Main Event: Thursday May 22, 2025
Additional events available in June and July, by sponsor preference and/or Patient VIP need.

Boats Depart at 6:00 a.m. from Chinook Pier, Grand Haven and return by Noon for Fish Weigh-In, Lunch, Program and Prizes

Chinook Sponsor — \$5,000
 Three boats holding up to 18 participants.

Atlantic Sponsor — \$3,500
 Two boats holding up to 12 participants.

Coho Sponsor — \$2,000
 One boat holding up to 6 participants.

Pink Salmon Sponsor — \$1,000
 Up to 3 participants; no boat choice.

Patient VIP Boat Sponsor — \$2,000
 For 3 patients and their adult chaperones.

Patient VIP Benefactor — \$600
 Sponsor 1 patient and adult chaperone.

 Sponsors may donate one or more boats to Patient VIPs. Additional donations or gifts are gladly accepted.

Sponsorships must be received no later than two weeks in advance of event date. Boats are chartered and assigned based on paid sponsor request whenever possible. All boat sponsorships must register in advance.

Frequently Asked Questions

How old is this event? 21 years! Earl held the first "Sportfishing Tourney" on June 2, 2005. We've been fishing non-stop ever since, sometimes twice a year, even through covid.

How much has it raised? We are proud to report that we have donated \$733,873.16 to children's hospitals since 2005.

Where does that money go? Originally, the event was a fundraiser for St. Jude Children's Research Hospital. However, it didn't take long to bring our focus closer to home! Every penny raised goes to Child Life Programs at Michigan children's hospitals.

Which hospitals are supported?
 1. CS Mott Children's Hospital, Ann Arbor
 2. Children's Hospital of Michigan, Detroit
 3. Mary Free Bed Hospital & Rehabilitation Center, Grand Rapids (specifically MFB Kids and Youth Adaptive Sports)
 4. Helen DeVos Children's Hospital, Grand Rapids

What is "Child Life" and why is it important?
 Child Life programs directly impact the well being of children undergoing treatment. Certified Child Life Specialists hold degrees in child development, psychology, education or therapeutic recreation. Their work focuses on reducing fear, anxiety and pain for hospitalized children and accelerating healing through play, distraction, therapy and education.

Child Life programs are funded entirely through grants and donations.

What is the "Child Life" and why is it important?
 As the story goes, a grandfather was visiting his ailing granddaughter in the children's ward of the University of Michigan Hospital (now C.S. Mott Children's Hospital). Although she was receiving excellent medical care, he saw that her educational and childhood needs were not being met. He wanted more for his granddaughter.

Thanks to his efforts, in 1922 the Kiwanis Club of Ann Arbor established a school and recreation program for the children's units in the hospital. That program evolved to become the Kiwanis of Michigan Foundation, combining the fundraising efforts of all Michigan Kiwanians.

Who fishes in the derby? Both paid sponsors and "Patient VIPs" can fish in our event. Sponsors can choose to fill their boat with up to six of their own participants—employees, associates, friends or family—or donate their boat to Patient VIPs of the children's hospitals.

The grand prize is awarded to the angler of the largest fish by weight in each category. Sponsors and VIPs. Additional prizes are awarded by drawing. A dockside hot dog lunch is served.

What boats participate? We charter boats from Chinook Pier in Grand Haven unless a paid sponsor requests a specific charter boat.

Expansion is always an option! We would happily send anglers from any Michigan port, on any professional charter boat, for any type of fishing, grants and donations.
