Last Week's Meeting Highlights



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Highlights of the Thursday, 22 June, 2023 Weekly Meeting



President Elect Alfred, presided over this meeting and called it to order at 12:30PM, welcoming those in attendance.

After the Opening Thought for the Day, PE Alfred called Kiwanian Phil to conduct the 50/50 draw. He had our Guest Speaker Brian Wood draw two possible winning tickets to the eventual dismay of most of the crowd.

Maureen tried her hand at finding the Joker to win \$654 – but came away with a looney. Christine then made an uneventful try.



Paul Simon was called upon to act as Fun Master. Using Paul's experience of playing and teaching chess, he selected to inform us about

the science of "The Art of Resignation", which is the term used to end a chess game. There are several categories through which this "Resignation" can be accomplished.

Following are some examples:

Bad Behavior

A major player in the 1920s seemed to start this as a notoriously bad loser. He grabbed three pieces and threw them against a wall – in effect resigning his position.

Before the end of a game, a major player was heard to yell ... "Why must I lose to this idiot?"

• Improper resignation

To Nod - to some it means a 'Draw'; to others it means 'I Resign'

• Excuse resignation

I was feeling 'Not Well'

At the end of a career, one loser even claimed he was not able to beat a well man.

• Conditional Surrender

Start talking to the other player providing optional moves to help himself be beat – perhaps in the hopes of a mistake or a suggested one.

• The right way to resign

Dr. Lasker - when he lost - extended his hand & would say "you played well"

President Elect Alfred Hauk, as his wife's birthday was upon him, had a tip for every husband in the room, remember the day, not the age.

Kiwanian Linda Moyer introduced our Guest speaker Brian Wood, curator of the Bell Homestead. Brian completed an Honors B.A. in Sociology and German before taking on the Assistant Curator's position in 1990. He was promoted to Curator in 1995.



Brian Wood provided and interesting and informative presentation, with the focus on the Bell ladies in Alexander Graham Bell's life.



His mother was Elize Grace Symonds, who after 25 years of age, was considered a spinster. After her Father died she supported herself and her mother with what had been left to them. She suffered hearing loss but became an amazing piano player.

She met Alexander Melville Bell through mutual friends and married in 1824. Although not anticipating any children, she had three sons 1845-Melville Jr.; 1847-Alexander; and 1848-Edward - the youngest



who died with TB at age 18. The eldest Melville Jr. died with TB in 1870. In 1870, the family came to Canada to protect Alexander Graham Bell from the living environment. Alexander's dreaming placed in Canada was below the hill near the river when he thought of the phone. They sold the home in Tutela Heights in 1881 to move to Washington to be with Alexander. She live to be 87.

Alexander's **wife**, was **Mabel Gardiner Hubbard**. She was the daughter of Boston lawyer Gardiner Green Hubbard. She contracted Scarlet Fever at a young age, which affected her hearing. Since no institution worked with the Deaf in North America, at 8 years of age she was sent to Germany. When she came home, she had learned English and was also fluent in German. Alexander Bell was hired to work with her and they eventually married and had two daughters.

The inventor faced a nearly 20-year legal battle with other scientists, including Gray and Meucci, who claimed they created telephone prototypes prior to Bell's patent. In 1887, the U.S.

government moved to withdraw the patent issued to Bell, but after a series of rulings, the Bell company won in a Supreme Court decision.

In 1917 Alexander return to Brantford for Bell Memorial dedication and in 1882 he became an American citizen.

PE Alfred Hauk appropriately thanked our guest speaker Brian Wood.



Alexander Graham Bell was a Scottish-born inventor, scientist and engineer who is credited with patenting the first practical telephone. He also co-founded the American Telephone and Telegraph Company (AT&T) in 1885.

Bell's father, grandfather, and brother had all been associated with work on elocution and speech, and both his mother and wife were deaf; profoundly.
