




May flowers are a beautiful thing

April showers are behind us so it's time to focus on those May flowers.

It is thrilling to see our friends, the pollinators, awaking from their winter slumber and newly "born" bees emerge from their hives to start their mission of collecting pollen and nectar. I've already observed bees clinging to dandelions which are a favorite source of early food (please spare them if you can) as well as circling the blooming trees in my yard and throughout my neighborhood. It's a reminder of how important it is for these little



As I've traveled our mighty Ohio district spreading the word about my Pollinator Project, I continue to be amazed by how this initiative is being embraced. Lots of Kiwanians share their ideas and tell me about the projects being planned. By June, we will see projects in full bloom!

Many Kiwanians have educated me as well. The pollinators and I cannot thank you enough! If you are still thinking about a pollinator project, it's NOT TOO LATE. Seeds can be sown into late May. They can be planted later but will require more water and attention during hotter times to completely germinate. You can plant adult flowers all summer long and late bloomers into fall.

Remember ... bees need nutrition spring through fall before they go dormant for winter. If your club or student leadership program needs financial assistance for a project, WE STILL HAVE GRANT MONIES AVAILABLE. Go to ODKF.org to fill out and return the application. We will review and approve in real time so projects can get under way.

You may also record your project by entering it into the form on the same page. Keep in mind that we want to measure and record your project so that we can quantify the impact of Ohio Kiwanis on pollinator habitats throughout our state. Existing pollinator gardens count, too.

I recently received a report from a Kiwanian who has more than 1,400 square feet of pollinator gardens already growing in his yard. Yay! There will be some fat and happy bees in his neighborhood.

Foundation seeks to add golfers for fundraiser

The Ohio District Kiwanis Foundation and its golf committee are seeking more sponsors and participants for this summer's 68th Annual Ohio Kiwanis Golf Outing.

This year's event once again will be held at Raintree Golf and Event Center located at 4350 Mayfair Road, Uniontown, Ohio. Raintree is located just off I-77 between Akron and Canton. This year the event will take place on Thursday July 17, and participation is limited to the first 128 players registering and prepaying.

The fun begins at 9:30 a.m. with a shotgun start and a scramble format of play. All registrations and sponsorships are being processed online, and you may register or sponsor at <u>odkf.org</u> under the scrolling registration and sponsorship tabs.

As in the past this year's event will feature various levels of prizes by age group and all-female player teams. The net proceeds from the event will be used to help support the Ohio District Kiwanis Foundation projects. As always, this event is open to the entire Kiwanis family and friends of Kiwanis.



The price of this year's event remains \$90 and includes golf, cart, lunch, dinner and prizes. Registration deadline is July 10.

To continue to make this event a success and help raise funds for our Foundation and its grants programs, sponsorships are being sold. Sponsorship levels are as follows; a hole sponsorship for \$100, a par sponsorship for \$300, and a birdie sponsorship for \$550.

The Kiwanis' Eisenbraun Books For Kids Program is a very special project. In Youngtown and Boardman, elementary students from 1st to 5th grade receive a book every other month during the school year to keep and continue to enjoy at home.

"We are so grateful to Boardman-Youngstown Kiwanis!"said Shannon Sefcik, a

Harding Elementary School teacher and the initiator of the project.



"A couple years ago they were looking for a project that would impact children and they selected a project I submitted that would put new books into the hands of children at Harding Elementary School.

The program was so successful that they made the commitment to not only continue the project at Harding Elementary School, but to expand the program into all the Youngstown and Boardman elementary schools."







<u>Kiwanis Club of North Ridgeville shares beekkeeping facts at library</u> <u>storytime</u> (from the May 4 *Morning Journal*)

The <u>Kiwanis Club of North Ridgeville</u> hosted a Kiwanis and Community Helper Storytime at the Lorain Public Library System North Ridgeville Branch, 35700 Bainbridge Road.

The interactive storytime May 2 featured beekeeper and club Treasurer Gary Krone, who provided facts on bees and read books aloud for guests.

According to club President Toni Krone, each quarterly storytime event features a guest representing a profession, such as a police officer, dentist or firefighter, to help children learn about the responsibilities of each occupation.

"We're all about the kids," Toni Krone said. "We thought it would be a fun thing to do."

Gary Krone and Felicia Coffey, public services professional at the North Ridgeville Branch, led the program with songs and stories about bees, encouraging both children and adults to participate.

Gary Krone said he has been a beekeeper for 25 years and enjoys spreading awareness about the importance of bees and the role they play in the environment.

The storytime event was filled with educational material surrounding the life cycle of a bee, how bees make honey, honeycombs, beeswax, the queen bee, beehives, pollen, beekeeping material and equipment and many other facts, he said.

Samples of beeswax and honeycomb were passed around the audience for patrons to see close-up. "Bees are such incredible insects, creatures," Gary Krone said. "My favorite part is just spreading that knowledge about them and what they do for us, and how beneficial they are to our society."

The Kiwanis Club also provided free books, snacks, drinks and homemade pillows with carrying handles and book pouches for the children who attended.

Toni Krone said club members who enjoyed sewing made each pillow featuring a variety of fabrics.

"It's (the pillows) so thoughtful," Coffey said. "It upped the level of education that we usually get in our storytimes, because it was very, very informative and something the kids were interested in, too."

According to Coffey, the program emphasized that bees are not a creature to be scared of because they sting but rather to treat them with care.

"I feel like a childhood fear is related to bees are bugs," she said. "So, normalizing that and making them (children) comfortable with interacting with that is very important. "They're our friends; they make us honey and we care for them."











All clubs can establish a club-advised fund

Clubs can work with your Ohio District Kiwanis Foundation to establish their own 501(c)3 Club Advised Fund.

Your Ohio District Kiwanis Foundation is here to provide many resources for our Ohio District Kiwanis Clubs to utilize.

The CAF or Club Advised Funds program is one of our more popular and growing resources. To date 48 Kiwanis Clubs and organizations have established their own Club Advised Fund with assets of \$1,603,943.00 invested.

Clubs may invest their funds in the investment pool of the Foundation as a Club Advised Fund or subfund. This allows the Club Advised Fund to receive tax deductible donations under the 501(c)(3) IRS provisions of the Foundation. The Foundation also handles financial reporting to the club, the State of Ohio and the IRS.

The minimum amount required to establish a Club Advised Fund is \$5,000. The club pays 1 percent annually for the administration of the fund under \$100,000 and 0.75 percent for a fund over \$100,000. The club also pays investment manager's fees.

The club may distribute funds for their projects at any time upon approval of the Foundation Board. Distributions are made to qualified charitable tax-exempt organizations.

Contact the Executive Director (Alan Penn) or Treasurer (Travis Humphrey) for more details about establishing a Club Advised Fund for your Kiwanis Club. They are available to meet with your club and board members to answer all questions that you may have.

How to Establish a Kiwanis Club Advised Fund:

- 1. Request a meeting with the Foundation Executive Director to review
- 2. the agreement form of the Ohio District Kiwanis Foundation.
- TWANIS FOUND 3. Have your Board of Directors and membership vote to approve the establishment of the
- 4. Select two individuals who will be responsible for depositing and withdrawing monies from your fund.
- 5. You will be notified of your approval by the Ohio District Foundation Board of Directors
- 6. Once approved you will be asked to deposit an initial investment of \$5,000 into your Fund.
- 7. You may begin to collect funds and make deposits in your Fund with the Foundation


The "We Thrive Together Virtual Aktion Club," sponsored by the Kiwanis Club of Chillicothe, was chartered on April 1 with 80 members!
