Evren Erhan joined us to speak about Rank MI Vote, "Ranked Choice Voting" and the initiative to get it on the ballot for 2026. Voters rank as many candidates as they want in order of preference. This voting method gives voters more freedom. Instead of picking just one candidate, a voter has the option to rank their candidates in order of preference. Ballots are counted in "instant runoff rounds" where contestants receiving the fewest top-choices are

eliminated and their supporters' ballots are then counted toward the next choice indicated on each.

Members from the new Key Club Board attended the meeting. Maddy, the new President reviewed the projects from last year and what they plan to do for the next school year.



# **Kiwanis Trivia**

The first Kiwanis headquarters, a two-room office, was opened in Chicago in 1918. Kiwanis continued to rent larger and larger offices in the "Windy City" until 1957, when the first Kiwanis International building was dedicated. This building served Kiwanis for 25 years, until the organization outgrew the space. In 1982, the sale of the property allowed construction of a larger building in Indianapolis—a site with lower costs and greater convenience than downtown Chicago.
