

ODKF offers options to honor Kiwanians

We all know of Kiwanis members who go above and beyond the expectations of a good Kiwanis member.

These Kiwanis members are regularly available to help with projects; come early and stay late for activities; often work in the background, preferring no recognition; always have a positive attitude; and, once they volunteer for a task, they complete it.

The Ohio District KiwanisFoundation can help your club recognize and honor that individual. Check out the following ODKF programs and consider how they can work for your club.

Club Leadership Award - \$100 contribution. Presentation includes a certificate of recognition.

Legion of Honor Society – This award is presented at 25 years of Kiwanisservice and every five years after 25. There are 3 levels of the Legion of Honor awards – \$20, \$10, and \$5 per year.

Past International Presidents Award – This award is given in recognition of a donation of \$500 to the foundation's endowment funds. It was established in honor of the five Ohio District Kiwanians who served as President of Kiwanis International: Edmund F. Arras (1923-24), Stanley E. Schneider (1976-77), Donald E. Williams (1985-86), Walter G. Sellers (1997-98), and A. Alan Penn (2011-2012). A plaque with the recipient's name on it, a medallionon a ribbon, and a pin are presented to the recipients.

Schneider/Williams/Sellers/Penn Award – For a donation of \$1,000, recognition is given with a Stanley Schneider Award, a Donald Williams Award, a Walter Sellers Award, or an A. Alan Penn Award. Each recognition includes a plaque and a medallion on a ribbon. These donations become part of the endowment of the foundation to support Kiwanis service into the future. Note the specific programs supported by these awards.

Stanley E. SchneiderAward – Established to honor Ohio District Kiwanian Stan Schneider who served as International President during the 1976-77 administrative year. This award is presented based on a contribution of \$1,000, which will be used to support ODKF Safe and Healthy Kids programs.

Donald E. Williams Award –Established to honor Ohio DistrictKiwanian Donald Williams who served as International President during the 1985-86 administrative year. This award is presented based on a contribution of \$1,000 which will be used to support ODKF Children's Hospital and Pediatric Trauma programs.

Walter G. Sellers Award – Established to honor Ohio District Kiwanian Walter Sellers who served as International President during the 1997-98 administrative year. This award is presented based on a contribution of \$1,000 whichwill be used to support ODKF Disaster Relief Fund.

Alan Penn Award – Established to honor Ohio District KiwanianAlan Penn who served as International President during the 2011-12 administrative year. This award is presented based on a contribution of \$1,000 which will be used to support Service Leadership Program funds managed and supported by the Ohio District Kiwanis Foundation.

Ambassador Fund – entry level donation of \$50 – Individual Kiwanians may make continuing contributions to the foundation in increments of \$50 and receive recognition at various levels based on the total of their gifts.

Individuals, clubs or organizations may choose to make tax-deductible contributions to the foundation at any time. These may be to honor a Kiwanian, as a memorial for a deceased person, or for other reasons.

Memorial Contributions – Kiwanis clubs can make donations to the foundation endowment in memory of deceased Kiwanians or other individuals. Donations are used to provide scholarships or recognitions to deserving Kiwanis awardees. A receipt for the gift is provided to the donor, and a letter is sent to the family of the deceased or the individual being honored, informing them of the donation.

Donations may be made to the following memorial funds, which honor Kiwanis members who have passed:

- o Leach Scholarship
- o Dan Bergolc Key Club Secretary scholarship
- o Doug Everett Kiwanis Award
- o B. David Whiteman KiwanisSecretary Award
- o David Gillespie Kiwanis Award
- o Albert and Iris GilbertKiwanis Humanitarian Award

A member of the ODKF Board can make the presentation of any of these awards at a meeting or event.

Consider designating your club's donation to the Ohio District Kiwanis as a recognition award to a deserving Kiwanian or community member. The benefits

This exciting event offers a wonderful opportunity to connect with fellow Kiwanians from around the world, share ideas for community service projects, and learn new strategies for club growth and development. Attendees can also participate in the democratic governance of Kiwanis and experience cultural exchange with the vibrant host city of Manila.

Convention programming typically includes:

Leadership Elections: Opportunities to meet candidates for international board officer and trustee roles.

Local Exploration: Cultural activities to learn about Manila and Filipino culture.

Fundraising Innovation: Workshops exploring new concepts for club fundraising efforts.

Networking Sessions: Structured opportunities for Kiwanians to share best practices.

Membership Development: Training in enhancing club membership and community influence.

The 2026 Kiwanis International Convention is being held jointly with the Asia Pacific (ASPAC) Region's 2026 convention. Many events will be combined, such as the opening session.

The ASPAC region is hosting our Thursday evening ticketed event to showcase the culture of their regions. Everyone is welcome to attend - add that ticket to your registration packet.

The last time the Kiwanis International Convention was outside the United States was 2017 in Paris, France.

The last time the Kiwanis International Convention was held in the Asia Pacific region was 2014 in Tokyo-Chiba, Japan.

The Ohio District proudly announces the launch of the Treasurer of the Year Award, a prestigious new honor designed to recognize outstanding achievement, integrity and leadership in financial stewardship.

On the recommendation of the Past District Treasurers Committee, Immediate Past Governor Kelly Brown's board approved this new award to be given annually.

"Behind every successful organization is a treasurer who ensures stability, transparency, and trust," said Brown.

"The Treasurer of the Year Award shines a spotlight on these unsung heroes whose dedication to financial stewardship makes all the difference."

Treasurers play a vital role in ensuring the fiscal health and sustainability of Kiwanis clubs. The Treasurer of the Year Award celebrates individuals who exemplify excellence in financial reporting, transparency and accountability while making a lasting impact on their clubs.

The requirements for this award can be found on the district's website under the Recognitions tab.

The deadline for applying is March 31, and the award will be based on the prior administrative year.

The winner will be recognized at the District Convention. The selection committee will be made up of the most recent Past District Treasurer (Steve Vrooman) and two additional past district treasurers appointed by him.

Treasurer of the Year - Requirements

- 1. Member in good standing
- 2. Submit timely monthly reports and bank statement reconciliation
- 3. Should attend CLE training or take online module at least once
- 4. Attendance at club board meetings
- 5.On time filing of annual 990
- 6. Timely filing of Attorney General Charitable Law Section
- 7. Must be a club treasurer
- 8. Assist in preparation of annual club budget
- 9. Timely satisfactory year-end audit/review

One page narrative to be included with the above requirements.

Additional Considerations:

- 1. Attendance at Mid-Year Conference
- 2. Attendance at Kiwanis District Convention
- 3. Attendance at Kiwanis International Convention
- 4. Sponsor new member

Certification by club president that the above criteria has been met.

Selection Committee is made up of three past district treasurers appointed by the immediate past treasurer.

Donations remain local to ensure that all kids get the care they need at Nationwide Children's Hospital. The funds raised go to a wide variety of initiatives, such as chemotherapy treatments, art therapy, cancer research, tutoring sessions with teachers and so much more.

- The contest opens on Tuesday, January 6, and closes on Thursday, January 29, 2026
- Entries can only be received by completing the online forms found at www.kiwanis.org/signatureproject. The links will be available and live on January 6. Note we are using a new platform for the contest so it will look a little different, but is greatly improved!
- When a club submits an entry, a copy will be generated to the club, its district secretary and district governor.
- The districts will need to submit their top entry for each group by Thursday, February 26. A link will be provided closer to this date. As a reminder, clubs with fewer than 27 members are Group 1 and clubs with 28 or more members are Group 2.
- Districts and clubs will be notified in early April if their club projects have been selected to the Top 10 of each group.
- NOTE: We will not be having the Signature Project Breakfast at the convention this summer. Instead, we will package and send this celebration to the districts that have top 10 finalists for use at their district conventions.

Ohio joins others in mourning Van Kleef's passing

Case Van Kleef, the 2004-05 Kiwanis International president, passed away November 30. He was a member of the Kiwanis Club of Northside Naples in Florida, U.S. Past club memberships included Wheeling Township (Chicago, Illinois, U.S.); Stevens Point (Wisconsin, U.S.); Plover, a club he built (Wisconsin, U.S.); Bonita Springs (Florida, U.S.); and Rose Float of Pasadena (California, U.S.).



Van Kleef joined Kiwanis in 1965 and held various leadership positions, including club president, lieutenant governor and international vice president/treasurer. He received many Kiwanis honors, including a George F. Hixson Fellow, Diamond-level 11; Charter Walter Zeller Fellow, Diamond-level 3; Heritage Society member; Tablet of Honor; Kiwanis Leadership Society; Carthage-Pullman Society; and G. Harold Martin Society.

Kiwanis International 2005-06 President Steve Siemens recalled how he, Van Kleef and 2006-07 President Nelson Tucker collaborated and worked together for the betterment of Kiwanis.

"When Case became president-elect, since I would follow him [as president], we met and created a continuous plan to have a seamless transition between the Kiwanis years we served. It was our goal to focus on the members, have the same distinguished program and work closely together. We talked weekly. We planned often. We worked together, not caring who was credited," said Siemens. "After Nelson Tucker was successful in his election, we became three leaders with the same mind and mission. Case's creativity, humor, caring heart and humility motivated both Nelson and me, and the members his life touched."
