

BEE a Hero is perfect for spring!

By the time you are reading this, I hope you are seeing some green grass, warmer temperatures and the sense that spring is around the corner. I am writing this article viewing a few inches of snow outside my office window and dreaming of warmer times. This made me think of our Governor Kelly Brown's project titled "Bee A Hero" and the types of grants that our ODKF is making currently from the funds raised from our most generous Ohio District Clubs.

Last month ODKF Grants Committee Chairman Rich Rader provided a tremendous Buckey Bulletin article on the many ways grants are provided to our Ohio District Clubs and organizations. These grants are in the forms of larger Children and Community Grants up to a maximum of \$3,000, and our Mini-Grants, which are up to \$500 each with a Club matching amount. Both are very popular and have provided Ohio District Clubs with much needed funding to extend their service reach in their communities.

This month I want to highlight the "Bee A Hero" grant program that is specially designed to support the service efforts of our Kiwanis Service Leadership Programs organizations in their local schools and communities. This grant is available to all SLP organizations who wish to help the efforts of increasing bee populations by expanding pollinator gardens and habitats.



A great spring SLP Project that could be planned right now would be to build a pollinator habitat at your local school or in your community, turn a brown space into a native wildflower garden, and to introduce the pollinator project and curriculum to the other schools in your district.

This "Bee A Hero" Grant, in the amount of \$100 and available for up to two Club supported SLP organizations, can be used to provide seed and supplies to grow a garden, help provide snacks and information to share with the community and local festivals and outings ... the opportunities are only limited by our creativity! And we all know that our SLP organizations are filled with boundless energy and creativity!


Bryan Kiwanian reaches magic numbers

This is a special year for Carlton Hardy of the Kiwanis Club of Bryan.

The longtime Kiwanian turns 100 this month, shortly before he celebrates his 70th year as a Kiwanis member in June.

"Carlton is a true inspiration to me and many others," said current club President Chasity Yoder.

"It's rare to find individuals who have dedicated several decades to the same job, not to mention volunteering for the same organization. His loyalty and commitment to the Kiwanis Club of Bryan, our community, and especially the youth of our community are truly commendable."



The Kiwanis Club of Bryan was formed on June 15, 1955, with 29 charter members. One of those was Hardy, who was born and raised in Bryan and graduated from high school there in 1943.

He joined the club, he said, because it was a new club focused on children, and he also joined for the friendships. He loves the fellowship of the weekly meetings, he said.

"Carlton always helped set up for the weekly meetings. He always has a smile and is extremely consistent with his attendance. Carlton is always just being incredibly dedicated," said Tom Thompson.

He has served numerous roles throughout the years, including president, past president, vice president, president-elect and board member. Hardy has had perfect attendance for many years and even managed perfect attendance for 27 years straight.

"Carlton is generous in his donation of time and money. He is very dedicated to the overall membership," said Dr. Shay Purse.

Hardy has been married to Evelyn for 77 years and they have children Kent and Beth, grandchildren Brandi, Ryan, Caleb, Alyson and Ethan; and great-grandchildren Emma, Mary and Charlie.

Before his retirement in 1990, Carlton managed the Isaac Tire Center in Bryan for 20 years.

In addition, Carlton was elected the "False Irishman" in 1968 for his continuing service to the club. He is a Legion of Honor recipient, Bryan Parade "Grand Marshall" in 1955, and Kiwanian of the Year in 2001.

What advice would he give to someone considering joining the Kiwanis? "Come and visit, ask questions, and learn about the Kiwanis history," he said.




