It's really encouraging to hear of such progress and at a zoom meeting last month, KI CEO Paul Palazzolo admitted to being encouraged about the efforts being made in this direction.

The 2025 ASPAC Convention held in Kaohsiung, Taiwan mid-March was a worthy followup to Australia District's ASPAC held in Adelaide last year. The gathering in Taiwan was notable for a good-sized number of Australian Kiwanians attending (both the Training component and Convention-proper) – a fitting tribute to this 2025 ASPAC marking the fiftieth anniversary of these Conventions. Back to KI news, the work by Bob Sitters in helping to keep the Possibility Project at the forefront of fundraising efforts is admirable since this venture was launched at 2024 Denver Convention, with its ambitious but achievable goal of raising US\$25 million over a five year term.



There's still time to register for 2025 International Convention in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, but you'll need to be quick. The "traditional" ball game on Friday night is sold out, but places can still be found at most of the other events, including where Conventioneers will be able to hear an address from Keynote Speaker Henry Winkler - or 'The Fonz' as he was known in his television days - in the Happy Days series that ran for a decade from 1974.

Winkler, a spritely 79, is a passionate advocate for children with learning challenges (fits our mantra of serving children of the world), his mission is embedded in a personal journey with undiagnosed dyslexia. Be sure not to miss this Convention highlight.

International President Lee Kuan Yong (left) has as one of his main slogans, the phrase Build Nurture Retain, which in many ways is self explanatory. It's by these precepts we should move forward in our Kiwanis journey - that's up to all of us.

As a brief background, Kuan Yong first came to the attention of us Kiwanians in Australia District when as Trustee he came over from Malaysia to attend the 2013 District Convention held at West Lakes, Adelaide, which was jointly organised by Divisions 3, 8 and 10 in South Australia.

Kuan Yong has been a great ambassador for Kiwanis over the past 12 years, and in four months time will be looking to hand over the KI President role to President-Elect Michael Mulhaul of New Jersey. Michael has been ramping up his involvement at KI senior level in preparation for being installed as President, which is the usual "pecking order". Michael will be followed by past Trustee Hope Markes of Jamaica.

Hosted by TV presenter Luke Huysmans and featuring HeartKids' mental health and medical experts, this event was a reminder that while CoHD can be complex, community makes it easier to bear. Events like these are where United Community truly shines.

### Empowering Teens, One Step at a Time

The transition from paediatric to adult healthcare is a critical, and often scary milestone for teens with CoHD. Thanks to Kiwanis' support, the HeartKids Teen Transition Program is

### JESSICA'S JOURNEY TO TIMOR-LESTE

I wrote to you last edition of AK about my recent trip to Timor-Leste, where in partnership with the Queensland Children's Hospital, Royal Australasian College of Surgeons, and local surgeons, we worked to deliver life-changing surgery for 44 Timorese children and build the capacity of the local surgical team.

I also had the great honour and privilege of visiting some of the Timorese children we have treated here in Australia. You may recognise some of the faces in the picture below – Cristina (Tina), Zenilda, Fatima, Malik, Angela and Margareta. Thanks to you, they all received life-transforming surgery and are now thriving back home.

Seeing the impact after surgery and recovery is truly h e a r t w a r m i n g. Positive force uplifts the children, their families, and the entire community.



Now, to answer the questions we're all asking - what's everyone up to?

Malik is as full of beans as ever but now he's running at full speed!

Christina is finishing school, doing incredibly well, and planning for what will be an incredible career.

Fatima is thriving - she's grown up so much and is about to start school!

<u>Zenilda</u> will return to Australia for a medical follow-up soon before returning to Timor to continue excelling at school. Nothing is holding her back now!

Margareta has finished university and has one more exam before she can start working and pursuing her passion as a teacher.

The biggest surprise of all – <u>Romario</u>. He is now in law school and excelling!

I was blown away to see their confidence, good health, and determination, which were even more evident and shining strong in their home context. They spoke about their lives with such positivity and introduced their entire families with such happiness. Then, in turn, they introduced me and talked to their families about Children First, shared their stories, and spoke of their experiences with so much pride, even though accessing surgery is an incredibly challenging time in anyone's life.

I was beaming with pride to see each and every one of them! I am sure you are too. Every child deserves access to safe, timely surgical care.

These smiling faces are proof of what a difference access to quality medical care can make, not just at the time of surgery but for that child's entire life. I heard about parents and older

siblings who could return to work and school.

Because of the care and support of Kiwanians (and others), these weren't just transformed children; they were transformed families.

Thank you for your continued compassion and support. Like a pebble dropped into a pond, your care continues to ripple and flow outwards in more positive ways than you can count.

### MORE CHILDREN HELPED BY CHILDREN FIRST

Kiwanians, thank you for your life-changing support: You helped save Elina. You may remember Elina from Zambia, who was introduced to you in the last (February) Australian Kiwanian.

She underwent life-saving surgery in Adelaide, and the results have been tremendous. Elina is now back home in Zambia and attending school - a long-held dream finally being realised thanks to kind people like you. Photos, right, show Elina before and soon after surgery

#### **Other Updates**

As part of our efforts to help more children and make sustainable change, we conducted a pilot in April in Timor-Leste. Working with Queensland Children's Hospital, Royal Australasian

College of Surgeons, and local surgeons at Guido Valadares National Hospital to provide surgery to children in need and train the local team.

There were so many children in need of surgery but one of the 44 children who received surgery as part of our partnership was little Marcio (right). Marcio had a large cystic hygroma (tumour), starting to put pressure on his shoulder, ribs, lungs, and spine. Because of the generosity and tenacity of everyone involved, Marcio underwent his life-changing surgery. When asked what he's excited about now that he doesn't have to stay at home inside, with a twinkle in his eye but no hesitation, he replied, "I can't wait to be naughty!" We can let him have a little mischief, don't you think?

#### Samoa. Make a difference today, make a difference tomorrow

Did you know that a Kiwanis member, Norm McLennan, did something incredible just before he died late last year? Thanks to Norm, we were able to conduct a pilot project in Samoa in 2024 - providing surgery and training the local surgical team. This project supported 18 children to access critical surgery and trained eight members of the local surgical team. This year, we are working hard to raise the \$15,000 to keep this important project going.

With only two surgeons in Samoa, neither specialising in paediatrics, many children cannot access surgical care,

leading to devastating consequences. This initiative supports children's access to surgery today, while directly addressing this gap, building local capacity and strengthening the healthcare system to provide ongoing, high-quality surgical care to Samoan children tomorrow.

Sidath is looking forward to his surgery in Australia, but he still needs your help. Sidath, 10, from Bhutan desperately needs complex surgery to remove a large tumour on his face - as you can see straight away from his photograph. Sidath's condition is critical, and it is essential that he comes to Australia for surgery as soon as possible.

Sidath's tumour is not only distressing but it affects the nerve that controls sensation in his face, causing him nerve damage and intense pain - and you can tell from his picture (above, left) that he has already lost the use of his right eve. To complicate matters, although Sidath's tumour is benign now, it has the potential to become cancerous if not removed. My team and I are working around the clock to get Sidath's visa and raise funds to get him here for surgery in July. Without surgical care, his future – and his life – hangs in the balance.


Are you keen but unable to get to your regular Kiwanis Club meeting?


Elections saw Brisbane's Ray Behn (he's from Adelaide originally!) voted in as Lt Gov Div 2-Elect - welcome, Ray.

# FIFTIETH ASPAC 2025

# **MARCH 14-16**

# Fresh from the success of last year's ASPAC held in Adelaide, Australia was quite well represented at 2025 Taiwan ASPAC.

Attendees from Down Under included from SA - Governor David and Kerry, from Victoria Tony Gunn, NSW in numbers, including Governor-Elect Steve Hughes & Cathy, along with Lt Gov Div 2 Naz and Deen, and another from SA who was there for training - incoming District Secretary Kavitha.

Centred in the southern city of Kaohsiung which is the third largest population centre after Taichung and capital Taipei, this ASPAC was notable for marking the fiftieth anniversary since the first of these Conventions was held in 1985 in Hong Kong.

Taiwan (formerly Formosa) has now hosted ASPAC nine times and they went the extra yards in 2025 to ensure this fiftieth anniversary would be memorable.

At the evening banquets there was awesome entertainment including a powerful drum ensemble, and an outdoors pyrotechnic display with laser light augmentation that defied description.



While there were no Workshops as such, the business sessions at House of Delegates were certainly 'busy', with elections, reports, presentations and discussions on the restructure of ASPAC finances involving Kiwanis International. The Fords, who both turned 96 earlier this year, joined Kiwanis in 1982, initially with Burnside Club, SA, and then switched to Rostrevor-Campbelltown, where they are Honorary members. There was an item about the Fords early 2024 in AK, but this is a further update.

A Past District Governor (1993-94), Norman has served as Club President and as an advocate for children with intellectual disabilities. He was awarded an Order of Australia Medal (OAM) for service to the community in January 2013.

He acknowledged that the OAM honour is a tribute to the work of Kiwanis, which offers leadership development, fundraising and mentoring programmes for children across the world. Norman has also acknowledged the support of wife Hazel (a Kiwanis member) during his Kiwanis career.

He was head of the lodine Deficiency Disorder (IDD) programme, a Kiwanis International project in partnership with UNICEF. That worldwide project ran for several years, and Kiwanis helped raise over US\$100m to eliminate IDD worldwide. Norman was the Project Director.





The top was made by Shared Stitches member Jane McMellon who estimates it took around 28 hours and working on and off over a fortnight. She used colleccted fabric pieces she had on hand - at 100 per cent cotton for both the top and the back, she designed the pattern to best show the quality and design of the fabrics. The finished quilt is about four square metres.

Professional quilter Rose Bauer of Vintage Quilting in the Barossa Valley completed this work of art - the pattern being called "Lively".

It's even patched with an inner wadding of a wool and polyester blend, which means it is soft, warm but lightweight it can even be machine washed.

The Prospect Kiwanis Club is very grateful for this donation, and there are so many that will benefit from this generous effort. Thanks again to Shared Stitches, and Vintage Quilting.

### **KIWANIS BOOK SHOP UPDATE**

For those Kiwanians who might have come in late, here's a bit of background on the very successful Kiwanis Book Shop at Mount Barker in the Adelaide Hills.

In early 2018 the Adelaide Hills Kiwanis Club realised that a fundraising opportunity was becoming available. Mt Barker with a population now of over 25,000, didn't have a dedicated book shop. After testing the demand at a local market, the Kiwanis club made the decision to open a book shop as their main fundraising focus.

Several hurdles were presented for solving to the formation committee, such as finding a venue, shelving, a supply of good quality books, and of course most importantly, volunteers to staff the store. Identifying an old heritage-listed building available at a "peppercorn" rent was the signal to get busy and make it happen.

Seven years later the Kiwanis Book Shop has gone from

strength to strength. From initial dreams of raising \$20K - \$30K sales per annum, over the past 12 months sales have topped \$70K and continue to grow, as more people spread the word about this terrific book shop with reasonable prices around \$1, \$2 and \$3 per book.

The annual turnover of around 28,000 books requires many volunteers to staff the Wednesday to Saturday 10 - 1pm and 1pm-4pm shifts. Currently a dozen members of the Kiwanis Club and 33 members of the community volunteer regularly to clean, price, shelve books and attend to customers.

Overheads are minimal, which allows the Book Shop to give annual donations to over 30 charities. In addition, many local families and children are supported after recommendations from local schools. A recent example was funding a professional diagnosis for autism for a young child. There is a three to five year wait to access that diagnosis via the public health system. An early diagnosis is critical for the child's development and access to NDIS funding.

The Book Shop went international in mid-2022 by providing funding to build shelving and donating excess books in the Territory of Uvira in the Democratic Republic of Congo. That involvement has continued with the donation of medical books to that library.

In summary, from little things, BIG things grow! Dare to dream, take a risk, work hard and the rewards in community service may follow. And your club may just win an international Signature Project Award. Five years ago, the Kiwanis Book Shop performed exceptionally well to win the Bronze Award.
