RAVENNA KIWANIS CLUB COMPLETES CAC YOUTH & FAMILY CENTER PLAYGROUND

THE Kiwanis Club of Ravenna celebrated the official opening of the CAC Youth & Family Center Playground with a ribbon cutting ceremony on August 1, 2023. The club began project fundraising for the playground in early 2019 with the intention of raising \$75,000. Brick pavers were sold for a walkway, cash donations were solicited and the club applied for multiple grants to cover the cost of the playground equipment and installation. Multiple delays due to the Covid Pandemic and logistics issues complicated completion of the project and the playground was officially completed in the spring of 2023 with students able to utilize the climber and shade structure for the 2023 Summer Camp program at the CAC Youth & Family Center. Community volunteers provided the manpower to install the structures. The Kiwanis Club of Ravenna and Community Action Council Directors and staff joined the students for lunch on August 1, 2023 and were presented with a thank you poster from the children attending the CAC Summer Camp program.. Representatives of the Kiwanis Club, the City of Ravenna, Main Street Ravenna, Ravenna Chamber of Commerce, NAACP and Community Action Council and the Summer Camp participants were present for the ribbon cutting ceremony as well.

Ravenna Kiwanis Club and Community Action Council would like to thank the many volunteers, individual donors and those purchasing bricks; the Battaglia Family; TS Landscaping; Print & Sign; Lonnie Lovejoy; Portage Foundation; Ravenna United Fund; Ohio District Kiwanis Foundation and the City of Ravenna for their support. Little Free Library: Build, buy, or support a Little Free Library book-sharing box in your community. Once you become a library steward, register your library by purchasing an official Kiwanis charter sign. Download the mobile app to engage with libraries across 120 countries. Clubs receive a 10% discount on products and a 20% discount on charter signs.

Reading Is Fundamental: Kids need Kiwanis and a joy of reading! Give students a strong start to the school year with RIF's back-to-school book collection. Plus, books are one of the most important tools to engage children to learn about culture and history: visit RIF's Hispanic Heritage Month book collection.







ODKF PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



WHO'S ready to start out our 2023 -2024 Kiwanis year? It should be an exciting new year. I am looking forward to serving as the ODKF's President this coming year. Just a little background on me - I am a member of the Gahanna Kiwanis and have been since 1997. I joined after my dad asked me to join. I attended a key club meeting and was automatically hooked on what Kiwanis stand for. I come from a family of volunteers and we have passed down even now to our grandkids. My mom even teases me that she will have to schedule her funeral around my Kiwanis commitment dates.

We have acquired a few new board members (which is always a plus to work with new ideas). We have also changed our deadline dates for grant submissions. Updated information is on the ODKF website, but for your convenience, they are as follows: Safe and Healthly Kids grants, Community grants and Children's grants (which can be up to \$5,000) are now: November 30th for late January assistance, March 31st for late May assistance, and June 30th for late August assistance. Mini grants deadlines (which are matched funds up to \$500.) are now: October 31st, December 31st, February 28th, April 30th, June 30th and August 31st. The mini grants will be considered in the following month after their deadline date. Hopefully this will help clubs out a little faster with their projects.

A lot of our clubs and members still are not sure what the Ohio District Kiwanis Foundation can do for their clubs. Every Ohio Kiwanis member is a member of the ODKF. We give grants out to clubs and SLP's for their service projects. We also have what is called Club Advised Funds (CAF) which will help take the burden off of clubs that may have a foundation within their club or large amounts of money in their clubs funds. (We handle all that IRS paperwork and audit work so your club doesn't have to). Representatives from the ODKF will also be attending meetings along side Jason on his Governor's visits to help spread the word about the Foundation. If at anytime, you have any questions or want a ODKF representative come and talk at your club meetings or Division meeting, please reach out to us and we are there.

We currently have a couple fundraisers during the Kiwanis year to help build our funds so we can have money for grants. A goal this year is to add another fundraiser to our calendar year. (The more money we raise, the more grants can be given). Mark your calendars for our Annual golf outing which will be held July 18th. We also hold a basket auction at DCON which is usually successful because of our clubs donations to the event and of course our members who bid on those baskets. Even though we were 28 fewer baskets this year, we were still able to raise \$3,628 this year at DCON. I can't thank everyone enough for all their support.

I look forward to working with the ODKF board members, all our clubs and Kiwanis members this coming year.
