

COMMUNITY GEM: KETTERING WOMAN BRINGS JOY VIA KIWANIS CLUB OF DAYTON'S CAKES FOR KIDS PROGRAM Eric Schwartzberg, *Dayton Daily News* September 9, 2022

BIRTHDAY cakes brighten people's days and an area woman wants to make sure all children get one on their birthday.

Kelly Brown of Kettering got the idea several years ago as she read a Dayton Daily News article about a nurse visiting an 8-year-old boy on behalf of Help Me

Grow Brighter Futures, a no-cost system of support for pregnant women, caregivers with new babies and families with young children with developmental delays and disabilities.

"This little boy was sitting on the front porch ... and he tells the nurse 'I'm so excited. Today's my birthday. I am going to get my own bag of potato chips for myself for my birthday," Brown said. "So that in itself when you think 'Oh my gosh, all this child is getting is just getting a bag of potato chips for his birthday, that ... starts tugging at your heartstrings."

When the nurse exited the home, the formerly joyous boy was visibly upset having learned he could not go to the store to get the treat, Brown said. That's when the nurse went to her car and gave him a piece of chocolate cake for her own son's birthday and the little boy was elated, she said.

The story made her think about other children who may never get a birthday cake and inspired her to start the Cakes for Kids program as a community service project of Kiwanis Club of Dayton. Now, Help Me Grow Brighter Futures refers possible cake candidates to Cakes for Kids and Evan's Bakery in Dayton creates the smile-inducing treats for the program at a discounted rate.

Brown said Cakes for Kids helps generate joy. "Joy is the one emotion or feeling that just continues if you feed off of each each other, right?" she said. "So you bring joy to someone that brings joy to you and it just continues it just amplifies

And I can tell you some of the homes that we have gone into are not happy homes and not secure homes, so to be able to bring the joy and the experience of feeling valued and celebrated to a little kid is it's just it's indescribable." Cakes for Kids serves about 30 children a year, most of whom are 9 years old or younger, Brown said.

"The joy and happiness this simple act brings to the kids' faces is all the reward Kelly needs," said her younger sister, Heather Mitchell, who nominated her as a Dayton Daily News Community Gem. Mitchell said her sister "always had a servant heart, from taking care of me and my other sister when we were growing up to donating her time and money to various charities."

Brown said that as much as Cakes for Kids focuses on bringing joy to children, another part of its mission is to bring some relief to the parents so they don't feel compelled to spend money that they may not have "as they, too, want their children to feel celebrated. Our cakes bring joy to parents, too," she said.

Brown said she was "really flattered" to be nominated as a Community Gem. "It's fun, it's exciting and it's unexpected and ... much appreciated," she said. Kiwanis Club of Dayton would love to expand the Kiwanis Cakes for Kids program, Brown said. "For us to do this, we need additional people to join our club and our cause," she said. "We have been serving the Dayton community for over 100 years and we want to keep bringing comfort and joy to kids for centuries to come."



The Ohio District ended the 2021-22 administrative year with 5,634 members, a net loss of 174, or 3%.


The Divisions showing positive net growth for the 2021-22 year include: 1S. 3, 5, 8, 16, 17, 18, & 22.

A new club was chartered in Tipp City with 18 members.














Building Better Builders Clubs

DRUGS AND OUR YOUNG PEOPLE

The situation......

Schools are a reflection of our society so, if there is a problem in the public in general, it will be an issue in schools. However, children/young people are, generally, more susceptible to peer pressure than adults. One of the greatest risks to young people is the use of dangerous drugs. Frequently, these drugs are used intentionally but, too often, young people take dangerous drugs unwittingly. Research indicates that approximately 30% of U. S. adolescents have used illicit drugs. That's a shockingly high number but a number that hasn't changed significantly over the past decade. The chilling fact is that deaths due to illicit drugs more than doubled in 2020 and continues to rise at an alarming rate. The deaths are due to drug use becoming more dangerous, not more common. Overdose deaths have risen significantly across the United States over the past few years because of the presence of fentanyl. Habitual drug users and unsuspecting young people do not know that what they are taking is perhaps laced with fentanyl and can be fatal.



The Drug Enforcement Administration has advised the public of an alarming, emerging trend of colorful fentanyl available across the United States. Since August 2022, DEA and law enforcement organizations have seized brightly-colored fentanyl and fentanyl pills in all parts of the country. "Rainbow fentanyl" is the latest method used by drug cartels to sell highly addictive and potentially deadly fentanyl made to look like candy to children and young people. Brightly-colored fentanyl is being seized in multiple forms, including pills, powder, and blocks that resemble sidewalk chalk. All it takes is one pill, or enough powder to fit on the tip of a pencil, to poison or kill a person.

What can we do as Kiwanians and community-minded individuals?

Kiwanis clubs can consider investigating and supporting community organizations that are involved in drug use prevention and education, recovery programs, and addressing mental health issues. Many schools work with local law enforcement agencies to offer the Drug Abuse Resistance Education (D.A.R.E.) program. D.A.R.E. is a police officer-led series of classroom lessons that teaches children from kindergarten through 12th grade how to resist peer pressure and live productive drug and violence-free lives. If your schools don't have a D.A.R.E. program, consider working with the schools and law enforcement agency to start a program. If the D.A.R.E. program is in your schools, consider financial and/or human resource support.

Support prevention activities that promote drug-free activities; activities that are positive alternatives to using drugs. Positive options could include: arts, sports, and music activities; future-oriented activities; career planning; career fairs; financial planning sessions; college/university fairs; sports tournaments; after-school recreational programs such as Boys and Girls Clubs or the YMCA; scouting organizations; recreational programs; and cultural organizations. If kids have positive things to do and things that they can be involved in, they will be less likely to use drugs.

Advice to pass along on a personal level – encourage friends and family members to purchase candy from reliable vendors, take candy only from known and trusted friends, and dispose of suspiciously- packaged and unpackaged items. Assume all pills offered to you are fake and contain fentanyl. You can't smell or taste fentanyl. You cannot tell if a pill is fake just by looking at it. Do not take any pill that you do not directly get from a doctor or pharmacist. Pills purchased from online ads or from social media sources are not safe. Kiwanians have always stepped up to be a factor in addressing community needs. Your Kiwanis club could make a difference in the battle to save the lives of young people from the dangerous consequences of drug use.
