## THE JOURNEY TO BUILDING DIVERSITY, EQUITY AND INCLUSION THROUGHOUT KIWANIS INTERNATIONAL

**FOCUSING** on DEI (Diversity, Equity and Inclusion) requires forgiveness, reflection introspection, and a consciousness that involves seeing beyond the surface level existence of humanity. It requires looking deeply into the soul of three things: 1) Oneself, 2) Other human beings, and 3) Institutions/Club Organizations. Before delving more into what DEI is, let's make a clear distinction as to what it is not.

February is Black History Month, in which many institutions/organizations across the country will plan activities to spotlight the accomplishments of Black people. That recognition is essential, but it also poses a risk – some institutions will plan events under Black history that really should be called something else.

That may be well intentioned, but the confusion hampers progress. Many will argue that with such a more strong emphasis on DEI, focusing on ideals such as Black History Month, Women's History Month, Hispanic Heritage Month, etc., only separates us further. However, often times what happens if we don't take the time to recognize and appreciate persons from various often marginalized groups, they get lost in the concept of "inclusion."

Since this is Black history month we will put our concentration efforts here in showing the contrast relating to Black history and DEI. The difference between Black history and DEI is that the diversity in DEI is far more than Black people. Diversity is a commitment in the thinking process of race, religion, socio-economic status, gender identity, and sexual orientation. Where institutions/organizations fall short, it is the belief that teaching Black history is diverse in content. Diversity is an intentional process beyond Blackness. It is a commitment to acceptance in thought and action.

When referencing DEI, inclusion is an intention commitment to change that is found in language. It is the acceptance of all people evident in the everyday words and print. Kiwanis International fully understands DEI. As a volunteer organization serving children around the world through members in more than 70 countries, Kiwanis International has had a longstanding commitment to opportunity and dignity for all people.













## DEI (CONT.)

While Kiwanis International has a longstanding commitment, this commitment needs to also be present on the District and Individual club levels. Having a strong commitment to Diversity, Equity and Inclusion is not a place that you get to and 'stay.' It is a journey that will be riddled in successes and mistakes. While on the journey, looking deeply into the souls of 1) Oneself, 2) Other human beings, and 3) Institutions/Club Organizations, your understanding of DEI will grow, significantly.



Even if you are strongly dedicated and passionate to diversity, equity and inclusion, there will be struggles of forgiveness and how you work in DEI everyday with people who may be filled with anger and resentment and how you deal with the idea in order to really serve them, you question whether or not you are practicing forgiveness of disappointment and hurt faced from others. But one must remember that forgiveness is a spiritual and daily practice. It's something you have to wake up to and think about daily. You can't just attempt to try it once and think you've let something go, and it's over.

Throughout this journey of DEI, it is important to reflect on the root cause and build solutions to discrimination and hate in the world. While on this spiritual journey, forgiveness will be very prevalent in the three previously mentioned areas of Yourself/Myself, Other Human Beings and The Institution/Club Organization.

**Yourself/Myself** – One's heart, spirit, and soul leads you to ask some very serious questions that you might feel like you already examined when you began this journey, but it requires a deeper introspection. 1) Who am I becoming? 2) What is my soul's purpose? 3) What is my expected outcome? 4) In what areas of my life do I need to heal in order to achieve your purpose authentically?

Other Human Beings – As Kiwanians, think about the human beings you serve daily. Often times it is usually people who face discrimination that are also expected to forgive their oppressors (People of Color, LGBTQ+, Veterans, Individuals living with disabilities [visible and invisible], and the list goes on). Those who have been oppressed twice, thrice, and four times, have more forgiving and healing to do. We must think about redefining what forgiveness means. Forgiveness must involve understanding but not necessarily acceptance. In focusing on our DEI efforts, we should understand the ignorance behind discrimination, bigotry, prejudice and pure ignorance. This does not meant we have to accept it in our daily lives. You may have experienced your individual clubs working to change their climate, trying to make it more inclusive but it just isn't happening. You may have felt disappointed and even sometimes hopelessness. This can strike us

at the foundation of our souls and negatively impact our spirits. These structures you build, have built, and sustain within your clubs have a history of impacting our soul's existence. In order to break down these systems there has to be a process where we are searching deep down within ourselves to find answers to who we are and why we exist.

The Institution/Club Organization - Institutions/club organizations must begin to ask themselves questions regarding the soul and spirit of their foundation. 1) Who are we as a Kiwanis club? 2) What have we done to positively impact the world? 3) In what spaces do we need to show support in order to provide equitable outcomes in, to heal the damages we have caused (to people, to communities, etc.)?

Throughout your DEI journey you may have witnessed the best and the worst of human beings and may not have always recognized the positive and negative impacts this has on one's energy and soul. Keep the faith and remember in order to consistently show up as your best self, you have to do a lot of forgiving. Build your consciousness around the fact that forgiveness does not come easy, neither does change. As a matter of fact, it is an important part of the process of growth. Forgiveness does not equal reconciliation. It equates in many cases to understanding and moving on. In order to develop a lens of diversity, equity, and inclusion, we must continue to crucially and critically evaluate all phases of life. But first start interpersonally. It all begins with you. The interpersonal exploration will impact your ability to assess, facilitate, and implement your work in daily practice.

If you want to dedicate yourself to focusing on committing to increasing diversity and celebrating the range of human differences (diversity); committing to a policy of opportunity that promotes fairness, impartiality and nondiscriminatory actions for all persons – no matter the criteria (equity); and committing to pursuing efforts to ensure the dignity of all people is recognized, respected, valued and empowered (inclusion); then you are on a journey to help heal the world of the pain that leads to discrimination and oppression based on our identities.

Then to build systems and make sure that this never happens to anyone else. To redefine how we value human life and treat one another equitably and equally. In order for DEI efforts to work throughout Kiwanis International, the first part of the journey begins with ourselves as individuals with self-exploration. Then you need to continue this practice over and over. We wish you much success on your journey. Please remember the door is always open to utilize our resources either in person or via zoom to strengthen our clubs in Diversity, Equity and Inclusion.

Our ODKF grant programs have awarded over \$1,250,000 to Ohio Kiwanis Clubs since 1988 including Governor Project grants. How can ODKF help your club achieve set goals, make your division stronger, and make the district better? I encourage you to empower the leaders within your club and your SLPs to explore opportunities that will help you build the Kiwanis brand within your schools and community. Think outside the box, break traditions, take calculated risk, work collectively with other clubs and your SLPs to achieve your goals for the year. Expand your reach through social media, community events, take advantage of business chambers, network groups, nonprofit organizations, and the resources available.

The next ODKF grant cycle ends March 31. These funds will be awarded in May, so plan accordingly. Visit www.ODKF.org and complete your grant submission forms. Please provide a solid plan of execution with dates, staffing, specific needs, community benefit, and your clubs commitment to the project (sweat equity). These are key items we expect to see when evaluating grant submissions.

Please plan to participate in the First Family Service Project at MidYear Education Day. We will have backpacks ready for LTGs and club members to take back to their division that day to be distributed to family centers within your community. ## HUDSON BUILDERS CLUB GIVES BACK

## Youth Protection is Your Protection

WITH spring around the corner and many of our Clubs ramping up their events for the season/year, it's a good time to remind you all of the importance of Youth Protection! I am here to answer any questions you may have and be a resource for your Club. Our organization is dedicated to improving the lives of Children around the world, which means we also need to be dedicated to keeping them safe! The guidelines have been created and updated over the years based on the trends in society (and claims). I'm sure many of you are aware of the challenges the Boy Scouts faced a few years ago, the Catholic Church, and with the increase in awareness of gender identity it is important for Kiwanis and your Club to stay current and vigilant. These guidelines are required to be presented to your Club at least once a year. Once your Club has reviewed them, please make sure to have your Club Secretary check the box in the Portal showing it has been completed. A brief review of the 'rule of 3', social media, chaperones, overnight events, and more.

Bear in mind, anyone helping in your Club, regardless if they are a member, need to understand the Kiwanis Guidelines... including but not limited to your advisors, volunteers, chaperones, parents, and teachers. To further help with training, Kiwanis has several courses online through the Praesidium Academy. These are free courses and your Club officers, SLP Advisors, and Chaperones are requested to complete a few of the courses. (Abuse Risk Management, Social Media, and Preventing Sexual Activity).

Which leads me to the next point – please make sure that your SLP Club Advisors have completed a Kiwanis Background Check through the portal. They are valid for 2 years. Again, ANYONE leading an event, staying/working with the youth, and advisors all need a background check, including folks that are not members. Example you may have some chaperones that aren't members – they need a background check. And No, the background check your advisors may have through their school district are not acceptable.













## Youth Protection (Cont.)

The short answer is that Kiwanis does not have access to those background checks, we need to have our own background checks on file. The only exception would be the Teachers who ONLY have SLP meetings on the school property. If they are involved OFF school property with your Club/SLPs, they need the KI background check.

I am happy to present to your Club over zoom, however it is not required for me to present the Guidelines, anyone in your Club can present and review.


