Beds and the CedarCreek Church to create and assemble 50 twin sized beds for children who do not have beds of their own.

Michael Horvath, Director of Let's Build Beds says there are over 600 local children between the ages of 3 and 17 on the waiting list to receive beds as winter approaches.





Fundraising efforts from various sources help to purchase 2 x 4's used to build the frames, averaging about \$220 per bed. Once the various wooden components are cut to size volunteers' sand away any rough spots and edges, and holes are drilled to fasten head and footboards onto the frame once it arrives at the child's home. The headboards, platforms, and footboards are pre-assembled and after a footboard is branded with the "Let's Build" brand, the bed is ready for delivery.

Once the bed is delivered to the destination, the recipient helps with the final assembly, allowing the

they helped to build. A new mattress is placed on the bed along with new sheets, comforter, and a pillow, prior to volunteers leaving.

When we began this Kiwanis year, I was under no illusions that it would be without challenges, that we'd be back to what had been routine three short years ago. Or long years ago since it often seems a lifetime ago. While the challenges were not nearly as impactful as those that faced Past Governors Tim and Jamie, they were still frustratingly present. It's my hope that we've seen the worst of the pandemic, and that we'll create a new normal for ourselves. We still have work to do to create that new normal, but

I'm proud to be part of an organization that sees these challenges and has adopted new service projects and formed new local partnerships to address the needs of the youth and families in their communities. We can and must change, or should I say adapt, to remain the strong servant leaders our communities deserve.

It is a humbling experience to serve as the Governor of this Great District, and I am honored and privileged to have served as your Governor this past year, and for the next four weeks or so. I want to thank the Lt. Governors, Committee Chairs, and District Officers for their service. I may hold the title of Governor, but they are the ones that make this a Great District and keep it moving forward. WINTER CLOTHING NEEDS ARE COMING!

Most of us don't want to think of the upcoming winter's cold as we enjoy the nice, warm, summer weather. However, it's not too early to think about how the cold affects children in our communities who don't have warm winter clothing, e.g., coats, gloves/ mittens, scarves, boots, and how your Kiwanis club can help.

Statistics indicate that one in six children in the United States and in Ohio live in poverty. The number of children in poverty is greater in larger cities. Your

Kiwanis club might consider undertaking a project to address the need for underprivileged children to have warm, winter clothing.

Almost every community has a winter clothing drive at some point in the fall so, if you're considering a project, you'll need to investigate the current programs and make a decision about starting a new project or contributing to one in existence. One way or the other, the need is great to ensure that young people have winter clothing.

Your Kiwanis club has choices and decisions to make when considering a winter clothing project, such as:

- * Which type of project works for your club collection of new and/or used winter clothing items, or a fundraising effort and donation to an agency.
- * The target age of the recipients.
- * Do you want to work with a company or organization (One Warm Coat, Coats of Kindness, Coats for Kids) or directly with a school system or agency.
- * How long will your project last? Two of the options are: one day with an intense publicity campaign and involvement the community, or a few weeks of collection at a specific location with repeated reminders to participate. Your group won't want the project to be a lengthy, extended activity because of the difficulty of maintaining momentum.

The following are matters to consider when organizing a winter clothing project:

- * Who should we contact about our idea? Local schools, agencies, homeless shelters, and charities are among the possible recipients.
- * Charities collect monetary donations to purchase new coats and distribute to children who are in need of winter clothing.
- * Frequently, winter clothing drives are focused on elementary school students. Don't forget about middle and high school students. There are needs at those levels, too.
- * Often, clothing companies donate a portion of clothing sales to the purchase of clothing for kids, e.g., Burlington Coat Factory.

If your group donates the winter clothing to an organization such as Salvation Army, St. Vincent de Paul, and Goodwill Industries, the items may not go directly to the local children but the sale of the items will raise money for their charitable projects.

If a winter clothing project isn't a project your Kiwanis club is interested in undertaking, consider a shoe drive. Shoe drives happen throughout the year so they're not season driven. The general information for winter clothing projects translates well to a shoe drive/project. Organizations that collect and distribute shoe include Shoes 4 the Shoeless, Shoes4Souls, and Soles4Soles. Toms (shoes) donates a pair of shoes for every pair sold. Many churches collect and donate shoes to distribution networks.

Consider continuing your Kiwanis club's community service in new ways. Remember – Kids Need Kiwanis.

Always Be Prepared

In an era when the planet is warming, polar icecaps are melting and seas are rising, nature is reacting with increasing fury. Hurricanes, tornadoes, heat waves, droughts, floods and wildfires are rising in intensity around the globe. We've seen our share of extreme weather in our region, too.

It will likely take years to restore the towns and hamlets of Appalachian Eastern Kentucky, recently ravaged by

killer flash floods that overtook countless homes in the dead of night. Dozens lost their lives.

The cleanup also continues in Western Kentucky, where nearly a year ago tornadoes left a 200-mile path of destruction and killed dozens more. Smaller tornadoes and floods hit areas of our own state over the course of the year as well. Smaller events that don't capture the headlines still wreak havoc in communities and require emergency response and cleanup.

Throughout this Kiwanis year, it's been my pleasure as Governor's Project Chair to speak at Kiwanis division meetings and local Kiwanis clubs around Ohio, both in person and via Zoom. Ohio District Kiwanis Governor Craig Smith's year-long project has been aimed at promoting disaster awareness and preparedness - urging Kiwanis clubs to obtain Red Cross training so members become qualified volunteers who can help their communities when disaster strikes. The project also encourages clubs and members to contribute financial support to the Ohio District Kiwanis Foundation Disaster Relief Fund.

I'm happy to report that Kiwanians have stepped up – and that's made it possible for the ODKF Disaster Fund to provide support after the Kentucky disasters. As it did when a score of tornadoes caused widespread destruction in the Dayton region in 2019, the fund stands ready to help when disaster strikes near you.

The Governor's Project has also produced a comprehensive disaster relief plan for the Ohio District. Special thanks to Past District Governor Jamie Kauffman, Lt. Governor Mark Garland and Ohio District Kiwanis Disaster Grants Chair Mark Wion for working with me on this project. Contact the Ohio District Kiwanis office for your copy of the plan.

Governor Craig's "call to action" is clear: Be prepared prior to the event - learn the skills to become relief volunteers and keep the ODKF Disaster Relief Fund strong so it can lend support when needed

There will always be a "next time" when disaster strikes -- anytime, anywhere, and without warning. Be ready -because as Governor Craig always says, you should "never underestimate the impact of a disaster."
