#### Highlights of the Thursday, 05 September, 2024 Weekly Meeting

The meeting started at 12:30 pm with President Alfred welcoming the guest Speakers, Corrinne Psailia and Machelle Denison and Guests, Brian MacLean, Michelle MacLean, Bill Sparks and Trish Sparks and all members.

The opening thought of the day was: The 1st Object of Kiwanis: "To give primacy to the human and spiritual rather than to the material values of life."

Joanne Murray introduced two Kiwanian friends from California that she and Jim had met at a conference two years ago that were visiting their cousin here

in Ontario and joined us this week at our meeting. LG Brian MacLean and wife Kiwanian Michelle MacLean and Cousin Bill Sparks and wife Trish Sparks were warmly welcomed by all members.

Leo Vos made a donation in appreciation of all the 75 people that attended the 15th Anniversary of the Kiwanis Aktion Club of Brantford in recognition of the Club members and all they do for the community. President Alf called on Dave Lewis to introduce our speakers Corrinne Psailia and Machelle Denison of Strong Start.

Kiwanian Dave introduce Machelle Denison, the Chief Executive Officer of the Strong Start Charitable Organization, a position she has held since January of 2010.

Harnessing their members common belief in changing children's lives by helping them learn to read, she has led the Board of Directors and staff through the exciting transformation of Strong Start from its grass roots beginnings, preparing the organization, its efficient infrastructure and high-impact early literacy programs for expansion.



Today, Strong Start offers 3 programs supporting children 6 months to Nine years of age. They operate in 8 regions in Ontario and to date have helped over 60,000 children. Strong Start is proactively evolving their programs, engaging community and growing their reach to help more children acquire the essential life skill of reading.

Kiwanian Dave further introduce Corrine Psaila joined Strong Start in February 2024 as their Ontario Regional Program Co-ordinator for the Letters, Sounds and Words™ program.

Corrine is responsible for supporting program partners, overseeing program implementation, and building community relationships in Brant, Haldimand and Norfolk. Corrine has over 23 years of experience working with children and families in education and community services. She is passionate about helping children learn to read and possesses extensive knowledge and experience in education, including Early Literacy Intervention and Special Education.



Corrine said she is thrilled to have joined the dynamic team at Strong Start and is looking forward to developing meaningful relationships with the members of the Brantford Community.

Kiwanian Dave asked Machelle Denison to come to the podium. Machelle Denison thanked our Club for asking her to outline the changes that have occurred in their organization over the past few years and how they have adapted to the new needs in teaching young children to read.

Machelle used a visual presentation in support of the details she supplied. The opening slide introduce the theme of the presentation that was borrowed from our Club's Defining Statement; "Changing the world by serving children, one child in our community at a time".

Machelle indicated that their Organization's Vision is that, All Children Read.

#### 1 in 4 Canadian Children

- 1 in 4 Canadian children entering Grade 1 is significantly behind his or her peers.
- Children experiencing reading difficulties likely to continue to struggle.
- By the end of Grade 3, 74% of struggling readers won't ever catch up and are 4 x more likely to drop out of high school



Machelle told us that "the human brain is hard-wired for spoken language – making learning to speak natural. Any child, unless neurologically or hearing-impaired – or are sensory-deprived - will learn to speak at some point. Reading and writing, on the other hand, are man-made."

**Reading does not develop naturally**, and for many children, specific decoding, word-recognition, and reading comprehension skills must be taught directly and systematically.

**Reading is not a natural skill** and must be explicitly taught. Phonemic awareness, phonics, vocabulary, fluency, and comprehension are foundational skills that must be taught systematically and explicitly. Direct, explicit instruction is more effective than implicit or incidental instruction.

We all know that **reading is good for us**. It can improve brain and memory function and keep your brain operating more effectively as you age. Reading also enhances connectivity in the brain, reduces stress, promotes relaxation, improves sleep, and has the potential to decrease the likelihood of developing Alzheimer's.

During the presentation we were unable to present a slide title **How We Learn to Read.** Machelle explained the details that were on the slide to us. If you would like to see that slide, Click Here.

The Ontario Curriculum for Grade 1 to 8 were changed in 2023 to revert to the Phonemic awareness, phonics, vocabulary, fluency, and comprehension method that had been successful. The Strong Start Organization had to restructure their "Building Word Strand" training manual to match the 2023 Ontario Curriculum for consistency.

Strong start now has teaching Strands consistent with the new Curriculum.
