It's October and our new Kiwanis year is in full swing. I am so honored to serve our Kiwanis Family on the District level. Thank you for putting your faith and confidence in me.




As we start the new year, I want to chat about a couple of things that are buzzing around in my mind. First, I want to share my Vision Statement:

Nothing is more important than the safety of the children Kiwanis serves. That's why Kiwanis International dedicates a week each year to youth protection.

In 2024, Youth Protection Week is October 7-11. During this time, Kiwanis clubs should take the opportunity to conduct important youth protection training and evaluate the club's compliance. But these resources, available at

Kiwanis clubs are required to educate members annually on Kiwanis Youth Protection Policies & Procedures. The resources available during Youth Protection Week make it easy for your club to meet this prerequisite. Kiwanis clubs can host in-person or virtual training for all members of the club who are:





Pollinator habitats for bees.

What's the Buzz about Bees?
As many of you have read or heard, "Bee A Hero" is this year's Governor's Project and it's all about building

Why Bees? Because Bees are in peril largely because of loss of habitat due to development and death from pesticides and herbicides. I believe if humans cause a problem, then humans should fix the problem. Bees pollinate one-third of our food supply. If bees go away, then so does our food.



WE MUST ACT NOW TO PROTECT THE FOOD SUPPLY FOR OUR CHILDREN.

I've also assembled a BEE Team who will be helping with the project throughout the year. Marla Marsh as the Chair will be our No. 1 Worker Bee with the help of Sister Bee, Monica Marsh. Our Community Service Coordinator Hannah Riley, will be sharing all of the Buzz about Bees on our ODK web site and in Social Media.

Meanwhile, as we head into Fall and Winter, please take this time to learn more and plan out your pollinator projects. Tis the season to talk with schools and SLPs about pollinator curriculum as this project fits nicely into STEM initiatives for all ages. There are lots of references online and included on the Resource Sheet I created for the project.

There are also some things you can do at home to help pollinators prepare for winter like:

- ·LEAVE THE LEAVES: Don't rake fallen leaves and other foliage out of your flower beds or away from your house. Many pollinators will winter-over in the leaf beds.
- •SAVE THE STEMS: Don't cut stems to the ground after blooms expire. Instead, strategically trim them so that cavity-nesting bees can move in and lay eggs. Leave spent flowers up through the fall and winter so migrating birds can feed on seeds. Then, in spring, trim stems at heights ranging from 8 to 24 inches high to provide homes for species such as mason bees.
- •BUILD A BEE HOUSE: You can build bee houses out of scrap wood (which is a fun project) or buy them at garden centers. (Example \$10 at Lowe's) The Bee House should be placed against a flat surface and located in an area protected from high winds. The front of the house should have a south or southwest exposure where it will get the most sun in winter to keep bees warm.

Together, we can make a huge impact on bee populations throughout Ohio. Let's get bizzy!

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

Ohio Kiwanis: Governor's Pollinator Project

BEE A HERO is an opportunity to be a global citizen on a local level

Bees provide community service to all mankind

Mankind can provide community service to all bees

We need each other to survive

Imagine a grey world without almonds, apples, or fragrant flowers...Seems terrible, right?

Unfortunately, that's the shocking future we face if we don't work to help our most precious pollinator: bees. Far from being a niche concern, bees lie at the heart of our survival — and they have been dying at unprecedented rates. Their hard work is not only essential to healthy ecosystems, but to sustaining animal and human life too. Each year, bees are experiencing massive die-offs throughout the U.S. Pesticides, herbicides, development, predators, mites and environmental change all contribute to die off and loss of habitat.

ONE BILLION POUNDS of pesticides were used in the US in 2023!

HOW DOES THIS PROJECT SERVE THE CHILDREN OF THE WORLD? WE MUST PROTECT THEIR FOOD SUPPLY



Bees pollinate ONE-THIRD of the food we eat.

From apples and squash to buckwheat and coffee, bees are responsible for pollinating most of the fruits, vegetables, seeds, and nuts tha are essential to our diets. Ohio is an agriculture state; one in seven Ohioans work in the agriculture industry.

How Kiwanians can BEE HEROES

As bee populations decline, individual Kiwanians can help by expanding pollinator habitats

- Create and maintain native pollinator habitats in your own yard. Large gardens to potted plants —it all matters
- Read labels and use non-toxic herbicides and pesticides in your yard. Take the NO PESTICIDE PLEDGE at <u>SAVEOHIOBEES.ORG</u>
- Overseed your lawn with low growing pollinator plants, like clover and violet. Let your yard go wild!
- Encourage and support neighbors, friends, and family to create and maintain pollinator habitats
- Support local bee keepers by purchasing and promoting their products

How Kiwanis Clubs can BEE HEROES

- Build a Pollinator habitat in your community/Turn a brown space into a native wildflower garden
- Introduce the pollinator project and curriculum to schools
 - *Provide seed and supplies to grow a garden
 - *Teach kids empathy (the heart of service) for tiny creatures and their community/Teach them to BEE friendly.
 - *Encourage kids to care about environmental issues
- Support SLP's to build BEE habitats
- Partner with local organizations to support a garden with seed, supplies and labor
- Donate to the BEE A HERO project at https://odkf.org to help provide grants
- Have Club supported SLP clubs apply for a \$100 supplies grant from ODKF
- Imagine what can BEE possible in your Community!
