My final report as Governor and closing an incredibly busy Kiwanis year for me. Kiwanis Australia District (KAD) is at a very important and critical position at the moment.

The long term trend and predictions show our membership numbers and club numbers have

fallen and are significantly below those numbers to maintain District status, as advised by Kiwanis International. message is now critical for the District and does have significant longer term issues. I have been advised that six of the Kiwanis Australia District clubs will close this Kiwanis Some members are transferring to other clubs and unfortunately some are leaving, thank you for your years of service. It is imperative that clubs keep their members as actively involved in value adding projects and activities as possible, be it fundraising or service.

The relationship between Kiwanis Australia District and organisations such as HeartKids, the Children's First Foundation, 123Read2Me and ALL continue to strengthen and provide opportunities for clubs and members to be more involved in service and fundraising.

This year HeartKids has moved forward from the Grants in Aid research to specific projects. In particular, they have requested our interest and funding into two particular projects, the Primary Years Program and the Teen Transition Program. These need to be put to Charitable Foundation consideration and funding, given the move from Grants in Aid, pure research, to these programs, applied research. These programs are designed to address key priority areas and align closely with HeartKids objectives. It is very pleasing to have both Marcus Sandmann (CEO) and Tracy Stanley (National Support Program Development Manager ) as corporate members of Kiwanis.

The Children's First Foundation (CFF) is evolving the model of how they support children in need of life saving surgery. They have a number of issues in bringing children to Australia, including visa issues, cost, rehabilitation etc. Increasingly they are setting up in country surgery involving the development and upskilling of doctors or surgeons within their country. They have a number of projects currently that they are looking to fund. Kiwanis clubs have funded the six cleft pallet surgeries in Bangladesh and the CFF are looking for funding, for example, for providing paediatric life support training to clinicians in PNG. It is very pleasing to note that their CEO, Jessica Redwood, is now a corporate member of Kiwanis.

Memorandum now have а Understanding signed with the 123Read2Me organisation for the national supply of free children's books. This is a great opportunity for KAD to support children's literacy and to involve members in easy but very worthwhile activities. Books can be distributed nationally, but is yet to be embraced interstate as much as expected. The children's books are as new and are graded into boxes, categorised as Baby, Pre-School & Kindy, Primary Picture and Primary Reader. Distribution is not limited and includes schools, community centres, organisation events, HeartKids, e.g. laundromats, fish & chip shops, etc.

This year KAD highlights included conducting an outstanding Asia Pacific Kiwanis Convention (ASPAC) in Adelaide.

Thank you to the Kiwanis Australia District Board of Trustees, Leadership Chairs, Clubs, Members and volunteer helpers. We are still making a difference to Kids in Need and still Serving the Children of the World. The real difference is made locally with clubs and members making a difference in supporting children and with those that help children. Again, thank you.



We are proud to present <a href="The Possibility Project">The Possibility Project</a>, Kiwanis' first fundraising campaign dedicated exclusively to empowering Kiwanis clubs to dream bigger and support more children.

Together with our Kiwanis Children's Fund, we will raise US\$25 million over the next five years to impact 10 million children around the world.

We encourage you to get involved in this transformative project. You can learn more, donate or become a volunteer.

#### **DELEGATES APPROVE DUES INCREASE**

Delegates to the 2024 Kiwanis International Convention approved two amendments to the organization's bylaws that will affect annual membership dues paid to Kiwanis. These changes, along with ongoing cost-saving measures, will bolster Kiwanis' long-term financial health and help us fulfil our mission of serving the children of the world.

Delegates overwhelmingly voted to:

- Adjust the Kiwanis International dues to US\$77 from US\$52 for Tier 1 and to US\$34 from US\$23 for Tier 2.
- Reduce the number of dues-paying tiers in Kiwanis International from three to two. Tier 1 will include U.S. and Canada and all other districts in countries with per capita incomes of US\$10,000 or more as reported by the World Bank on 31 July 2024. All other districts will be in Tier 2.

These updates to the bylaws take effect from 1 October 2024.

Dido Street Early Learning Centre in Kiama is among the schools excited to hop for a cause, with director Kate McNaughton noting the engaging resources provided by HeartKids to educate students about their efforts.

Children can participate by hopping for four minutes to remember the four lives lost weekly to CoHD, eight minutes for the eight newborns diagnosed each day, or simply hopping to show support.

### Teen Transition Program



Transitioning from paediatric to adult health care services sees a concerning 'loss to follow up' rate with notably higher mortality rates for young adults who fall out of the system.

Recognising the necessity tailored for services, HeartKids is focusing on young people aged 12-18 with childhood-onset heart disease (CoHD). The objective is to offer support amidst the distinct health, mental health and social challenges they face. The program would be a collaboration between HeartKids, the paediatric hospitals and adult health care services. A primary goal is to educate this demographic and parents/carers about the young person's heart condition, recommended Adult Congenital Heart Disease (ACHD) services and centres, thus reducing dropout rates during the transition from paediatric to adult care. Additionally, the program aims to empower them with the confidence, resilience, and skills essential for managing their health independently.

#### Objectives:

 Ensure continuity of care for heart kids as they transition into adulthood, aligning with the organisation's mission of lifelong support for CoHD patients and their families.



- Educate and empower teens and young adults to assume responsibility for their health during the transition phase, thereby enhancing follow-up rates and medical outcomes. Alongside the education sessions for teens and young adult sessions will also be conducted for parents/carers.
- 3. Foster peer-to-peer communication and support, crucial for this age group.
- 4. Maintain regular communication to gather meaningful feedback on effective support services and advocacy issues pertinent to young CHD patients.

### **Primary Years Program**

**HeartKids** Primary Years HeartKids Program is a specialised program designed to support primary school-aged children living with childhood onset heart disease (CoHD) by addressing their social, emotional, physical, and educational needs. The program aims to bridge the gap in existing support services for this demographic, providing tailored psychosocial resources, activities, and support.





**Volunteers** are always needed for roles including registration, raffle sales, marshalling, and BBQ preparation.



# KIWANIS INTERNATIONAL DENVER CONVENTION 2024

The 2024 Convention in Denver, Colorado 'Gateway to the Rockies!' continued the trend for enjoyable get-togethers of Kiwanians on a truly international scale. Following the success of our Adelaide-based ASPAC Convention, the catalyst for an excellent turnout of Kiwanians from the 'growth area' Asia & South Pacific. Australia District was represented in Denver by Governor-Elect, David McNabb, along with incoming Lt Governor, Joseph Fombason, while the other member of our team, Governor Ian Randall sadly was sidelined at the last minute by technical issues. This meant that David had a 'baptism of fire', needing to step up a notch, earlier than planned!

The 2024 Convention was a week later than usual, meaning it clashed with USA's 4 July celebrations, where everything ramps up. That won't be the case for 2025 Convention where the date is a week earlier than 4 July. After the lengthy plane trip to Denver city, where navigating the airport and its punchy, driverless shuttle service keeps you on your toes.

The new Governors had a full day's training, before convention, which proved valuable. It was interesting to discover that the 2024-25 Governors are half female, which is a first! There was a great camaraderie amongst the group of 'L' plate Governors at the Hyatt Regency Denver, at 38 storeys is the city's tallest building. The nearby Colorado Convention Centre is eye-popping huge. It was great being able to shop till you drop at the Expo plaza, purchasing regalia of all types, and perusing a myriad of Kiwanis displays.

Thursday morning when activities began kicking off, many folk took the chance of attending the Signature Breakfast, in the Mile High Ballroom. Denver is the 'Mile High' city due to its high height above sea level. The 10 finalists from 526 entries in KI Signature Project competition were recognised with a small, unique trophy, where David & Joseph had the honour of being first up on stage to accept on behalf of Australia, the award to **Glenelg Club** for making **Top Ten** for its Australia Day Breakfast event. Incidentally, in previous years Signature Project winners have won trophies, but this year there was also a monetary award.

Following that excitement, David and Joseph watched the impressive pomp & pageantry parade of banners and national flags that officially kick-started 2024 Convention. Fifteen past International Presidents were present including both past Lady Presidents, and an 11% increase in registrations over last year's Minneapolis Convention.

A delicious array of varied and interesting Workshops awaited us Kiwanians. One of the more interesting ones covered alternate fundraising ideas.

The scheduled announcement of the KI Major Project to replace **Eliminate** (2010), with the **Possibility Project.** The new focus now will be on raising funds directly for Kiwanis Children's Fund, with pledges and donations aiming to directly help 66 million children worldwide over the next half decade. Gifts can come from members direct to the Foundation, and there's a new Dr Will Blechman Fellowship following the theme of this 108th Convention, 'Explore the Possibilities'.

A busy 'buzzy' workshop discussed the case for voting on proposed fee increases. Sue and Paul Palazzolo facilitators, and lots of healthy debate ensued. especially when it was noted that Kiwanis has had just one increase in 20 years. Saturday's House of Delegates proved 'interesting' as expected. Armed with efficient electronic voting devices, the fee increase new fee: Tier 1 US\$77, Tier 2 \$US34 was approved. The KI Board was approved for reducing from 15 to 12, for cost-saving, but that does mean some regions and Districts have reduced representation.

Preceding all that was a fitting tribute to significant Kiwanians who have passed away in the past year, with a moving reference to Australia's own Ian Perdriau AM International President 1994-95. The important vote for Kiwanis Vice-President, to take the top role in 2026 saw two past Trustees as candidates, along with Hope Markes from Jamaica, who won it.

There was lots of extra Convention information, but new Governor David intends 'divulging' more as he moves around the District on Club and Divisional visits. Overall, Denver was a worthwhile experience. Do keep Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania in mind for 2025 Convention, to be held 25-28 June. You'll love the experience!

# KIWANIS NEW ZEALAND SOUTH PACIFIC DISTRICT CONVENTION

At the end of September 2024 a few Aussies made the pilgrimage to Auckland for the Kiwanis New Zealand South Pacific District Convention. There were Steve and Cathy Hughes (Sydney), Tony and Pauline Gunn (Port Phillip), Sue Kimberley (Waverley) and Angelique, Mark and Anthony Mastoroudes (Sydney). The convention had about 60 registrations coming from New Zealand, New Caledonia, Tahiti, Vanuatu and Taiwan. This was lower than usual due to a clash with a major fundraiser and civil unrest in New Caledonia.

It was appreciated that they played and sung the Australian anthem to recognise our presence. That night was the dinner and awards. Saturday had the usual reports, elections and approval of resolutions plus workshops.



Saturday night saw the fun 'Beach theme' dinner and dancing. Sunday morning was brunch, saying goodbye to friends before heading home. It showed that the Convention can be trimmed to one and a half days and still get through all the business, ceremony and fellowship with a reduced time and costs to attendees.

Guest speakers included;

Life Education Trust or Healthy Harold. They have five mobile classrooms that visit schools and use giraffe puppets to teach kids how to avoid obesity, bullying, mental health issues and substance abuse. Kiwanis NZSP donated \$4,975 from their Trust to help them replace ten of their puppets. They educate about 30,000 kids each year.



Kiwanis Threads across the Pacific is a **Signature Project** led by a NZ Kiwanian, Caroline Salisbury, obtaining Bernina sewing machines and rolls of material. They send these to Vanuatu for the local ladies to learn sewing, maintenance of the machines and make clothing for their families and to sell. Caroline travels to Vanuatu to teach the ladies a couple of times a year. They have setup sewing groups in schools, Vanuatu Women's Prison and other groups. They have seen the ladies grow in confidence and self-esteem.

ASPAC Trustee, Chang-Ching Susan Hsu, showed a video about the ASPAC Convention 2025 to be held in Kaohsiung, Taiwan in March 2025. They are expecting about 3,000 Kiwanis to attend.

Hands started out supporting 34 children in the small community of Khao Lak and due to the increased demand of our services and through the generosity of our community and valued partners has expanded its reach to care for 350 children across seven projects in Thailand. Hands has gone from employing one staff member to providing employment to over 60 people across Thailand.

The children come from; no known family to support them; have a family member but unable to support them; and those living in an unsafe environment.

**Hands** provides food, money and outreach to set the children up for life. Kids are encouraged to garden at the homes so they learn self-sufficiency.



The "Insect Hotel Building" activity is on Sunday 10 November at **Sprout**. Helpers will need to be there about 10am for an 11am to 1pm event. We will also be holding a free sausage sizzle. RiverConnect and Landcare are providing supplies and demonstrations. Karen Sutherland will be talking about the relationship between native plants and insects.




