






#### Feel the love and share the love!



# New committee formed to document Ohio Kiwanis history

Kiwanis is one of those areas in which the history of today, which we often celebrate, is steeped in the traditions of the past.

With that thought in mind, starting with Gov. Kelly Brown, we are beginning work on a Historical Revitalization Committee, which will take several avenues.

What we are looking to do, beginning with Mid-Year, is have Kiwanians who are interested in preserving items from their club (i.e. an old charter), ADVISE the committee - OR VISIT OUR BOOTH AT MID-YEAR - to inform us of what needs to be handled. This will give us a baseline for costs that could be borne, through fundraisers, club funds, district budget or grants.

We are also looking at digitizing not only old charters, but perhaps folders of materials, photos, photos of awards and other items that will either crumble and die off or become destroyed throughout the years. Some samples of these materials might include SLP items, club birthday items, historical data from both the founding of Kiwanis AND the first women in Kiwanis.

Longer term, we are considering establishing a database of materials that could be categorized and lent out almost like a lending library. Another option would be to digitize materials of importance to Ohio Kiwanians and use them as gifts for dignitaries. And those of the membership growth vein might also want to consider that past membership materials could serve as recruitment items for the future!

## Berea Open House gives boost to membership

The Berea Kiwanis Club is one of the largest Kiwanis clubs in Ohio and the largest in northeastern Ohio. Like many clubs across Ohio, it has experienced a membership decline and an older membership.

Since 2020, Berea has lost 17 percent of members and are down to 85 members, according to the official count released by the Ohio District in October 2024. Yet, it still has a strong core membership committed to serving the youth of Berea.

The challenge the club faces is enticing "younger" members to join the club who not only want to support the mission of Kiwanis, but aspire to leadership positions within the club to ensure the club's viability.

On a snowy Tuesday night on Jan. 14, Berea conducted its first ever membership Open House. It drew about 60 people. About 20 of these were club members and members of their affiliated Circle K, Aktion Club and Key Club. Remarkably, the event attracted about to prospective members! A follow-up activity is now under way and, according to Jeff Wayner, Recruitment chairman, the club has 14 prospects committed to join with additional prospects expected.

The event was held at Tony K's, the same local restaurant where Berea holds its weekly meetings. A simple buffet was offered because "if you feed them, they will come." Delicious Tony K wings and pizza were served and members brought cookies for dessert.

The event lasted about two hours. The club showed a new <u>five-minute video</u> that is posted on the homepage of its web site titled "Our Story in 5 Minutes." This video concisely summarizes what the club does and the impact members make.

The club shared its membership brochure, various Kiwanis International brochures and a KI "Kiwanis is Fun" business card. All guests were given a kitchen giveaway magnet that contained a QR code directing them to the club's web site and Facebook page.

The club had short presentations from Jeff Haas, president, and former KI President Alan Penn of Medina, who provided some remarks about the importance of Kiwanis in the community. Alan asked the group to think about "What Berea would be like if Kiwanis wasn't serving the youth of the community?"

Later, the President returned for a 10-minute question and answer period. The Open House was well-planned. It took a strong committee to pull this together.

### Division realignment begins Oct. 1

In August 2022, Past Governor Craig Smith appointed the Mission Advance Task Force, a diverse group of 11 Kiwanians from throughout the Ohio District. The task force was charged with "evaluating and making recommendations on matters related to district governance, divisional boundaries, committee structure, and leadership responsibilities within the Ohio District of Kiwanis."

The MATF was continued under Governors Dave Kuhn, Jason Miller, and Kelly Brown, to complete its thoughtful analysis and discussions.

The committee spent much of the first year gathering data and input from District stakeholders regarding our current form of governance and structure. During the second year, the task force focused on analyzing the data and forming recommendations. Some small policy manual committee consolidations were approved by the ODK Board in August 2023 and some other committee realignments were presented to the 2023-24 ODK board in August 2024.

A plan for divisional realignment was presented to and approved by the 2024-25 ODK Board on Sept. 28, 2024.

What does this mean to divisions and clubs?

- The approved plan will take effect on Oct. 1, 2025. In the meantime, MATF members have been meeting with leadership and members of current divisions/clubs to discuss the plan and to answer questions related to the division adjustments.
- Currently, the Ohio Kiwanis District has divisions of widely varying sizes the number of clubs, the number of members, geographic size, etc. As of April 30, 2024, divisional membership ranged from 77 to 624 and the number of clubs in divisions varied from 5 to 16. Based on this, the desire to make divisional sizes more equitable was an important factor in the planning. Data analyzed included the variables, listed above, and membership trends.
- The last, large, divisional realignment was done in 1998 with a review and smaller realignment being completed in 2017. When these were done, Ohio Kiwanis had many more members and clubs than we currently have, thus, one of the needs for this to be revisited, now.
- Some divisions will be combined, some Kiwanis clubs will have the opportunity to develop a relationship with a different division, and some divisions will remain the same. The Ohio District will be comprised of 19 divisions rather than the current 24.
- Division realignment will not affect how Kiwanis clubs serve their communities. It is an adjustment in governance grouping. Clubs that supported each other's projects can, and are encouraged to, continue to do so.
- Leadership of the current and new divisions are/will be working on future leadership, allocating current division funds, dues structure, bylaws/policies, division council meetings and location, and other necessary details for a smooth transition and move into the future.
- The new divisions are currently designated by letters of the alphabet but the new divisions will have the opportunity to choose a division name representative of the division's location, geographical trait, well-known attraction, or other creative, unique designation.

Members of the Mission: Advance Task Force will continue to be available to support divisions as they make this transition.
