Kids are curious, lovable and hilarious. They are also wild, impatient and vulnerable. Kiwanis is looking out for kids in every corner of the globe with more than 550,000 volunteers who serve their communities through local clubs.



Back to School Packs

Kiwanis Sydney, through a contact of Belinda's, contacted Lidcombe Public School to understand if they had any students who needed help with the return to school basic items. The Assistant Principal Lindsay told us they had 12 students out of 27 in the support unit that the teachers nominated as needing assistance. The school has 900 students with 3 special education classes. These students have complex sensory, learning and behavioural needs.

Angelique took on the challenge at short notice to purchase the 12 backpacks and contents. She also delivered the packs to the school in time for the start of term.

The packs included drink bottles, lunch boxes, sensory toys, glue sticks, pencils and other items. We also provided a class basket of sensory toys for sharing.

Lindsay also raised other ways our club may help in the future. These included music therapy instruments, sensory toys/tools, art and craft supplies and their life skills program that is based around shopping, cooking, clothes washing, sewing and gardening. We will research these needs and the board will decide what extra support we can give.

This initial contact promises to lead to a longer-term relationship with Lidcombe Public School.

The Harding Miller Education Foundation is extremely proud of the excellent results our Class of 2023 scholars achieved. We would like to take this opportunity to congratulate all our scholars.

An impressive 36% of the 55 Harding Miller scholarship recipients who sat their HSC exam in NSW this year, were recognised on the HSC Honour Roll 2023.

In New South Wales HMEF had one scholar receive the All-Round Achiever Award for students who attained 90 or above (Band 6 or Band E4) in at least ten units of

study.


We also had

one scholar receive the Top Achiever Award for students who achieved one of the highest places in an HSC course or VET examination and also achieved a result in the highest band (Band 6 or Band E4).

In addition, we had another 20 scholars receive Distinguished Achiever Awards for those students who achieved a mark in the highest band for one or more courses.'

Rainbow Childrens Home

Recently Kiwanis Sydney sent its' annual donation to Rainbow Childrens Home in Pokhara, Nepal. We have sent donations to support RCH for 9 years since 2015. Also 5 of our members went to RCH in 2019 while we were in Nepal for ASPAC Convention in Kathmandu.

Goma is the principal and reports back on the activities of the orphanage as below.

'On 14th February 2024, we celebrated "Saraswati Pooja", worship of Goddess Education and Wisdom or Saraswati. This festival celebrates that children start school today and start to write and read. Children who are studying at any level also celebrate this festival. In the Hindu religion it is believed that Goddess Saraswati will bless you with more knowledge, intelligence and motivation for reading and writing, In some educational institutes, groups and institutional worship programs will be organized. Every year our children also organize a worship program in RCH. I have attached a few photos of the same for you.'





New POS

We obtained a new Point of Sale (POS) from the Commonwealth Bank just before our latest barbeque. It was free and the CBA set it up already linked to our Kiwanis Sydney account.

It links to any smart phone via Bluetooth via an app called Smart Mini. You simply enter the amount of the sale and the POS accepts the electronic payment from credit card, phone or watch. The fact that it links to any

smart phone means that more members can work the payments. The other bonus is that the fees are only 1.1% whereas we have been paying 1.9% using Square.

There is some loss of functionality in that we cannot use it like a cash register where it sums the sales against specific items and it doesn't sum the cash sales. However, with it being simpler we expect that there will be less issues on the day.

ASPAC Kiwanis Convention

The Kiwanis Districts of Australia, New Zealand-South Pacific, Japan, Taiwan, Nepal, Southern Philippine, Philippine Luzon, Malaysia plus Korea, Singapore, Hong Kong, Guam, Pakistan and India will all come together at an ASPAC Convention in Adelaide in the coming week. Senior Leaders from Kiwanis International and from Kiwanis Childrens Fund will also attend.

There are over 430 people registered to attend the Adelaide Convention Centre. Punching above our weight is Kiwanis Sydney with 12 attendees.

We are looking forward to meeting old friends from around the world, learning what is happening in Kiwanis and how we can better serve the community.


