BOARDMAN-YOUNGSTOWN KIWANIS EXPANDS ITS LITERACY REACH

THE Kiwanis Club of Boardman and Youngstown is pleased to announce that we have expanded our Eisenbraun Books for Kids project to serve students Grades 1-5 in four elementary schools in Youngstown. We have been able to grow this wonderful program thanks to a grant of \$10,000 from the Nancy W. and Bruce R. Beeghly Family Fund, a component fund of the Community Foundation of the Mahoning Valley. Funding also came from a \$4,000 grant from Ohio District Kiwanis Foundation and generous donations from our members and friends.

This project is a continuation of our Club's mission and vision: Changing the world one child and one community at a time. Our inaugural school was Harding Elementary under the direction of teacher Shannon Sefick. We provide a book a month to students to take home and enjoy during the school year. With the success of the program at Harding and additional funding we have received, we have expanded our Books for Kids to include Martin Luther King Elementary School with teacher Morgan Bindas, Volney Rogers Elementary School with teacher Debra Bowers, and Kirkmere Elementary School with teacher Dena Esmail. Teachers order age-appropriate books from Scholastic Books. Our club provides funding for these purchases.

We are extending the work started through United Way of Youngstown & Mahoning County and the Dolly Parton Imagination Library which places books in the hands of children from birth through five years of age. Kiwanis President Mark Samuel is leading our efforts to help children increase their love of book and enhance their reading with books of their very own.

For over 65 years, our Kiwanis Club held an annual radio auction, and we are so appreciative of the community support we received through donations and participation. The seed money for this project came from proceeds from past auctions. Continued support is allowing us to expand this project.





USING DATA TO SHOWCASE IMPACT

WHEN it comes to operations and decision making, how important is data? It turns out, very! Eighty-seven percent (PDF) of nonprofit professionals agree that data is moderately to extremely important. Data can also be used to illustrate a nonprofit's impact in the community. Specific, concrete data gives supporters and potential donors an accurate view of the organization's performance and adds credibility to its programs.

More than 55% of people in the U.S. donated to charity in 2021. By taking your data beyond the abstract, you can clearly show your nonprofit's impact and attract new avenues of support.

Collect before and after data

A before and after comparison helps show your effectiveness. It's important to collect data before implementing a program so you have a starting point to measure your impact over time. For example, a food pantry could measure how many families in the community face food insecurity and how many sources of food are available before the program begins. The same data can be measured on a month-to-month basis once the program is initiated to track progress. This would allow the nonprofit to report concrete facts, such as "Food insecurity decreased by 20% over the last year" or "Community members now have 35% more access to weekly groceries."

Track data for organizational activity

Donors appreciate data that reveals the scale of your work, how often it's happening and the current impact. Reporting ongoing data about your organization's work will provide a detailed view of your nonprofit's success over time.

Use valid methods to collect data

Data is important, but using valid and trustworthy methods to gather that data is vital. Here are a few ideas to help you get started:

- · Conduct surveys: Ask your target audience about your organization's programs over time.
- · Administer tests: Give pre- and post-workshop tests to demonstrate an increase in knowledge after your event.
- Track attendance: Regularly count how many people participate in your events and compare with previous events.
- · Record output: Measure what your nonprofit is doing, such as the number of meals donated per month, how many loads of free laundry are provided or how many animal vaccinations are administered.













DATA (CONT.)

Display your data

Build credibility and capture the attention of potential donors by showcasing your nonprofit's impact throughout your website. Instead of simply listing links to annual reports or white papers, put the most meaningful data on your homepage so donors immediately see what you're accomplishing.

Create interest by making data personal and interactive. Use charts and infographics on your financials page and clickable maps that reveal data per location. Publish blog posts that mix statistics with individual stories for a personal touch.

For fundraising pages, give specific examples of what a donation provides, such as "Feed a family for \$25 a week" or "For every \$50 donated, provide a medical checkup and microchip for a rescued dog." And get creative. People over the age of 12 in the U.S. listen to an average of 6 podcasts per week, making podcasts a great tool to reach a wide audience.

Be transparent

Transparency can help develop trust. Openly explain your methods for collecting data, and be sure to say when things don't go as planned. Document when you're experiencing challenges and present solutions to avoid those issues in the future.

You're ready for the spotlight

Shine the light on your nonprofit's impact with relevant data that builds credibility and encourages donors. By displaying the accomplishments you've worked so hard for, you're sure to inspire others.

Kiwanis Kids (K-Kids) is a student-led service club for students in elementary/ primary school who want to help others. K-Kids Clubs are the youngest branch of our Kiwanis Family. K-Kids grow up to become Builders & Key Clubbers, Circle



K'ers, Aktion Clubbers and Kiwanians. K-Kids Need Kiwanis...New clubs are chartered in partnership with a Kiwanis club and a school or community-based organization serving elementary school students. Key Club and Circle K can co-sponsor them. A sponsoring Kiwanis club pays the initial chartering fee for K-Kids clubs, which can vary from US\$180 to US\$300 depending on geographic location. Every year thereafter, a sponsoring Kiwanis club pays an annual renewal fee of US\$215. K-Kids are not required to pay annual dues.

All New K-Kids Clubs Chartered in Ohio between October 1, 2022 and August 11, 2023 have a chance to win \$100. The sponsoring Kiwanis Club will receive the award.





In its first year, the festival attracted 6,000 - 8,000 people and featured artists such as John Pizzarelli and Samara Joy, who went on to win two Grammy Awards.
