For the Love of the Family: Make a Plan

Succession planning is essential for family-owned businesses – and no less essential for Kiwanis Clubs. We need to plan for the time when we lose important leaders.

The Ohio District suffered a profound loss last month with the passing of **Robert L. "Bob" Day Jr.**, 83, a past District Treasurer who at the time of his death was secretary and treasurer of the Lima Kiwanis Club and a Kiwanis adviser to several SLPs -- in addition to serving as the Builders Club administrator for the Ohio District. and several important committees.



Bob's passing (story, Page 19) underscores the need to record some important information in advance of the need – a critical step that many clubs might not be taking.

The phrase "We are a Family" resonates deeply at this moment. Succession plans are essential for ensuring continuity during leadership transitions, maintaining stability and preserving institutional knowledge.

The need for this planning should be evident for a family-owned business. The need for clubs in our Kiwanis family to plan might be less obvious, because our leaders are elected as needed. Still, there are some practical considerations. For example:

- How many signers are on the club's bank account?
- Where are club records kept?
- If important club records are stored on a personal computer, who has access to passwords and login info?

These are not idle questions. When a long-serving Ohio Kiwanis division secretary-treasurer entered a period of declining health several years ago, we discovered he was the sole signer on the division's bank account. Fortunately, he was helpful in arranging to add a second signer to the account. This was crucial when the division official passed away. Had his name remained the only one on the account, **the account would have been frozen pending court approval to open it.**

Access to club records is equally important. Physical files are a big part of a club's history and digital files have become even more important. Who else knows where the physical records are kept? Does someone have logins and passwords to recover digital files?

These are the "succession plans" we need to talk about in our Kiwanis Club family. It's important to plan now to answer questions like the ones above, the type of questions that may not be urgent to answer -- until they suddenly are.

The 2025-26 First Family Project: Inspired by a Winter Memory

It was a gray afternoon in February. Our little daughter Lauren, then not yet four months old, was having trouble breathing and was beginning to turn blue. The doctor took one look at her, applied a tiny oxygen mask, and called an ambulance. It was the beginning of a months-long stay in Dayton Children's Hospital.

That's the day our family learned what it's like to feel the absolute panic, helplessness and worry that every family feels when its most vulnerable members are confined to hospital rooms.

That's also the day we first met other families facing the same ordeal.

All of this happened many years ago, but I remember it as if it were yesterday.

The 2025-26 First Family Project was inspired by this experience and the 12-year journey that followed. The Project aims to help make life a little easier for these families by supporting two organizations that helped our family during that journey: Make-A-Wish and Ronald McDonald House.

We've volunteered and served on boards and committees at the Ronald McDonald House of Dayton throughout the years since that first trip to the hospital, because the House provided us with a place to stay and hot meals on many a night.



To help the families who spend nights at the Ronald McDonald House, we're asking Kiwanians to volunteer at the RMH near you and to provide in-kind donations of supplies. Equally important, we're asking you to collect "pop-tabs" from beverage cans to support the RMH aluminum recycling program, which provides cash for each facility.

Years after that first hospital stay, Make-A-Wish granted Lauren's wish to visit Disney World with the family. We all experienced a wonderful visit to a magical destination called Give Kids the World, a special resort focused on Wish Kids, which became our home base for visits to the theme parks of Orlando. The memories of that vacation will always be with us.

We're thankful to both organizations that help families in medical crisis. Please join us in supporting the 2025-26 First Family Project. Thank you!

Investing in Our Communities: A Guide to Ohio District Kiwanis Foundation Grants

As Kiwanians, our mission is to serve the children of the world, one child and one community at a time. Often, our most ambitious project ideas require a bit more financial support than a single club's treasury might allow.

This is where the Ohio District Kiwanis Foundation steps in to help. The Foundation is dedicated to raising and distributing funds specifically to support the programs of Ohio District Kiwanis family organizations that improve the lives of individuals in our communities.



Strategic Focus: Safe and Healthy Kids

The ODKF primarily focuses its grant-award efforts on the "Safe and Healthy Kids" initiative. While the Foundation supports various community projects, priority is given to service projects that demonstrate a clear impact on children's needs, especially in areas such as:

- Safety: Water safety, bicycle safety, fire safety and internet safety.
- Wellness: Food and nutrition programs, mental health support, bullying prevention and drug addiction education.
- Outreach: Projects that reach underserved populations not currently met by existing services.

Grant Opportunities

The Foundation offers different avenues for funding, depending on the scale and nature of your project:

- Standard ODKF Grants: These grants generally provide up to \$3,000 for projects sponsored by qualifying Kiwanis organizations in Ohio.
- Kiwanis Mini-Grants: For smaller, high-impact needs, the Mini-grant program offers club matching grants up to \$500.
- Governor's Project Grants: Specialized funding also might be available for projects aligning with the current Governor's focus area.

Important Timelines and Deadlines

To ensure your application is reviewed in time for your project's start date, keep these cycle deadlines in mind for the 2025-26 period:

Full Grants – Nov. 30 for January funding; March 31 for May funding; June 30 for August funding.
Mini Grants – Oct. 31, Dec. 31, Feb. 28, April 30, June 30 and Aug. 31.

Key Requirements for Success

A successful application requires more than just a great idea; it needs thorough documentation. Before you submit, ensure you have the following ready:

1. Sponsoring Letter: A letter from your Kiwanis club describing its commitment to the project.
2. Detailed Budget: A breakdown clearly showing how grant funds will be utilized.
3. Tax Documentation: A copy of the receiving organization's Tax ID number and IRS tax determination letter.
4. Proof of Impact: A clear description of who will benefit and how the project's success will be measured.

The ODKF also provides a Pre-Submission Checklist to help club presidents ensure all sections are complete and all supporting documents -- like letters of support from community leaders or school officials -- are included before the deadline.

Small Day of Giving gifts can make huge impact

Help reach 55,000 kids!

The fourth Kiwanis Day of Giving will be on Feb. 25. Think of it as 2/25 -- a fitting date, because \$2.25 is enough to make a difference in one child's life through the Kiwanis Children's Fund.

This year, the goal is more ambitious than ever: to raise \$125,000 -- enough to reach more than 55,000 kids in one day!



As the date approaches, look for more information about Kiwanis Day of Giving via email and on social media.

Then plan to gather online with other Kiwanians Feb. 24-26. It's a chance to share stories of your service projects and ways your club helps kids in your community.

You'll also learn about the Kiwanis causes and hear examples of grants that supported Kiwanis service -- thanks to support like yours. In the meantime, spread the word about the event -- and the Children's Fund. Let people know what's possible when they give!

How can you participate?

- Start things off by making your own gift to the Kiwanis Children's Fund. It does not need to be a large gift -- just \$5 or \$10 can make a big difference. Imagine the impact if 500 Ohio Kiwanians contributed \$10 each -- that's \$5,000, or enough to serve more than 2,200 children!
- Encourage others to donate on Feb. 25 by matching your gift or making a gift of personal significance to them. Include a link to the donation page. Individual and club gifts on 2-25 will count toward the final goal.
- Like, share and comment on Kiwanis International's Facebook posts Feb. 24-26. Your interaction will help remind and encourage the people you've shared your page with -- because Kiwanis will post updates about our fundraising progress along with inspiring stories of Kiwanians' impact on kids around the world.

3. The candidate is committed to fostering a safe environment for our clubs and members and is excited about promoting risk management awareness across our district.

Aktion Clubs win Kiwanis International contest

The Aktion Club of Licking County won an award from Kiwanis International for the 2024-25 Single Service Project. The Aktion Club of Licking County is sponsored by the Kiwanis Clubs of Granville, Heath Moundbuilders and Newark.

The project was directly motivated by Ohio Kiwanis Governor Kelly Brown's First Family Project. Thanks to Mike Wesley from Newark Kiwanis and Terry Van Offeren from Granville Kiwanis for guiding the Aktion Club through this project.

Aktion Club of Licking County in Ohio, U.S., educated people about the threat to bee habitats from pesticides and climate change as it distributed pollinator seed packets and seed bombs to the public. Members also contributed pollinator plants to a Kiwanis Club Pollinator Garden. Kiwanians helped the club purchase materials and secure seed donations from a company.

Also, Sunshine Aktion Club in Ohio, U.S., raised an inspiring \$1,650 by selling custom-designed T-shirts. Members then purchased school supplies and filled backpacks, delivering them to local schools and to organizations for students in need.

Sunshine Communities' Aktion Club -- sponsored by the Kiwanis Club of Maumee -- introduced a new approach to the traditional model last year. While most clubs are hosted by Boards of Developmental Disabilities or independent providers, Sunshine hosts its club directly, offering residential, vocational, therapeutic and recreational services under one roof.

Here's a glimpse at how these clubs served wide-ranging causes and made a difference in their communities:



ARC Fresno Aktion Club in California, U.S., supported the Heart of the Horse Therapy Ranch with a day of volunteering.

Highlands County Aktion Club in Florida, U.S., knew that learning how to serve food safely would allow the club to do more food-related service projects, so 15 members and three volunteers participated in a four-hour course to earn food handler certification.

Aktion Club of Lady Lake in Florida, U.S., made bright and cheery paper flowers and bookmarks – and added snacks to Easter baskets for the local Ronald McDonald House.

Maine-Niles Association of Special Recreation Aktion Club in Illinois, U.S., held a drive to collect children's books.

Westminster Aktion Club in Maryland, U.S., successfully applied for a parks program initiative, which will give members responsibility for cleanliness and trail maintenance at one of the city parks.
